A TOURING PARTY.—A touring party of Americans, the Gillespie-Kingsfords consisting of twenty-one persons, principally ladies, arrived in the city from St. John, N. B., by the express on Tuesday night and are remaining until this morning. They spent yesterday in "doing the sights." Among the places of interest they visited were the Experiment Farm and the J. R. Dennis fox ranch. The visitors hail from New York, New Jersey, Philadelphia and Boston, and they are making a tour of the Maritime Provinces. They have already toured New Brunswick and from here they are going through Nova Scotia, for which they are to leave this morning by the Picou boat, Northumberland. One and all they have expressed great delight with the island, to which it is their first visit of most of them.

REMINISCENT.—Mrs. David Hunter formerly of Alberton and now a resident of Charlottetown returned a few days ago from a visit to her childhood home in Belfast. The visit brought up some interesting reminiscences. Mrs. Hunter is a descendant of Dr. McCaulay who came to Prince Edward Island in 1803 on the ship Polly and settled in Belfast. During a visit to a neighbor, whose great grandfather also came out in the same ship, she saw a number of apple trees that were brought as seedlings from Scotland by the immigrants. They were planted and bore fruit four years afterwards and have been bearing continuously ever since, the sole living things that now survive of the precious cargo brought by the first immigrant ship to that section of the island. The bark of the trees is somewhat roughened and shows signs of age but still they bear fruit of excellent quality. Mrs. Hunter was unable to classify the trees as to variety but suggested that samples of the fruit be brought to the next Seed Fair for the experts to classify and also on account of their historic value.
