N. S. EXHIBITION OF 1902.

In Its Prize List, Its Exhibits, Its Special Attractions, Its Night Spectacle. It Will be Greater Than Ever.

The provincial exhibition for this year, which is advertised in another column of this issue, promises to surpass all previous exhibitions in this province. The commission which has it in charge—a joint partnership between the city of Halifax and the province of Nova Scotia—has profited by the experience of the past, has learned the lessons of years, and is now ready to make it the exhibition of 1902 a marked advance over any of its predecessors.

The date has been fixed for September 10 to 18—the loveliest time of the year, so that the weather conditions may contribute to the enjoyment of visitors to the show. There has been a succession of wet days at some recent exhibitions, but now doubtless the years of exhibition rain have passed and those of balmy, warm sunshine have come.

The people can hardly have too many holidays. They certainly cannot have too many if spent at an exhibition such as that which will be seen in the city of Halifax between September 10 and 18 next. This will essentially be the people's holiday—the holiday of the people of these maritime provinces, and the exhibition commission is leaving no stone unturned to make it pleasant and useful. It is the people's duty that they make the most of that which it is their right to enjoy.

The prize list has been fixed at \$17,000, fully \$5,000 more than that of any other in these provinces. It has been so arranged as to give increased rewards for grade cattle, and there is sure to be the biggest display of these, and of thoroughbred animals, ever presented in Nova Scotia. Every department of our stock and agricultural interests has been carefully safeguarded in the prize list, and manufacturers and industrial progress, too, will be well represented.

Expert lecturers have been engaged to speak from the judging rings, in connection with the awarding of prizes, and for the comfort of those seeing and hearing. In this part of the exhibition seating accommodation has been provided—something new on the grounds.

But the element of amusement as well as education has been brought into the exhibition. The commission has arranged for six days of horse racing. Purses aggregating \$3,000 have been provided and the race meet, with its speedy trotters and pacers, will be the best ever seen in this country east of Montreal.

The grand stand show will surpass in attractiveness and magnificence, by day and by night, anything hitherto seen. Military contests, naval exercises, acrobatic and spectacular performances will be given daily under sunlight, and nightly under electric lamps nearly as brilliant as old Sol himself. The night spectacular show will be "The Siege of Alexandria," a display in which fireworks and color illustrating the bombardment of the Egyptian seaport by the British fleet, will afford a scene of splendor not to be forgotten by the young or old.

In every respect the exhibition of 1902 will be the greatest yet, and every one should arrange to be there and make that the holiday of the year.

TROOPS' HOME-COMING FROM SOUTH AFRICA.

LONDON, July 1.—The war office has issued plans for the demobilization of the army in South Africa which show that there are 70,000 volunteers, colonial troops, Yeomanry, reservists, etc., to be sent home before any of the regulars are moved.

CANADIAN NORTHERN STRIKE SITUATION.

WINNIPEG, July 1.—(Special)—The strike situation on the Canadian Northern railway remains practically unchanged. In addition to other strikers, many section men are out along the line, while others apparently have heard nothing of the trouble and are still at work.

BOY SHOT IN BOTH THIGHS.

PORTLAND, ME., July 1.—While at play this evening a 12-year-old boy named Percy Dunn was accidentally shot by a companion who had a revolver in his possession. The bullet passed through young Dunn's right thigh and lodged in the left thigh. The boy is expected to recover if blood poisoning doesn't set in.

PROSPEROUS NEWFOUNDLAND.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., July 1.—The colonial revenue for the financial year ending June 30 was the largest in the history of the colony. It amounted to almost \$2,200,000 and is \$120,000 in excess of the revenue for the preceding financial year. A large surplus is certain but the exact amount cannot be ascertained.

A RAILROAD FEAT.

METROPOLIS, Io., June 30.—Four hundred and fifty men, working nine hours in a driving rain moved both rails of the Burlington & Western road on 125 miles of track yesterday and thus broke all records in converting a narrow into a broad gauge track. The workmen accomplished the feat without the abandonment of any regular Sunday train and without any serious delay.
