The inward cargo by the Minto from Pictou yesterday included two cars, English goods, and two cars way freight.

Jas. D. Hyndman, a native of Charlottetown, will be nominated by the Conservatives of Kilmont to oppose Hon. Frank O'Leary, the Minister of the Interior, at the next election.

The death occurred at Clyde Station, March 25th, of Janet, beloved wife of Norman MacLeod aged 57. She leaves to mourn besides her husband a large family consisting of nine sons and two daughters.

A very pleasant time was spent a few evenings ago at the home of Ebenezer and Mrs. Brown, when upwards of thirty of the young people of York and vicinity gathered there. The "wee sma' hours" after a sumptuous supper gotten up in good style by Mrs. Brown the party dispersed only too sorry the hours had gone so quickly.

President Crisp paid an official visit to the Welsford and St. Martin's Circuits, N. B., last week, and spent Sunday and Monday on the latter field. Rev. Wm. Lawson supplied for Mr. Crisp in the city on Sunday. The President and Rev. Neil McLaughlin attended the Missionary meeting at Welsford. This charge, under Rev. T. Spencer Crisp, is prospering. The above gentlemen are well known in this Province.

The leading officers of the High Court of Foresters visited the Courts at Crapaud, Murray Harbor, and Pownal, on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings of this week. There were good attendances of the members at all the meetings and the explanations given by the officers regarding the proposed legislation at Ottawa were regarded as satisfactory by the bulk of the members who listened to Messrs. Anderson and Fowler.

After a lingering illness of several months William Gavin passed to the life beyond Friday Feb. 28th. Death had been expected for some time and all the members of his family were present at the bedside except his son George who was in Seattle. William Gavin was born Oct. 22nd 1857, at Dalhousie, Ontario, and when a child moved with his parents to Prince Edward Island. At the age of 21 he was united in marriage to Miss Agnes Horn, daughter of Robert H. Horn of Bloomfield, P. E. I. eight children all of whom survive being born to this union. In 1881 he took up his residence in North Dakota living there until 1902, when with his family he came to Cashmere. Mr. Gavin was a devoted husband and a kind and indulgent father. He lived a quiet and unassuming life and by his sober and industrious habits gained the friendship and respect of everyone. He leaves a devoted wife, five sons—James Robert, William, George and Garfield, and three daughters, Matilda, Sarah and Ethel. The funeral services occurred Saturday afternoon from the Presbyterian church, Rev. I. T. Raab officiating and paying a beautiful tribute to the memory of deceased. The burial was in the Cashmere cemetery, a large concourse of friends and neighbors paying their last respects at the grave.

The Rev. Edwin Smith, who went to the New England States for the fourtieth and 200,000 Club, to lecture on this Province as a summer resort has arrived at his home, Cardigan. Mr. Smith delivered his illustrated lecture in the following places: Pawtucket, R. I., Billerica, Mass., Somerville, Mass., Boston, Brooklyn, N. Y., Fall River, Mass., Boston, Weymouth, Mass., Yonkers N. Y., Providence, R. I., Boston. In addition to lecturing the Rev. gentleman distributed an immense amount of descriptive pamphlets, and had many private interviews with wealthy men.

Sometime ago The Guardian made reference to the strange disappearance of Andrew McAulay of Georgetown Royalty. Upon enquiry yesterday it is learned that nothing further has been heard from Mr. McAulay who was last seen on Dec. 26th. As soon as the snow disappears a thorough search will be made of the woods around Georgetown as it is thought that probably the unfortunate man may have been frozen, and as a snowstorm came on shortly after he disappeared his body may have been covered by the snow thus covering any traces of him. Mr. McAulay was about 65 years of age, was a son of the late George McAulay and lived with his brother and sister about two miles from Georgetown. Attorney General Palmer was communicated with a few days ago, and on behalf of the Provincial Government has ordered an enquiry to be made into the disappearance, and also the adoption of some means of finding out by searching, if the man has possibly been lost in the woods.

SEED FARE AT SUMMERSIDE.
The Provincial Seed Fair held at Summerside last week, as far as entries of all kinds of grain, small seeds and potatoes, and the Dominion Science Department were concerned, was a decided success and if it has fulfilled the mission that its promoters, the farmers of P.E.I. intended it should, namely, an educator to the farmer in selecting good seed, and in hearing the views of practical farmers, the time and labour expended on it has not been in vain. The question is has this been done? The farmers assembled at the fair would like to hear our up-to-date farmers give their experiences on the growing and management of crops in the various localities on the Island. But to the disappointment of a large number this was not done. The first afternoon was taken up in hearing

speeches from various lawyers, legislators, clergymen, all very good in their place, as they told us about the great resources of P.E.I. and what it was capable of doing. But as we hear this in our Farmers' Institutes every fortnight for over six months in the year, we would like something a little more practical. And we can only get at the practical part of the matter by hearing from farmers who have made a success of farming along its various lines.
Prof. Ross gave a splendid address on the selecting of good seed which if followed out would be a great benefit to our country. When it comes to the farmer's turn to speak he is generally limited to from two to five minutes, and he is expected to give his experiences in that length of time. And a number of resolutions for the benefit of farmers are rushed through at the last minute without discussion.
The judges who come over here to judge the grain, small seeds and potatoes, are generally supposed to give us the reasons why they awarded the prizes to the different samples. The exhibitors would like to have the judges explain why they awarded the prizes, when to the ordinary farmer there seems to be so little difference in the samples. If this were done it would be quite an educator to the farmer in selecting good seed, and would help our Seed Fairs in the future.
