Sir William Shaughnessy has made public the fact that the tender of the C. P. R. to provide an Atlantic fast line is on the basis of a yearly subsidy of \$1,000,000. The London Times thinks that the fact of President Shaughnessy now making the terms of his tender public is an intimation that the negotiations are far along the road to success.

The decision of the directors of a bank not to permit their clerks to marry on a less salary than \$1,500 a year would be all right enough if the bank would pay that amount of salary to all who are of marriageable age. Otherwise it is an infringement upon one of the most sacred rights of the individual. A \$1,500 limit for marriage would easily condemn to perpetual celibacy or worse about ninety-nine one hundredths of the inhabitants of this obliging and amiable world.

Australia has a separate banking system for each state of the Commonwealth as yet, but will enact a general banking act next year. They can hardly do better than adopt the Canadian system. This year every state of the Commonwealth except West Australia will have a deficit, and West Australia only escapes by reason of being permitted for the time to collect interstate duties, which none of

the other states are allowed to do. The antipodean colonies have extravagant ideas in regard to official salaries and expenditures generally. There is much that they might learn from the Dominion, and we trust that after their coming visit to Canada, Premiers Barton and Seddon may carry home with them some useful lessons.

The Monument Fund Committee had indulged the hope that the bronze casting necessary to complete the work would be received in time for the unveiling to take place on the day of the King's coronation, August 9. A letter just received from Hamilton McCarthy, the sculptor and contractor for the monument, states that this will now be impossible. Much regret is felt on account of the delay which is however, inevitable, owing to an unusual pressure of work in the bronze foundry in New York where the casting awaits its turn.

St. John levied taxes of \$415,754 on 11,441 tax-payers for the current year. Real estate is assessed for \$13,261,100, personal estate \$8,065,500 and income \$3,827,700, a total assessment of \$25,140,300. The rate of assessment is \$1.55 per \$100. Mechanics and laborers taxed on \$300 pay \$6.65. The number of taxpayers is slightly less than last year. Real estate shows a small increase, as does income also, while personal estate has declined somewhat during the past four years. Twenty-seven individuals, firms, estates or corporations pay over \$1,000 each in taxes, the highest being the Rank of New Brunswick, which pays \$7,750. Fifty-nine other taxpayers pay over \$500 each yearly.

John Charlton M. P. has recently returned from a tour in the United States and reports a growing feeling in favor of reciprocity with Canada. There have been many similar reports during thirty-five years past, but so far nothing has come of it. The fact is that there has all ways been a good deal of favor for reciprocity in sections of New England, but in the west, the centre and south of the Republic the feeling is one of indifference or hostility. We believe that a fair measure of reciprocity would be a good thing for both countries, but Canada is getting along very well without it, and can do so in the years to come. A display of undue anxiety on Canada's part is about the surest way to prevent a reciprocity treaty being brought about.

A number of newspapers representing both political parties are engaged in a somewhat vigorous crusade in favor of increasing Sir Wilfrid Laurier's salary. A small number express the hope that a salary will also be affixed to the leadership of the Opposition. We fail to see the necessity for either of these proposals. In the early days of the federation Sir John Macdonald led the government with a salary of \$5,000 and members of Parliament received but \$600 each. The Premier now receives \$8,000 and \$1,500 additional as a member of the Commons, while the members of the two Houses receive two and a half times the indemnity of thirty years ago. Sir Wilfrid can well afford to serve his country for the salary paid to Sir John Macdonald and Sir John Thompson. A raise of salary to the Premier means a further general advance of salaries to the entire official class, most of whom are now much better off than the majority of the people whose servants they are.
