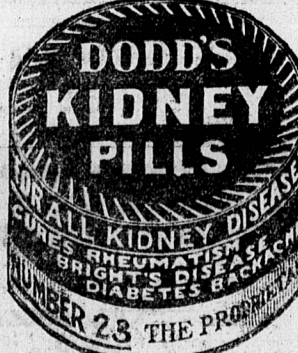

people of this Province do not want the auto. If the people of other countries are willing to put up with it and subject themselves to the disadvantages, damages, accidents and deaths which have always followed in its wake wherever introduced, then that is their own business and not ours. But let us, now that we are clear of it, keep clear of it, and not allow it for a moment to interfere with the comfort and safety of our people. Now, what are the facts?

A certain few in Charlottetown who are interested in the manufacture and sale of autos, and calling themselves "Progress" have undertaken to dictate to our people and tell them what they should do in regard to this matter and have told us about the unique position we had compared with other countries because we have shut it out. But have they told us of the sad and bitter experiences of many of those places where the auto has been running the longest? of the tales of woe that have been recorded from time to time, as witness the graphic statements published by the Christian Guardian of Toronto a short time ago setting forth the terrible damages and inconveniences the people of that city were subjected to, of the strong desire to have the nuisance removed, and stating that in the State of Maine there were some 1559 persons run down and more or less seriously injured, and 100 killed within eleven months last year. These are appalling facts! Let the public think of them and stand aghast! And yet, forsooth there are a few persons among us who will insinuate that the people of this Province are so lacking in intelligence that they do not know what is for their best interests, and they undertake to advise them. What for? The answer is easily made.

The record of the auto in other countries is one of accidents and deaths. We are all right as we are in regard to means of locomotion, as witness our beautiful horses that have a reputation all over the Maritime Provinces and elsewhere for style and speed. Our wives, our sisters and our daughters find much pleasure and amusement in driving our fine horses along our roads, in the beautiful summer time, but let the auto come back again and they are deprived of this pleasure which so rightfully belongs to them. This is one of their privileges and it must be granted to them. One of their rights and it must be respected. And let our legislators beware how they treat this matter of the auto, if indeed they consider it at all. We think it will be time enough for them to take it up when they are asked to do so by the country in general.

This is a public and a burning question, and one that should not be legislated on, simply because a few persons have asked for it for reasons in which the general public are not at all interested. Let the present act be repealed and we mistake very much if there will not be a feeling of

**FIREMAN DASHED TO DEATH ON PAVEMENT**

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 13.—When an aerial truck on which a crew from No. 1 fire hall was practicing collapsed yesterday morning, John McKenzie and Thomas Murphy were hurled to the ground, distances of about seventy and sixty feet, respectively. McKenzie succumbed to his injuries and Murphy now lies in the Burrard Sanatorium with many fractured bones. An investigation into the cause of the accident showed that the mishap was due to the snapping of the woodwork at the base of the ladder.

The practice was begun at about 6 o'clock in the morning in Gore Avenue, near the fire hall. As soon as the ladder had been fully elevated, McKenzie went up, followed closely by Murphy. When the two men were nearing the top, without any warning McKenzie was about seventy feet from the ground and Murphy about sixty feet. To the horror of their comrades, both men fell to the earth without a possibility of help being extended by those around them. Two firemen standing below the ladder were narrowly missed by the unfortunate men as they fell to the sidewalk.

It was too much to expect that either had escaped serious injury. Both men were quickly picked up and no time was lost in getting the police ambulance. It was soon on the scene, and as both men were living, it was dimly hoped that their lives would be saved. McKenzie's serious condition was only too apparent, for blood was oozing from his mouth and ears. The end was not very long in coming, for shortly after 10 o'clock, in the presence of his three sisters and an uncle, he passed away. His injuries were chiefly internal, and Dr. Telford gave no hope of saving him from the outset. Murphy, too, was seriously injured, but it is hoped that he will be saved. One arm is broken in three places, and the other in two, and he suffered internally.

As soon as possible an investigation was made by Chief Carlisle, in company with the assistant chief and Captains Duncan and Eaton. Their inquiries led to the belief that the woodwork at the base of the ladder had snapped from some unaccountable cause. Thus the strain was unevenly distributed, and caused other parts to give away. At first it was believed that some of the steelwork had been unequal to the strain and had been the primary cause of the accident.

Building Inspector Jarrett looked at the broken wooden parts and gave the opinion that the wood was fairly good. Mayor Findlay did not consider the wood of the best quality by any means, while Alderman Crowe thought that an iron stay had "crystallized." The wood was then unequal to the strain placed upon it and gave way. One of the beams, he said, showed indications that the wood was not of the best.

The truck was supplied by the Stagg firm about two years ago, and has been in constant use ever since. The last occasion on which the truck was used was at the recent Hastings

Street fire. The truck cost \$17,500. Neither of the victims was married. McKenzie was 24 years of age and had three sisters and two uncles living here. His mother and father Malcolm and Mrs. McKenzie, are both living at Flat River, Prince Edward Island, and his body will be sent back there for interment. Just when the funeral will take place cannot yet be said, but there will be a large escort to the station, for McKenzie was very popular. In addition to the three sisters and two uncles living here, there is another uncle in Mexico, and another at Flat River, while Inspector McRae is a cousin. Inspector McRae is naturally keenly affected by his cousin's tragic end, for they were great friends and were schoolmates.

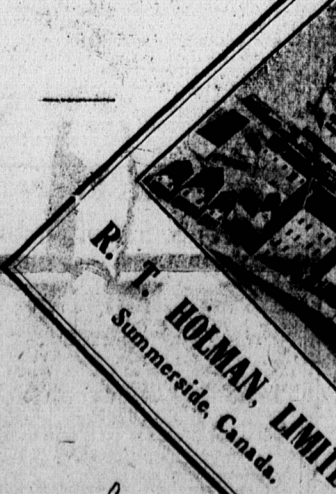
Murphy is only 23, and has been with the department about a year. As far as is known he has no relatives here, having come from Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. The flags were flown at half-mast on the fire halls and at the police station. The body of McKenzie was taken to the undertaking parlors of Messrs. Greene & Merkle, and an inquest will be held there at 3 p. m. on Monday.
