Must Base Democracy On Religion, Belief

MONCTON, N.B., Oct. 16 (CP) - "We can expect no successful democracy apart from the leadership of Jesus Christ, whose principles form the basis of any enduring social order," said Dr. George J. Trueman, President of Mount Allison University, speaking today at the annual Sunday School Convention of the Maritime Religious Education Council. He is chairman of the Council's General Board. Dr. Trueman outlined M.R.E.J. work in the field of Christian Education and called upon ministers and church leaders to support this program more loyally. Greater need than ever before exists for the program of Christian Education, and no educational system ignoring spiritual values can long be tolerated, he said. Speaking on "the value and possibilities of the Sunday School Workers Conference," Rev. A. Gibson, Secretary of Christian Education of the Baptist Convention, said that since 1915 there had been a large decrease in Sunday School attendance and an accompanying increase in crime and juvenile delinquency. The Sunday School must strive to increase its efficiency through conferences of workers to provide opportunity for training in worship, teaching and service, he said. Worship services were conducted today by Rev. W. Fraser Munro, Fredericton. Conferences were held under the following leadership: Children's Work, Miss Muriel Laurence, Fredericton; Girls' Work, Miss Margaret Hutchins, Wolfville, N.S.; Boy's Work, Rev. I. Judson Levy, Charlottetown; Young People's Work, Rev. W. Gordon Sackville, N.B.; General Work, Rev. J. Gibson. In an address tonight Rev. Arthur Organ, Saint John, said a new social order must be built under the leadership of Christ, and in this task the M.R.E.C. has a vital part to play in the Maritime Provinces. "The very foundations of our civilization were threatened by 'isms,'" he said, asking, "Where is the education of our day leading us? It ought to be leading us under God's spirit to a new community wherein peoples will master the art of living together." Rev. H. C. Olsen, Amherst, N.S., said the home is the main factor in passing on religion to a new generation, and the church must be asked to make religion vital in the home. He deplored the fact that many young people were not attending church. A banquet was held in honor of Robert Reid, Saint John, who has been council treasurer for 24 years.

Sale Of Abitibi Empire Is Flop, Only One Bid

TORONTO, Oct. 16 (CP) - A foreclosure sale of the assets of the Abitibi Pulp and Paper Company proved abortive today with a lone bid of \$30,000,000 was declared less than the reserve bid set by the court on the \$12,000,000 holdings. The only bid submitted at the auction held by F. H. Barlow, master of the supreme court of Ontario, 22, made by J. J. Symington, Montreal, on behalf of the bondholders' committee of which he is chairman, frequently and argued in the courts since the vast paper-mill chain went into bankruptcy in 1932. Tuesday's proceedings were purely formal. The conditions of sale were read, bids were called, the one lone bid was made, there was some slight discussion of the identity of the bidders and the sale was declared abortive. It took less than 45 minutes. For the time being, at least, the Abitibi Company will continue under the management of the receiver, G. T. Clarkson, who has been operating it for the past several years. As soon as Mr. Barlow has made his report on the sale proceedings today to Mr. Justice W. E. Middleton, who made the original sale order, however, the bondholders' committee will move to have the reserve bid reduced. This would be followed by an application for another sale order.

Veterans Guard Stationed At Ordnance Ground

The Prince Edward Island branch of the Veterans Guard of Canada under command of Major R. H. Duvvar of Charlottetown is now stationed at the Ordnance Grounds. They are billeted in the Ordnance buildings which were last occupied by soldiers in 1896. It is expected that the 130 members of the unit will stage their first public parade this evening when they go to the Railway Station to meet a detachment of 40 members from the Sydney Branch, all former Island ex-service men, who are returning to the Veterans Guard of this province. Those arriving this evening will be billeted in two rooms at the Armouries until other quarters are provided. The members of the Guard will be arrayed in battle dress and it is expected that they will be accompanied by a band.

The duties of the Guard, which is part of the Canadian Active Service Force, will be home defence work and it is understood a number of them will be placed as guards at the airport. The unit is fully recruited with the exception of several ex-service men who are expected to join their comrades in a short time.

Three Ships Prepare For Wartime Work

NEW YORK, Oct. 16 (AP) - Three ships which sought refuge here from the dangers of sea combat - including the prides of the British and Norwegian merchant marines - were being prepared tonight for wartime service. The 85,000-ton liner Queen Elizabeth, largest and fastest ship in the world, apparently was scheduled to join her sister ship, the Queen Mary, and the Mauretania in troopship service between Australia and Egypt.

The 18,673-ton Oslofjord, Norway's largest and most lavish vessel, has been ordered to the British Ministry of Shipping for troopship service, officials said. This liner has been tied up in Bayonne, N. J., since Germany invaded Norway. Built in 1938, she was in the West Indies tourist trade.

Mystery surrounded the planned sailing of the French freighter San Francisco, 6,013 tons. Crew members said they had been ordered to sail their empty ship to Liverpool, England, on a "mercy mission."

French line officials said the "French Admiralty" ordered the ship to sail in a few days for an undisclosed port. They said they did not know if the Vichy Government or the De Gaulle "free French" movement had issued the order.

The San Francisco took refuge here after the fall of France. She ran between Europe and San Francisco before the war.

MAY OUTLAW "WITNESSES"

SYDNEY, Australia, Oct. 16 (AP) - Premier Alexander Mair of New South Wales said today Jehovah's Witnesses were using a form of religion as a cover for subversive activities and he ordered law officers to investigate whether the state is empowered to declare the sect illegal. Mair's Witness have already been declared illegal organizations in Canada.

The crowd of 2,500 joined in the argument and the referee ordered J. R. Smith, Millwall's international captain, off the field. He refused to go. Both teams were sent to their dressing rooms where the referee talked with the players.

TARRYTOWN, N. Y., Oct. 16 (AP) - Father Divine, Harlem Negro evangelist, and a group of his "angel" followers took possession today of the palatial Bing estate mansion. The new "Heaven" is situated in the heart of one of Westchester's most exclusive areas.

AUSTRALIAN WOLF SHIPPED

BOSTON, Oct. 16 (AP) - A source close to the industry reported today that the first shipment of 250,000 pounds of Australian wool, valued at approximately \$400,000, is en route to the United States for storage for British use.

TANKER RESCUES 16
