for a large part of the summer. She had seen thousands of refugees come in from Europe, but the one she would longest remember was a Belgian woman, almost insane with grief, who had told her of losing a young son and husband. The son's head had been cut off by a German soldier because the lad wore a cap with a likeness on it of the King of Belgium. The father in attempting to kill the German was killed himself.

The Grampian brought the first man wounded in the war. His name was Ludwig Johanns, a Belgian, and he landed at Quebec, where he had been ticket agent for the Allan line. He had been wounded at Liege and been invalided out of the army.

Dr. S. A. B. Mercer, professor of Semite languages at Chicago University, came over on the Megantic. He studied old manuscripts in Petrograd while the Russians were fighting. He heard the Czar declare in a speech that, if Germany could place 6,000,000

soldiers in the field, Russia could and would place 16,000,000. He saw a Russian mob attack the German embassy in Petrograd the day after German ambassador left. They smashed the windows and tore down and broke the statue on the top of the embassy. They were dispersed by firemen, who turned the hose on them.

More than once, he saw Englishmen being carried on the shoulders of the Russians in the streets, and he himself had been cheered on entering a restaurant. Work in the city was disorganized. Tools lay on the road just as they had been thrown down by the workmen. Everyone seemed to want to go to war.

STOP LIQUOR SALE.
R. E. Marshall, a returning American, said that on the day after the war was declared, an official edict had been declared forbidding soldiers to use vodka, the Russian national drink. Dr. Mercer did not know of this, but said the Government had prohibited the sale of liquor during the night; then after eleven o'clock and finally after eight o'clock at night. Mr. Marshall was in Odessa and came to England through Turkey, Roumania, France and Germany. He was arrested three times, but was freed through his passport each time. He said the Russians were very enthusiastic and remarked on the lack of drunkenness among their soldiers. France and England were not needed, in the land war, he thought. Russia's great hordes will whip Germany alone.
