UNDER-WATER EYE FOR SUBMARINERS MAKES THEM 10 TIMES AS DEADLY.

NEW YORK, Mch. 28.—Hudson Maxim announced yesterday that he has perfected an invention making it possible for submarines to attack an enemy without showing even their periscopes.

The inventor refused to give details, but stated that his invention will enable a submarine to cruise and to discharge its torpedoes submerged. Naval men declare such an invention will increase the deadliness of the submarine 1,000 per cent.

"Submarines are blind when submerged," said a naval officer yesterday. "Before making an attack their periscopes must rise above the surface so that the man in the conning tower can see his target. The submarine then becomes very vulnerable to gun fire.

"If Mr. Maxim's invention is put into use it will mean this danger will be eliminated. The craft to be attacked will have no warning of the submarine's presence."

Were the United States to have sole access to such a device, it would give our navy superiority over every other naval power in the world.

The giant seagoing submarine Schley, to be built by the Electric Boat Company, will be able to cross the Atlantic and return under her own power. If the new Maxim invention is installed that vessel will become the most formidable fighting craft of her type in the world. She is 265 feet in length and displaces 1,100 tons at the surface.

The German, even in times of peace, holds bread in honor. The Englishman as a prisoner actually plays football with it. He suits his own comfort. He crushes whole nations against the wall, and rejoices if a good purpose is achieved such as the starvation of the German nation.

One can imagine the well-fed English merchants or employes reading in an English paper, perhaps in June, 1915, over his breakfast of bacon and eggs: "A further 75,000 people starved to death in Berlin. Munich faced by starvation. Germany haunted by the spectre of hunger."

It is only necessary to picture the satisfaction of the returned reader to become convinced that Germany must use the strongest measures against this England which wishes to increase the death crop of the battlefield by hundreds of thousands of deaths by starvation, and proceeds with this task with the same cold-blooded imperturbability as that shown.

OF LOCAL INTEREST—A telegram from Winnipeg yesterday to Hyndman & Co., City, advised of the death of Mr. J. H. Brock, Managing Director and founder of the Great West Life Assurance Co. Mr. Brock has been in ill-health for the past two years and death occurred while at Long Beach, California.

THE STEAMERS—The Stanley left Georgetown at 5.30 yesterday morning and at 10.30 she was reported three miles south of Cape Bear in heavy ice, making very slow headway. She had on board 3 tons of express, 91 tons of freight, 17 passengers and 60 bags. Up to 6.30 last evening the Stanley had only "made" one mile more than at 10.30 a.m. The Minto left Pictou Sunday morning at 10 o'clock and at 11 a.m. yesterday she was working off the east end of Pictou Island, making poor headway. At eight o'clock she was 3 miles south of Cape Bear with a prospect of getting in to Georgetown through the night. She had on board 20 passengers, 75 bags of mail, 1 1/2 tons of express, 67 tons of cargo. The steamers were only a half mile apart at 8 o'clock.

KITCHENER'S WAY.

The dispatches from London a few days ago, telling how Lord Kitchener had interfered in the dock laborers' strike and had "smoothed over" the difficulties, recalls how the great soldier settled a previous strike in five minutes.

A certain well known firm recently obtained a large contract from the War Office. To ensure it being carried out in time it was necessary for the work-people to work overtime. This they were perfectly willing to do, being paid at the union rates.

After a few days the secretary of the trade union called upon the head of the firm concerned, and advised him that unless the overtime was stopped all the hands would be called out. As there seemed no way out of it the employer went to the War Office and succeeded in seeing Lord Kitchener and placed all the particulars before him.

Lord Kitchener asked for the name and address of the trade union man and said: "Be here tomorrow at eleven o'clock." At that time the next day Mr. — was admitted into Lord Kitchener's presence, the trade union man being there also.

The following conversation then took place:
Lord Kitchener: "Now, Mr. —, kindly repeat what you told me yesterday as briefly as you can."

Mr. — did so.
Turning to the trade union man, Lord K. said, "Mr. —, are these the facts as stated?"

"Yes, my lord, but it is strictly against our rules to —"

Lord Kitchener: "Are the facts right?"

"Yes, my lord; but —"

Lord Kitchener: "If you call those people out on strike I will get you seven years under the Treason Act for preventing the supplying of His Majesty's Forces. Good morning, gentlemen."

EYES OF WORLD ON CONSTANTINOPLE

It is upon Constantinople that the eyes of the world are fixed today, the military operations in Poland, Galicia and Flanders having for the moment faded into unimportance compared with the sudden attack upon the stronghold of the Turk. Before the attempt to force the Dardanelles was begun by the allied fleets there had been no talk of this movement, the battles between the Turks and the Russians, and the thwarting of the Turkish attack upon Egypt having occupied the attention of the experts. Suddenly it was announced that a British and French fleet was trying to force the Dardanelles, which is the gateway to Constantinople, and reputed to be one of the strongest natural fortifications in the world. Since then steady progress has been made, and from one third to one half of the dangerous and tortuous channel has been cleared of the enemy. It is generally admitted that the Allies' ships cannot be stopped, and that within a fortnight, probably, the capital of the Turks will lie helpless under the guns of the Queen Elizabeth and her consorts.

There is a report that the Sultan, the Grand Vizier, the Chief Eunuch, the harem and other important adjuncts of the Moslem court have already fled the doomed city, and have established themselves in Konja, which is some 300 miles due east of Smyrna; and there are rumors afloat that before the city is surrendered there will be a general massacre of Christians. A prominent Turk now in Paris says that when the battleships of the Allies appear off Constantinople the populace will rise against the Germans, and after flying white flags from every window will proceed to massacre all the Teutons in sight. A massacre of Germans would be a natural prelude to the massacre of all Christians for the alliance between Turkey and Germany is temporary. The antipathy of the Turks for the Christians is traditional, and it may be taken for granted that the infuriated Moslems will not make nice distinctions, but that if they start a massacre, all the Christians who fall into their hands, whatever their nationality will be in peril.

There is, however, the extreme probability that the sight of the war ships will terrify the Turks, and that they will be willing to surrender the city without attempting any reprisals upon non-belligerent dwellers there. They may still cling to the old hope that dissensions among the Allies will save them, as in the past they have been spared. Old Abdul, certainly, would never despair even at this late date, although he must see with amazement Britain and Russia combining in their attack upon his ancient stronghold. In the past three centuries, and especially in the past ninety years, Great Britain has more than once intervened to prevent Russia from securing possession of Constantinople. The Crimean war, as everybody knows, was fought primarily for this purpose, and our much abused word which was coined in a popular English song, which swore that in no circumstances should Russia ever have possession of Constantinople.

In 1877 the fear of Russia had by no means abated, and when the victorious Russian army, having defeated the Turks, had reached San Stefano and was almost within sight of Constantinople it was robbed of the chief fruit of victory by a British note and the presence of a British fleet in the Dardanelles and the Sea of Marmora. Subsequently Lord Salisbury ventured the opinion that in making the Sultan against the Czar Britain had "put her money on the wrong horse," but the money had been lost and in the past generation there has been no fitting opportunity for Great Britain to "lay off" and take a ticket upon Russia. Just what Sir Edward Grey meant when he said the other day that Britain sympathized with Russian aspirations regarding an outlet upon the Black Sea is a matter for debate. It may mean that Britain has decided that Constantinople shall pass into Russian possession. It may mean that the Dardanelles will be dismantled of forts and that Constantinople will become an international city. One factor is constant in the fight over Constantinople; the final word will be said by Great Britain.

Russia regards this city much as the Roman Catholics regard Rome. Its possession has been a natural ambition for centuries, and there is even a legend that Peter the Great gave directions about it in his will, though this testimony is supposed now to be a forgery. It cannot be denied, however, that Catherine the Great had set her heart upon it, and desired that the capital of Russia should be transferred from Petrograd and Moscow to Stamboul. Alexander the First wanted the Turkish capital and it is said that his quarrel with Napoleon which led to the disastrous invasion of Russia, re-
