RUNAWAY "AUTO" KILLS SPECTATOR

Machine was Going Sixty Miles an Hour... A MIRACULOUS ESCAPE... Driver Lost Control of the Car which Bolted Over the Embankment Killing a Spectator.

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 9.—While Barney Oldfield's racing automobile was running nearly 60 miles an hour at the Grosse Point track this afternoon in the ten mile open event, one of the front tires burst through and exploded throwing the car into the fence and injuring Frank Shearer, a spectator, so badly that he died in ambulance en route to a hospital.

It was an afternoon of accidents at the track, two other high power machines, those driven by Harry Cunningham and Henri Page, the Parisian, coming to grief, because of the tires. Fortunately no one was hurt in either of these accidents.

As Oldfield was turning into the stretch on his seventh mile the friction on the upper front tire burned it through and it exploded. The car with its tremendous momentum, shot for the outer edge of the track, which is six feet above the ground beyond, Oldfield has just time to twist his brake and head for a spot between two trees. Shearer was standing against the fence at this point and the car struck him squarely, breaking both legs in several places and fracturing his skull. He was thrown seventy-five feet and never recovered consciousness. Oldfield had presence of mind enough to throw himself backward on the flat deck of the car which went crashing through a low tree and landed a wreck, fifty feet beyond.

His father was a passenger to the Island in the renowned Polly in August 1833 and the following New Year's day Hugh was born at Pinette. His trade for years was that of a ship-wright and at Brudenell where the famous De Roma founded the first settlement at Three Rivers Mr. McFadyen constructed many ships. Later he was engaged in agriculture which occupation he followed, assisted by his son Daniel, until his demise. He was a man of rigid constitution, the heritage of Scotchmen, and even this summer was capable of hewing a building frame. Esteemed and respected by all he lived a christian life; and died a firm believer in the merits of the Lord Jesus Christ.

SUBSIDIES WILL BE BROUGHT DOWN

Says Sir Wilfrid, this Session—Trouble with the Auditor General—Redistribution Bill Discussed and Fielding Introduces Resolution.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—(Special)—In the Commons today Sir Wilfrid Laurier said that some of the railway subsidies would be brought down this session. The rapid development he said, is making them necessary.

TROUBLE WITH AUDITOR GENERAL. Barker Hamilton complained that a member could not get indemnity because of the difficulty between the Auditor General and Finance Department. Hon. Mr. Fielding said the difficulty existed but there was no reason for it, the Auditor General refusing to abide by the direction of the treasury board. He promised that legislation would be passed if the Auditor General did not yield.

CANADIAN STOCKS.

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FROM ANOTHER CORRESPONDENT. Dominion Coal, Sept. 10.—(Special)—The death in Dominion Coal from 70 to 75 was the only incident in today's stock dealings.

It is believed that the dividend will be reduced to six or possibly to four percent in the near future. Ross controls and wishes to further develop the property. Dominion Iron sold up to 15, Preferred was steady at 39 and Bonds at 67.

REDISTRIBUTION BILL DISCUSSED. The redistribution bill was then taken up the Opposition objecting to Brant getting two members and Victoria and Halton in Ontario, only having one member.

MONEY TO BE ADVANCED. Mr. Fielding has given notice of a resolution that money advances may be made to enable him to secure all the necessary material, equipment and stores required in connection with the construction, renewal, maintenance and operation of Government railways, the amount required at one time not to exceed for the Intercolonial Railway \$1,500,000, and for the Prince Edward Island Railway \$100,000.

APPLIED SCIENCE AT MOUNT Allison.

This year sees a great development in the course of study in Mt. Allison along the lines of Applied Science. In the Ladies' College the School of Domestic Science is now organized and it will be housed in the fine new wing now in course of erection. In this school instruction will be given in household arts and great attention will be given to the explanation of the scientific principles underlying them. This is a most interesting and important scientific field. The chief work of the school will be to train teachers in this department of learning and skill. Those who take this course will be obliged to take Physics, Chemistry and Biology in the University. The Chemistry and Physics of cooking, of rusts, stains, etc., will be studied and also the yeasts and moulds under the microscope.

In the University a new department has been organized in Commerce and Finance. After a student has taken his diploma in the ordinary business college he will proceed to study higher commercial problems in Political Economy, Contract Law, Banking, Foreign Exchange, Commercial Geography, International Law, Corporation, and Modern Languages far enough to enable him to take charge of the Foreign Correspondence in an office. The value of this course to a young man entering the world of business today can scarcely be over-estimated, especially if during his vacation he gives himself to active business.

Arrangements are being made for special courses of lectures by leading business men of the country. This will make a very notable feature of the course. Just as notable an advance is in the organization of the McClellan School of Industrial Arts in connection with the Science department of the University. Drawing, descriptive geometry, carpentry, wood turning and metal working will be taught. The addition of this work to the usual Science, Mathematics, English, and Law of the Arts course, will enable Mr. Allison to carry students through the first two years of the courses in Mechanical, Electrical, Mining, Civil, Chemical Engineering and Architecture, while he is winning his Bachelor of Arts degree. He will be able therefore in six years from entering college go out into professional life with the two degrees B. A. and B. E. The work of this department will be carried on in the four stories of the new science building. The old building has been reserved on foundations for a new building which gives a height of 12 feet ceiling. Altogether it will be the most splendid Science Hall in the Maritime Provinces.
