Maritime Men In The Educational World

I AM incurably a lover of the Maritime Provinces. I take just pride in the men it has produced in the educational world, as well as in law, medicine, and theology. The men have salted and peppered the right-type of settlers from the continent.

It is graciously acknowledged that the leading exports of our Maritimes are university presidents, college principals, professional men, along with fish, coal and potatoes. Possibly it is the fish spring and the Captain states that if the right kind were available, he could easily place one hundred of them on good farms.

I have just completed a list of men born in the Lower Provinces who are or have been at the head of universities and colleges at home and abroad. I have on the list over 50 names, but it is by no means complete. I have tried to make a bona fide list, giving only names of men who are at the head of institutions regularly established and doing standard work. This list does not include men who have distinguished themselves in other lines of work, of which there are a multitude that no man can number. The readers of the Maple Leaf will be interested to see the list from their own home province. I will give the quota from each one by itself, beginning with Prince Edward Island. The list of the other provinces will follow later.

Prince Edward Island is a brain-producing province. Though small in size like Greece of old it has given a splendid roster of men to educational and professional life. There are six presidents to its credit on the list as follows: Jacob G. Schurman, born at Freetown, President Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, for thirty years, 1892-1922.

Robert A. Falconer, born at Charlottetown, President Toronto University since 1907.
Daniel J. Fraser, born at Alberton, Principal Presbyterian College, Montreal, since 1905.
Samuel N. Robertson, born at Borden, Principal Prince of Wales College since 1901.

Donald D. MacKay, President of Whitworth College, Spokane, 1911.
Edward J. Jordan, President Grand Manan College, Nebraska, since 1916.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., has a noted scholar in Sacramento, I mean the Rev. Charles McLean, who is a graduate of McGill University, Montreal, with degrees of M. A. and Ph. D. He preached the Gospel about 50 years. His first pastor was in Glengarry, Ont. Next he went to the Island and preached a year there. Then he went to North Dakota, and next to Boise, Idaho. For the past eight years Dr. and Mrs. McLean have been at work transplanting the original Greek and Hebrew Bible into English, giving full explanatory notes. Mrs. McLean herself is a professional writer of short stories. They have 18 large volumes of typewritten manuscripts. The entire work they expect to finish in two years. Rev. Dr. Fraser of McGill University has written a masterpiece of an introduction to this original translation. Rev. Dr. McLean is 83 years of age, walks very erect, and is quite an athlete. He takes long walks every evening. This keeps him in good condition. He does not believe in prohibition.

I wish I had time and space to speak of other noted Island men such as Rev. John M. MacInnis, Dean of the Bible Institute, Los Angeles; Rev. Dr. Malcolm J. MacLeod, whom Dr. Cadman calls one of the greatest preachers in New York City; S. J. Willis, Supt. of Education, British Columbia, and J. D. Gillis, assistant superintendent; Hon. J. D. McLean, Minister of Education, now Premier of the Province; J. S. Gordon, Superintendent of schools for the city of Vancouver; Rev. A. D. McKenzie, Principal of St. Andrew's Academy; Quebec, and many others. But one other name must be mentioned: Franklin K. Lane, who as born at De Sable, P. E. I. The family moved to the United States when he was young. He afterwards became a member of President Wilson's cabinet and one of America's greatest statesmen.
