"CANADA'S MAGICAL PROGRESS."

That is what impressed Sir George Doughty during his recent visit to the Dominion, during which he travelled 11,000 miles on Canadian soil.

"It is seven years since I last visited Canada. This time I have travelled from the Atlantic to the Pacific, visiting nearly every great centre of population in Canada, as well as along the whole of the British Columbia coast line up to Alaska.

years. In my opinion there is no parallel in the history of the world to such remarkable development—such rapid strides in population, in wealth, in prosperity, in the growth of agriculture and other industries.

"The development of the north-west, of the prairie sections and of British Columbia, with its 380,000 square miles of country, is now beginning to be a reality. It will not be surprising if within twenty years of this time there is a population of 30,000,000 of people living upon the Canadian Continent."

DUTIES SHOULD BE EQUALISED.

The Canadian Farm directs attention to the fact not generally realised that while United States duties on farm products which Canadians have for sale, Canadian duties on much that our farmers have to buy are higher than those of the United States.

Canada taxes mowing machines, harvesters and reapers coming in from the United States 17 per cent, while the United States duty is only 15 per cent. On horse powers and traction engines for farm purposes, windstackers and threshing machines the duty is 20 per cent in Canada and 15 per cent, in the States, and on hay loaders, potato diggers, feed cutters, grain crushers, fanning mills, hay tedders, rollers and other agricultural implements, 25 per cent and 15 per cent, respectively, or 10 per cent higher against the Canadian than against the American farmer.

And yet American farmers are in revolt against the tariff while Canadian farmers in many cases quite tamely submit to the impositions dictated by the Manufacturers' Association. Are our sturdy Prince Edward Island farmers quite content with this state of things? And if not what are they going to do about it?

It is true that on most products the duties are higher in the United States than in Canada, but that does not touch the American farmer.

It is the industrial worker, the professional and the consuming classes generally, other than farmers, who suffer. It is therefore quite clear that the American farmer is more favored by the tariff on his side of the line, than is the Canadian farmer on this side.

The duties ought to be equalised as far as may be, and it is earnestly to be hoped that something substantial in that line may be brought about by the negotiations for reciprocity now being entered upon. The Canadian farmers have an exceedingly strong case in demanding a reduction of duties on farm machines and implements and if the farmers in Eastern Canada will join in the strong demand to that end which has been put forward by their western brethren they would prove irresistible. The way things are now—the manufacturers are "farming the farmers" in right good shape.

WHY CHILDREN DREAM OF FLYING.

The marvellous development of flying in these days has given rise to discussion of the spiritual, or psychological aspects of the case. The belief that man is essentially a spirit, housed in a material body from which he separates at death and that the immaterial spirit can move at will through air or ether, is widely disseminated. Many forms of religious belief, ancient and modern, have included this notion that the spirit of man has the power of flight.

Speaking of the brevity of life and what follows, the psalmist said, "It is soon cut off and we fly away." In all ages men have sighed for the wings of a bird. The question arises, how far this belief in the power of the separated spirit of man to fly, is the result of education, religious teaching or acquired knowledge? Is it not, indeed, an innate consciousness, born with us as we enter upon our life on earth?

The latter view appears to be taken by Havelock Ellis in his article on Aviation in Dreams, which appeared in a recent issue of the Atlantic Monthly. He notes that the sensation of flying is very common in the dreams of early childhood, that it disappears in the active period of middle life but returns frequently as one of the last sensations of conscious life. The idea is novel and not without interest to the psychologist. We quote: "The sensation of flying is one of the earliest to appear in the dreams

of childhood. It seems to become less frequent after middle age. Beauvis states that in his case it ceased at the age of fifty; I found it disappear, or become rare, at a somewhat earlier age. It is sometimes the last sensation at the moment of death.

"To rise, to fall, to glide away, has often been the last conscious sensation recalled by those who seemed to be dying, but have afterwards been brought back to life. Pieron has noted this sensation at the moment of death in a number of cases, usually accompanied by a sense of well-being. The cases he describes were mostly tuberculosis, and included individuals of both sexes, and with atheistic as well as religious beliefs. In all, the last sensation to which expression was given was one of flying, of moving upwards. In some, death was peaceful, in others painful."

HENRY VIVIAN'S MESSAGE.

Queer things get into the cable despatches from London some times. For instance in a late cable message we have this: "Henry Vivian, back from his tour of Canada, states that he is asked to deliver the message that Canada strongly protests against the imputation that her loyalty will be in jeopardy unless tariff reform or colonial preference is adopted."

We are not aware that Canada has been "protesting" in this fashion. No one in Canada devotes much time or thought to any imputation upon Canadian loyalty, present or prospective. If such were heard in Canada they would simply provoke laughter and derision. We make our own tariffs to suit ourselves and are well content to have the British people at home do the same. Nothing could be stiffer than the contention which has strangely found its way into political discussion in England, that Canadian loyalty would be on the slightest degree affected by the adoption or rejection of what is called tariff reform over there.

From this small corner of the Dominion, at least, the introduction of a protective tariff in the United Kingdom would be regarded as a mistake, in view of our own experiences in this island during thirty years past under so-called protection. But it would have no more effect upon our loyalty to the Flag and the Empire than would a day's sunshine or a passing shower of rain.

One reason for the early beginning of the Parliamentary session at Ottawa this year is that the work may be completed in time to enable the Prime Minister and others to attend the King's Coronation and at the Imperial Conference. The Coronation has now been fixed for June 22. The Conference may occur before or after the Coronation, the exact date of the meeting not being yet made public. It is expected that the Premier, the Finance Minister, the Minister of Militia and the Minister of Marine will attend the Conference.
