HORSE NOTES

(Held over from Saturday's issue) Coun. J. J. Gaudet, of Summerside, has purchased from "Tommy" Hayes, of St. John, the classy gelding Frankie Bogash, 3.18 1/2, and has brought him home where he is admired by all who have seen him. Frankie Bogash was bought at the New England Speed Sale a few weeks ago by Mr. Hayes. He is royally bred and in the hands of a skilled trainer should develop great speed.

Lady Mac, a four year old by McDougall, 2.10 1/2, dam Lady Resolute, 2.10 1/2, has been brought to Summerside by Captain Fred Peters. Lady Mac is a good looker, and much is expected from her in the way of speed. She has a record of 2.21 1/2.

Frank Boutillier, the Halifax horseman, bought two fine specimens of horseflesh at the Old Glory Sale in New York. One is Lexington, 2.14, and the other Kilkirk, 2.29 1/2, a five year old by Bingara. Rexheart's record was made in a winning race on a half mile track, and he was second to Del Reg in 2.05 1/2 on the mile track at Lexington this fall. He is by Greatheart, and is a bay stallion eight years old. Frank Boutillier should make a good thing out of the investment.

Harry O'Brien calls attention to the fact that in the review of meetings held on Maritime tracks last year the successful racing held on the Aliberton Driving Park in August was overlooked. The four horses to get into the list on the island he says, were put in at that meeting, Brazilian Jr. who took a mark off 2.29 1/2, in the third heat, and Keltic, 2.29 1/2, in the fourth heat of the 2.40 trot. Mayor Todd also set the track record at 2.20 in the free-for-all, after losing the first heat to Vesta Boy in 2.21 1/2.

Dr. Christopher, of Tignish, now of Boston, purchased at the Old Glory Sale in New York last week an exceedingly handsome filly two years old, sired by Peter Bilken, 2.07 1/2, half brother to Captain Aubrey. This filly was one of the gems of the sale, shows a lot of natural speed and will no doubt train to a low record if given an opportunity. She should make a valuable brood mare. She was shipped to Dr. Christopher's home in Tignish after the sale.

Mr. John Richards has imported from New York the well known trotting mare Mundy C., with a race record of 2.09 1/2 made in 1913. Mundy was one of the choice things of the sale as she was at the sale the fall of 1913 when she was sold for \$4,500 and brought by Mr. H. Oliver of Pittsburg, the present owner of the great horse Peter Scott. Mr. Oliver used Mundy as a roadster and for matinee races at which she was very successful never having met defeat. Mundy is a typical representative of the high-class trotter and roadster, a good size, attractive in appearance with natural style and action and a mouth of velvet. She has perfect manners, is jealous and has perfect manners, is fearless of all objects and can be driven by any one. She is credited with a great brush on the road and needs no boots, nothing but the harness. Mr. Richards purchased her for a driver and for breeding purposes. She should be valuable as a brood mare as her dam Laura McGregor produced four in the list and is by that great horse, Robert McGregor, the monarch of the home stretch. Mundy will be bred to Captain Aubrey next spring, and the produce should prove of great value.

GAME BIRDS OF P. E. ISLAND

At the quarterly meeting of the Fish and Game Association of Prince Edward Island held a few evenings ago and already reported in the Guardian, the following letter of regret from Mr. F. W. Hyndman to the president, Mr. A. E. Morrison, was read:—

Sir—This being the day of the quarterly meeting of your Association, I intended putting in an appearance thereat, but circumstances prevent my doing so. I learn from nearly all sections of this island that the game birds are rapidly disappearing. This is a very regrettable fact, and in my opinion steps should at once be taken to prevent it.

I had the honour of being your first president, and took considerable interest in the preservation of our game, but unfortunately the public do not seem to encourage its protection and the province will lose an important asset if present conditions are allowed to prevail.

I may say I have in my day shot and killed game from Labrador and Newfoundland, in every country bordering on the ocean down to Demarara in the Southern Continent. I have killed game on the other side of the Atlantic in England, Scotland and Ireland, and in Spain, Sicily, Italy, Morocco, Tunis, Egypt and Syria, and wish to say the biggest bag I ever made in one day was 40 quills from London, in the County of Surrey—with a population of 6,000,000. The bag consisted of pheasants, partridges and hares.

I mention this simply to show what can be done by protection of game when properly enforced. I paid five guineas for my season's license to carry a gun on that occasion. By this you will see if the inhabitants of this island wish their game birds protected, they must agree to pay for the privilege. If the game disappears the island will lose many summer visitors and the inhabitants sustain a loss they can hardly estimate.

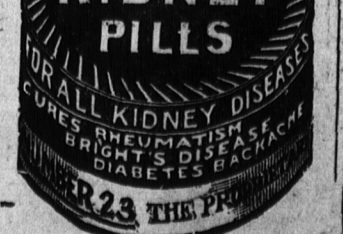

GENIUS OF FRANCE

Declaring that France cannot be beaten Gouverneur Morris, the novelist, now in France, says:—

"The history of this war will show that no amount of method, weight of men, guns and preparation really stood a glint of a show against a thousand years of military genius and tradition and a thousand years of naval genius. They are very cool. They might do with him as they did with Napoleon. It would all be very judicial and unalterable and stolid and excruciatingly unpleasant for him." "He'll never let himself be taken." And every one is agreed on that.

WHAT CANADA PAYS!

SOLDIERS PAY AND ALLOWANCES, CONDITIONS OF ENLISTMENT PROVISION FOR WIVES, MOTHERS AND CHILDREN

Canada is determined that her sons shall be as well paid and their families as well cared for, as a grateful and wealthy country can afford. The scale of pay for Overseas Service, the allowances from the Patriotic Fund, and the Pensions, are on a more liberal basis than those of any other country engaged in the war.

SCALE OF PAY

Table with columns: RANK, Pay per day, Field Allowance per day, Separation Allowance per month. Rows for Sergeants, Corporals, Privates, Buglers, Drummers etc.

The men are, of course, fed and clothed by the Government. The Separation Allowance is the sum paid by the Government to the wife of each enlisted man, or to the widowed mother if the son is unmarried and is her sole support. This is in addition to part of his pay which is reserved for her.

One-half of a soldier's pay is withheld by the Government and paid to his dependents. This ensures that at least \$35.00 per month is paid by the Government to the wife of each soldier.

THE PATROTIC FUND

The Patriotic Fund has been created to assist those dependents of a soldier who need more help than the Government gives. From this Fund the following sums are paid if the need exists:—

Table with columns: Category, Amount. Rows for Wives, Children of widowers, Mothers of unmarried men, Children of married men according to age and number in family.

Ladies representing the Patriotic Fund pay regular visits to families of men on Overseas Service, and give friendly advice and practical help in case of need. Many employers have pledged themselves to give preference to returned soldiers when engaging men.

PENSIONS

The Canadian scale of pensions range for private soldier, from \$75.00 per year for certain minor injuries to \$204.00 for total disability. In case of death \$22.00 a month is paid to the widow, and \$5.00 a month for each child. A widowed mother whose son was her whole support receives \$22.00 a month.
