8 RULES TO PREVENT MOTORCAR ACCIDENTS.

The eight rules which the children in the schools of Massachusetts are required to memorize for their own safety are given below. The rules were drafted by the officials of the Automobile Legal Association.

Before crossing a street, stop; first look to the left, then to the right, and if safe go ahead.

If playing in a street remember you have selected the most dangerous place possible, and that public streets are not made to play in.

In playing in the street bear in mind that automobiles come swiftly and silently, and if they strike you are very apt to kill you.

If standing in the middle of the street and automobiles are coming both ways, keep perfectly still.

The danger in stealing a ride is that if you are not thrown off, you are apt to be run over by another vehicle when you jump off.

In case anyone is struck by an automobile, first take the number, but be sure to take it accurately.

If you throw a stone at an automobile you may injure the occupants, or cause the driver to lose control; besides it is mean and cowardly. Don't do it.

Always look after a younger child because the younger cannot think quickly and does not know the danger.

TUBERCULOSIS SANITARIUM—With the arrival in Charlottetown on Thursday night of Dr. A. F. Miller, Superintendent of the Provincial Sanitarium of Kentville, N. S., some definite progress will now be made in the matter of the erection of the tuberculosis sanitarium which will owe its being to the munificence of the Hon. Charles Dalton. Dr. Miller will assist the Sanitarium Committee, at whose invitation he has come, in the selection of the site of the sanitarium. For this purpose the committee have got options on several properties in the direction of North West shore and that vicinity. With Dr. Miller the committee propose to go out to these places on Monday and make the selection of the most suitable for the site of the sanitarium. Dr. Miller has also consented to give the committee his help in the important matter of the architectural plans for the institution. The committee will in this direction also have the assistance of Mr. Scopes, a prominent architect of the United States who was concerned in the laying out of the Sanitarium at Saranac Lake New York. Mr. Scopes will accompany the committee on their mission on Monday.

S. O. T.—The Grand Division, Sons of Temperance, met in Granville, July 15, the G. W. P. Arthur Simpson presiding. Grand Scribe J. F. Proft gave a very interesting report. Some important business was done in dealing with the state of order. A vigorous discussion was called up by a statement made that there was more drinking now than in former years. Reference was made to recent events that show that the temperance sentiment is rising higher and higher. The recent appointment made by the Temperance Alliance of a Field Secretary was warmly approved and supported. The Grand Division voted the sum of \$25 for the quarter for the work of the Temperance Alliance. A public meeting was held in the evening which was largely attended, the building being filled to its utmost capacity. G. W. P. Arthur Simpson was in the chair. A fine program of solos and recitations was carried out by a choir of young ladies. Mr. Wigmore delivered an address which was full of heartfelt enthusiasm. Mr. Tahton replied and gave a fine speech on temperance as a value of life. His picture of a child and its worth was very picturesque, yet true in its tragic reality. The next speaker was Rev. W. D. Wilson, whose subject was temperance and social life. You may meet a man, says the speaker, in religion and yet never be able to pull aside the mask which hides his true identity. You may meet a man in politics; and yet never know him. But when you meet a man in his home life and see the way he meets his wife and family, then his true manhood is revealed. It is here where we meet the difficulty in temperance work. Temperance has marred our social life and is robbing it of its joys, rights and privileges, also. The speaker then went on to point out some of the snares and pitfalls which this evil leads to. By illustration and incident he presented his subject to the people. The singing of the National Anthem brought a very successful meeting to an end.

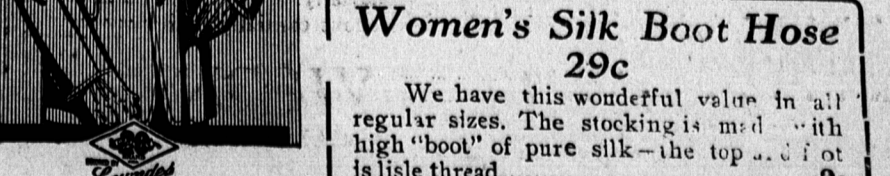
