-PROMINENT ISLANDER RETURNS-Senator Daniel Riley of High River, Alberta, left by morning express train last week for his home in High River, Alberta, accompanied by Mrs. Riley, having spent a two weeks' vacation with Senator Riley's brother George and other numerous friends at Malpeque. The Senator is one of the many active business men who have grown and prospered with Western Canada. He has seen the wilderness flourish like the Green Bay tree. His success is an object lesson to the youth of P. E. Island, of what can be accomplished by hard, faithful work, with the "will to win" actuating every move. He graduated from P. W. College, taught school for a term, left for the Canadian West in 1882. He was a dispatch rider under General Strangle in the big rebellion headed by Louis Riel in 1885-making a 40 mile ride in every 24 hours, through a country infested with hostile Indians and half breeds,-but being a good rider and a good pistol shot, fear was reduced to a momentarily. He is President of the Alberta Stock Breeders' Association, and has been a director of the famous Calgary Stampede since its inception about twenty years ago. He had to leave High River immediately after returning, as a delegate of the Stock Breeders' Association to Washington, to confer with President Hoover's Cabinet about the proposed tariff barrier against Canadian cattle. It so transpired that Senator Riley showed the Western States cattleman some time ago that the proposed high tariff would "boomerang" against them; hence their request for his co-operation with them at Washington. He has been a mining prospector always and is deeply interested in the development of the mineral areas of the great north country. The Senator promises himself to spend some part of his future summers in his native province.

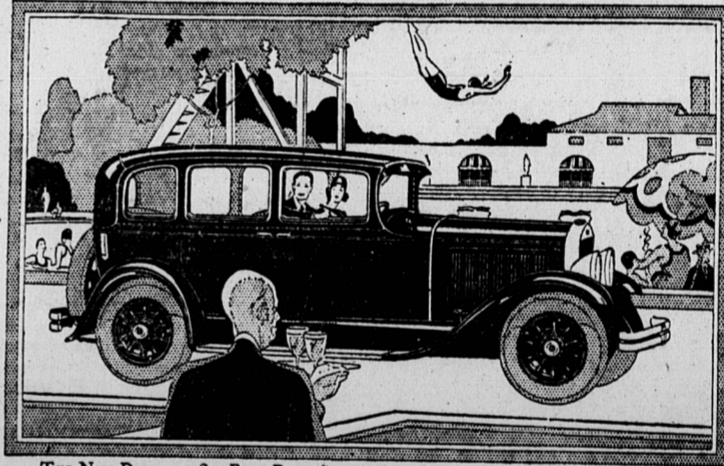
