Will Co-operate In Scheme, But Will Protect Rights

QUEBEC, Nov. 24—Quebec Government is "willing to cooperate heartily in the establishment of a sound and fair system of unemployment insurance," but at the same time will safeguard Quebec Province's "full autonomy," Premier Maurice Duplessis said in a letter delivered in Ottawa today in reply to a communication from Prime Minister King.

Prime Minister King communicated with 11 provincial premiers Nov. 5 seeking their views on a Federal Government proposal to set up national unemployment insurance. The Prime Minister asked the provincial governments whether they would agree to amendment of the British North America Act to empower Ottawa authorities to establish the national machinery.

Apart from Quebec, five provinces already have expressed agreement with the Prime Minister's proposal to amend the British North America Act for his insurance proposal. They are British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario and Prince Edward Island.

Credit Union Is Organized At Caledonia

Organization of the Caledonia Credit Union, Ltd., took place Monday, November 22 at a well-attended meeting held in the Caledonia school. Mr. Charles Walker presided.

Dr. J. T. Croteau reviewed the subject of the credit union and explained the organization procedure. The by-laws were then adopted. They provide for admittance as members of all the residents of Caledonia, Brooklyn, Glenmartin, Glenwilliam and Lewes school districts and associations of such persons.

The par value of shares is set at five dollars each, payable when subscribed or in installments of twenty-five cents, payable semi-monthly.

Seek Elimination Of Canadian Duty On U. S. Anthracite

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23—Representative Patrick J. Boland, of Scranton, Pa., reported today State Secretary Hull was "very much in favor" of negotiating with Canada to eliminate the tax on anthracite entering the Dominion.

"The state department is 100 per cent for that," said Boland. "It's one of their major objectives."

Boland saw Hull before going to a meeting of anthracite producers, mine workers and representatives of the federal and state governments who discussed sundry proposals for rehabilitation of the hard coal industry.

United States anthracite entering Canada is now subject to a customs duty of 50 cents a ton against free entry given hard coal from the countries of the British Empire under the preferential tariff.

Anthracite imports during the calendar year 1930 amounted to 3,499,700 tons valued at \$17,788,829. Of that total United States provided 1,701,000 tons valued at \$9,959,785. Bulk of the remainder came from Empire countries.

Y SECRETARY URGES PARENT TEACHER ASSN

Mr. Norville E. Luck Addresses Meeting Of Mothers At Y. M. C. A. Building.

"Our school children are impeded in making their adjustments to life through lack of frequent counselling between teachers and parents," suggested Norville E. Luck, General Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. in addressing a meeting of mothers at the Association Building yesterday.

Problems of teachers, scholars and parents would in many instances, he stated, find their solution in the programme of a Parent-Teachers Association and an appeal was made for support of any move in the community to establish such an association.

The meeting was held under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. Advisory Committee for work with women and girls and the purpose was to acquaint mothers and friends of girls enrolled in Y. M. C. A. classes with the purpose of the Association and the programme in which girls are enrolled. Miss Lella Worthy, Physical Director of the girls' classes outlined the plan of her work and emphasized the need of physical education for growing girls.

C. N. Steamships In Maritime Ports

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 24—The last vessel of the Canadian National Steamships to leave the local port for the season will be the Vagabond cruise ship Chomedy which is expected to get away on Friday at 5 P.M. passengers being permitted to commence embarking at 3 P.M. The Chomedy is bound via Halifax to the American colony of Puerto Rico and the British Colonies of Barbados, Trinidad and British Guiana.

On this trip she will make an extra call at Pointe à Pitre Guadeloupe in the French West Indies and after completing her northbound voyage at Halifax will make that point her port of departure and arrival during the winter months. Among the passengers on the present voyage is A. D. McLaren of Toronto and immediately after his return is planning to sail again on the same steamer from Halifax on or about January 8. Nov Scotia Agrees To Aid In Scheme

(By The Canadian Press)

HALIFAX, Nov. 24 — Premier Angus L. Macdonald of Nova Scotia issued a statement tonight saying "the provincial cabinet yesterday decided that it would agree to the suggestion that an amendment be made to the British North America Act giving the Dominion Government power to put into effect a scheme of unemployment insurance, national in scope."

The Premier also announced that "some days ago the Provincial Government had expressed to Ottawa its approval of a brief prepared by the fruit-growers of the Annapolis Valley, relative to the preference of Empire fruit in the British markets."

"About two weeks ago a delegation of fruit-growers interviewed the Government and discussed with them the British preference, and subsequently the fruit-growers' brief was presented to the Provincial Government."
