USE FINGER PRINT SYSTEM IN BANKS

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 11.—By their finger prints, depositors in Spokane banks will be recognized in the future. Six of the principal banks have decided to install the system, following approval of the plan by the American Bankers' Association. W. D. Vincent, cashier of the Old National Bank of Spokane, has studied the finger print system as applied to banking for five years and was instrumental in securing its approval by the national association. As a means of identification the system is believed to be far more effective than the use of signatures. The finger print test is applied by bankers by placing the tips of the fingers and thumbs of both hands on a card designed especially for the purpose.
