Entries close Friday, June 22nd, 1928. Horses must be eligible on that date. Entrance money must accompany the entry.

All races mile heats; to be raced on the 3-heat plan, viz.—10% of each purse will be awarded the winner, the remainder to be divided in three equal parts, one part to be raced for each heat. In the event of there being three heat-winners, they shall race a fourth heat to determine the winner of the event.

All purses divided 50, 25, 15 and 10 per cent. Entry fee 5% of Purse, 5% additional from Winners.

Two entries of the same ownership may start in the same race, providing the full 5% is paid on each starter, the drivers having the approval of the Judges.
