

Impression Of P. E. Island.

A hasty trip through the Island province is for so few comments though space prevents our doing the justice. The season there though not so early as on the mainland, is ahead of the average, and the country generally looking very well.

A brief visit to the western end of the Island impresses one with the idea that the whole attention of the people has not been given to agriculture, and this is true, for fishing has been more or less a remunerative occupation.

The land except in a few localities is very light and somewhat leachy, but will grow splendid potato crops, and with stock husbandry and the growth of clover it is good land for ordinary crops as a man need wish. Like all the rest of the Island it is naturally well drained, and of an open friable texture, that makes it easily cultivated. All it needs is frequent and intelligent farming with the elements of fertility and the proper order of arable matter, such as clover, or of manure occasionally.

Live stock in that section has not received very much attention, and the sheep especially show a lack of breeding for a special purpose, and consequently cannot be so profitable as better bred and better fed animals.

We think though that the introduction of Farmers' Institute meetings and Agricultural Societies will do very much to increase the desire among these people for larger crops and better stock.

Mr. John Richards, of Biddeford has a fine herd of Aberdeen Angus cattle that will help to induce good breeding stock. Agricultural Societies were organized at Tisbury and Wellington by Hon. B. Rogers, Comptroller of Agriculture during our visit.

Eastward from Summerside the area of improved land increases and live stock has a greater percentage of pure bred blood.

Our first stop was at Fredericton where a number of farmers gathered and organized a society. Here grass was looking better than west of Summerside and other crops were coming well. From here we drove across country to Clifton not far from Stanley Bridge on the North Shore of the Island. This is one of the most rolling parts of the Island and is an excellent sheep country. At Clifton and Stanley Bridge a good meeting was held and a society organized. Some very excellent Ayrshire and Jersey grade cows were seen in this district and crops were looking very fine. The Stanley Bridge cheese factory is among the largest and most successful in the province. In company with the Commissioner of Agriculture we drove back next day by way of Stanley Bridge to Bradalbane and nearly all the way through a most excellent section. The fields were well watered, well drained and when farmed with skill are producing very good crops.

We next went eastward from Charlottetown through Pownal to Vernon River. This is probably one of the most highly developed parts of the Garden Province. Large barns and neat homesteads line the road, and the fields are either producing large crops or with a thick clover bottom are pasturing some of the best milk herds we have seen anywhere.

Vernon River is practically a continuation of Pownal and farms and crops and stock all show intelligent farming. Mr. P. Irving M. L. C. of Vernon River Bridge is one of the largest island farmers and he is devoting a considerable area to orcharding having now some ten or twelve acres in apple trees. Adjoining his farm is the Vernon River Cheese Factory that is getting the largest supply of milk of any individual factory in eastern Canada, on the Monday before our call 42,000 lbs. of milk had been taken in, with 39,000 lbs. on Tuesday morning. Since this that record has been exceeded. Lack of time prevented a more extended trip but we learned that everywhere on the Island the prospects of crops were most excellent with the exception of the hay and some grain in the western end where the drought had been usually protracted. We are glad to hear that under recent rains conditions there are improving.

Prince Edward Island, is par excellence a live stock country, and farmers there will make no mistake in breeding more cattle, sheep and swine, and also going extensively into poultry raising. A few years ago the province was noted for raising good horses, but to-day they are very hard to find; we think our friends there cannot too soon begin to use the best heavy draught and carriage sites they can import upon well selected mares. If they do they will soon regain their reputation.

This year will probably be the banner dairy year and the good pastures with improvement of cows is responsible; in this connection we should like to see every dairyman growing some green feed to give his cows in July and August. There is no reason why if proper precautions are taken that there should be such a drop in the milk supply at the factories in these two months. Protection from flies and plenty of peas and oats or vetches, and later, corn, will prevent this great loss or shrinkage. Where corn stalks are fed exclusively care should be taken to add wheat bran or some nitrogenous grain or oilcake to the ration; corn stalks do not contain all the elements necessary to make milk as do peas and oats.
