127 Bills Introduced

Some 127 measures were introduced in the Senate and House of Commons of which nearly all became law. Among the bills to fall by the wayside were two designed to legalize sweepstakes. A hospital sweepstakes measure, introduced and passed in the Senate was thrown open to a non-party debate in the House of Commons where it was completely snowed under. Prime Minister R. B. Bennett and Rt. Hon. MacKenzie King found themselves in agreement against this measure. Another similar measure introduced in the Commons never got first reading.

Several bills designed to revive patents and confer them upon certain parties and exclusive rights were among the bills killed.

There was no advanced railway legislation at this session although two measures to authorize amalgamation of Canadian Pacific and Canadian National, and the Telegraph services appeared on the order paper only to disappear when it was decided they could await another session.

Unemployment Relief

The Government's authority to deal by order-in-council with unemployment relief requirements was extended for another year. Under this act the government guaranteed the operations of the Canadian co-operative wheat producers in this country and assisted organizations of producers to bring about a more orderly and profitable marketing of their products. This bill which sets up a Dominion Marketing Board to work in co-operation with provincial and local boards, provides machinery for the marketing of the products of the land and waters and the forests may be distributed both locally and abroad on a highly organized and systematized plan.

Marketing Legislation

Extraordinary powers are conferred upon the Minister of Agriculture and the Government to assist organizations of producers to bring about a more orderly and profitable marketing of their products. This bill which sets up a Dominion Marketing Board to work in co-operation with provincial and local boards, provides machinery for the marketing of the products of the land and waters and the forests may be distributed both locally and abroad on a highly organized and systematized plan.

Wheat Grading

A long standing dispute over separate grading of garnet wheat was decided this session. The portions of the prairies where this type of wheat is grown extensively had hitherto been graded under separate grades. Two new grades will be established, number one and number two garnet.

Tariff Amendments

Amendments to the Customs and Customs Tariff Act, put through at the end of the session, will provide relief for the United States exporter who wishes to place his goods in the Canadian market. The effect of these measures is to give the Governor-in-Council authority to ignore excise taxes and duties in the exporting countries in estimating the fair market value for duty purposes of goods entering Canada under the general tariff.

Franchise Act Amended

Economy and Finance

It was a great session for economists and financial experts with not only the decennial revision of the statutes under which chartered banks operate but in addition the legislation setting up a Central Bank, amendments to the Dominion Notes Act to enable the Government to issue additional money to the extent of some \$70,000,000, and an amendment to the legislation controlling loan companies, designed to keep the charges within a reasonable maximum.

The Central Bank will be privately owned with ownership of shares limited to 50 shares per individual and no banker or bank employee permitted to become a shareholder. The capital at the start will be \$5,000,000 and the dividends earned in excess of 4 1/2 percent will revert to the public treasury.

A large measure of Government control will be exercised over the Bank in that the governor, deputy governor and seven directors will be appointed by Government appointments. The governor and deputy governor by the shareholders will require the endorsement of the Government. The by-laws and all resolutions of the board of directors will be subject to approval by the Government and the Deputy Minister of Finance will be a member of the board without voting power.

All gold held by the chartered banks except what is required for external commitments will be turned over to the Central Bank at the normal rate of \$20.67 per ounce regardless of the market price at the time, the profit from the appreciated price going to the Government. Over a course of 10 years the note issue, now the prerogative of the banks and Dominion, will be gradually taken over by the Central Bank.

Farm Loan

A broad scheme of refinancing to release the farming population from their burden of debt was launched in two companion measures. One would set up machinery whereby debtor farmers may go through a compromise with their creditors along the lines of bankruptcy without the stigma of bankruptcy attaching to them and without cost to themselves. The other measure amends the Canada Farm Loan Act to widen the variety of collateral that may be accepted on mortgages and permit of second mortgages by which the farmer may secure working cash.

In those provinces taking advantage of this measure, a debtor farmer would be able to secure a compromise of his debts in which his ability to pay would be decided by a judicial board of review if necessary, and an agreement reached binding upon himself and his creditors.

Dominion Notes Act

Amendments to the Dominion Notes Act, to operate pending the coming into existence of the Central Bank, will permit the issue of currency to the extent of \$120,000,000 against the gold coverage now held against only \$50,000,000, this in keeping with a resolution adopted at last summer's world economic conference in London.

At present the statute permits issue of money on the basis of 25 percent coverage of gold at the normal value of 27.50 per ounce, up to \$5,000,000, and thereafter on a basis of dollar for dollar gold backing. The amendment will permit issue of \$120,000,000 in money with only 25 percent backing by gold, and dollar for dollar thereafter. It is understood the new money will be used to pay for the \$40,000,000 public works programme.

Insurance Legislation

Much controversy, particularly in the Senate, developed over the insurance legislation. The new measures were drafted to come within the jurisdiction of the Dominion through previous legislation thrown out by the Privy Council in the provinces.

Objection was raised by Canadian insurance companies to a provision which would allow Lloyds to obtain a Dominion charter without making the customary deposit with the Insurance Department. It was eventually withdrawn by the Commons so that Lloyds will not be able to secure a Dominion charter but will be in a position to operate as at present under provincial charters.

Translations Bureau

A measure sponsored by Hon. C. H. 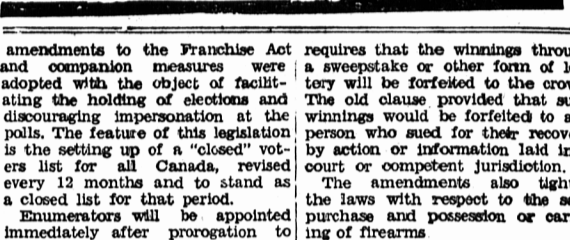

Mass Buying Inquiry

The mass buying committee was the most important of the session, not only because it ventured out new ground but because of the disclosures of improper business practices and low wage scales. Under the chairmanship of the Minister of Trade and Commerce, Hon. H. H. Stevens, the committee heard evidence nearly four months and will continue later as a Royal Commission.

There were several branches to the investigation but the most important those bearing on department stores. Auditors were placed in large retail and mail order establishments from coast to coast and reported on the financial set-up of the organizations, dividends paid, capital structure and also on buying and selling practices. Then efforts were made to trace a transaction, a woman's dress for instance, from the factory to the bargain counter, noting labor conditions along the way and the profits.

Soldier Settlement Act

Amendments to the Soldiers Settlement Act places lands held by the soldier settlement board on the same basis as any other property for taxation purposes and gives to the settler the same privilege of recovering his property if lost to him through action to secure taxes in arrears.

Extensive Public Works

Fulfilling a promise made last fall the Government brought down, late in the session, a schedule of proposed public works as a relief measure and means for stimulating business and industrial recovery. The total expenditure in all provinces to be slightly over \$40,000,000. The works, mostly buildings but with a portion for roads and waterfront improvements, are scattered throughout the Dominion.

Dominion Companies Act

Another important bill was the Dominion Companies Act, several years in preparation and subject of at least two Dominion-Parliament conferences. The measure harmonizes the regulations under which Companies may secure charters but will require common enactment by the provinces before its full effectiveness can be applied since companies may operate as readily under provincial charters as Dominion.
