CHIVALRY IS ONLY HUMBUG.

LONDON, July 14.—The Women's Suffrage bill debate in the House of Commons is being followed with keen interest by Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont, mother of the Duchess of Marlborough.

"Our methods are peaceful," she said, "because there is no need for militant tactics, we are never unable to get permission to approach the legislators, your idea is to spread the movement by educating the people."

"I have been a believer in women's suffrage all my life. The argument that votes for women would destroy sex chivalry is absurd, because the so-called chivalry of men is all humbug. In America you have only got to watch the way the men push the women aside in street cars to see how much this 'chivalry' is worth."

SHARE HUSBAND'S EARNINGS.

"One of the things I should like to see legalized for women is the right of the wife to share equally with her husband in community or property without his wife's consent. Another is equal rights of the wife over her children. A third is the same right for woman as for man to sign legal documents."

"We are not living in the first century, but in the twentieth. We have got to face things as they are at the present time. The wife does all the work for the husband and gets no money for it. She ought to get half of what the man earns. The wife ought to be a man's equal, not his servant."

"The reason why housework has always been regarded as a degrading (free labor) in America there are 6,000,000 self-supporting women, and in New York State alone the self-supporting women number 1,000,000."

"In America," added Mrs. Belmont, "we are more fearful of offending conventional codes than are the women in England. The reason is that the suffrage movement here has been backed by women of standing in society whose position is assured. In America we have only just begun to attract the wealthy classes. We feel in America that the method adopted in England have been quite justifiable."

"We are following the progress of the suffrage bill debate with great interest. The result will mean much to the movement, because I cannot regard it as possible that if Englishmen grant the vote to women, Americans will not care to refuse it."

LITTLE HOPE OF SAVING THE LEANING TOWER.

PISA, Italy, July 16.—The royal engineers appointed to investigate the condition of the famous leaning tower of Pisa reported yesterday that the inclination of the bell in the tower has recently increased eight inches, owing to the weakness of the foundation. The engineers declare the historic old tower is on the verge of a collapse and that it is extremely doubtful if it can be repaired. The ringing of the bells in the tower has been ordered stopped, because the vibrations thus caused threatened to throw down the structure. The Campanile, or leaning tower, was erected in 1174-1180. It was in this structure that Galileo worked out the theory of the pendulum.

LADY CARLISLE A GREAT FARMER

LONDON, July 16.—Lady Carlisle, who presides at the annual meeting of the Women's Liberal Federation, is one of the most accomplished operators of the day and is, moreover, according to M. A. P., an extremely skilful and practical farmer.

It is not so many years since she took into her hands several thousand acres of land on the Castle Howard estate which had remained unutilized from time immemorial. By her orders steam cultivation was introduced, the soil was lime and artificially manured, with the result that it now produces magnificent crops.

She personally superintends everything, and when she is in residence at Castle Howard, it is by no means an unusual sight to see the hall and staircase lined with people waiting an audience with her in her business room. No trifle is ever too insignificant for her attention.

It often happens that the Countess of Carlisle takes her place in the pulpit, and in the private chapel attached to Naworth Castle, the family seat in Cumberland, she has been known to conduct the whole service, sermon and all.

Temperance is one of the favorite themes of the Countess, and in this as in other matters she has always backed up her opinions by action. In her opinion the excessive number of public houses is the greatest obstacle to temperance reform and as evidence of her practical belief in this she has herself closed many public houses, reopening them as coffee palaces.

Her Ladyship has always been a strong supporter of the women's movement. She has carried her conviction that women should not be supplanted by men in work which
