IN MEMORIAM

CHARLES WESLEY STRONG

In the death of Mr. Charles Wesley Strong, which occurred at his home on Monday morning, Summerside has lost one of its oldest and most highly respected residents here ever took a deep interest in the town's affairs.

The late Mr. Strong was born at St. John, N. B., on July 2nd, 1829, a son of the late Rev. John B. Strong, who was the first clergyman sent to Canada by the British Conference, and who for many years was pastor of St. James St. Methodist Church, Montreal.

The year this province went into Confederation, he was appointed Customs Collector at Summerside, under the P. E. I. government, retaining the position when this province joined Canada.

As a member of the Methodist church Mr. Strong was for many years devoted to its varied interests. For fifty years he was Superintendent of the Sunday School. As a citizen he was interested in all that appertained to the welfare of the community.

The late Mr. Strong was twice married, his first wife being formerly Miss Martha Wright, of Bedeque, who predeceased him 1870. His second wife, who survives him, was formerly Miss Treadwell, of St. John. One son, Allen W., Montreal, and a daughter, Miss Jessie W., at home also survive.

LIVED AS RECLUSE.

When Man Jilted Her She Changed Her Dress—Couldn't Have a Man so Tried to be One.

The strange case of a woman who donned man's attire and led the life of a recluse after she had been jilted and vowed she would have nothing more to do with men, came to light yesterday when Richard E. Shaefer, of No. 46 Fresh Pond road Mespath, N. J., appeared in Newark to take care of the body and effects of his sister, Miss Anna L. Shaefer, who was found suffocated by firemen in her home at No. 303 Morris Avenue, Newark, last night.

Beside the woman had been found the body of a faithful black and tan terrier. Her body was clothed in a ragged pair of trousers, three vests and a seamy old coat. In every pocket of her attire and sewed in the lining of her tattered clothing, bills of large and small denominations were found. They were dug out of crevices in the floors and found under piles of newspapers and rubbish throughout the house.

Fifteen years ago the woman was jilted, according to her brother, by a now prosperous business man of Newark. She vowed at that time she never would have anything more to do with men, and she kept her promise. She lived alone in the Morris Avenue house, and save for the one room which she used the three story house was almost barren of furniture when she died. Neighbors told the police that the woman donned man's clothes more than ten years ago and that she seldom left the house except after dark or early in the morning.

No one in the neighborhood could recall having seen her enter or leave the house during the last two years. The police learned the address of the woman's brother, and sent for him. In the eleven rooms of the house there were piles of newspapers, but no furniture, except two stoves, one chair and a table in the room she occupied. There was not even a bed in this room, but there was a large pile of papers in one corner, which the woman had evidently used to sleep on. Boxes of dresses and other feminine apparel which evidently had not been worn for years were found in the closets of several of the rooms. No one could be found who had ever heard her say why she discarded them for the attire of the sex, one member of which had been the cause of her hermitage.

MANURE SHOULD BE SPREAD WHEN HAULED

The common practice of hauling manure to the field and throwing it into heaps has several serious objections. In the first place, the work of spreading is increased, as it must be handled twice. When manure is so piled there is danger of injurious fermentation, with consequent losses of nitrogen. In addition, the leaching from such piles increases the amount of plant food directly beneath, and produces a rank growth. It is not uncommon to find the next season's crop spotted by a more luxuriant growth and deeper green color on the areas where the manure heaps have been placed. It is highly undesirable, as it causes the crop to mature at different ages, and also endangers loss by lodging. A crop with a large plantfood supply will have a longer season of growth than one with a meagre supply. If the manure is spread directly from the wagon, the unevenness of growth is largely avoided and the cost of labor reduced. When very coarse manure is used, it should be dragged to break up the larger lumps and thus spread it more uniformly.—Wisconsin Experiment Station.

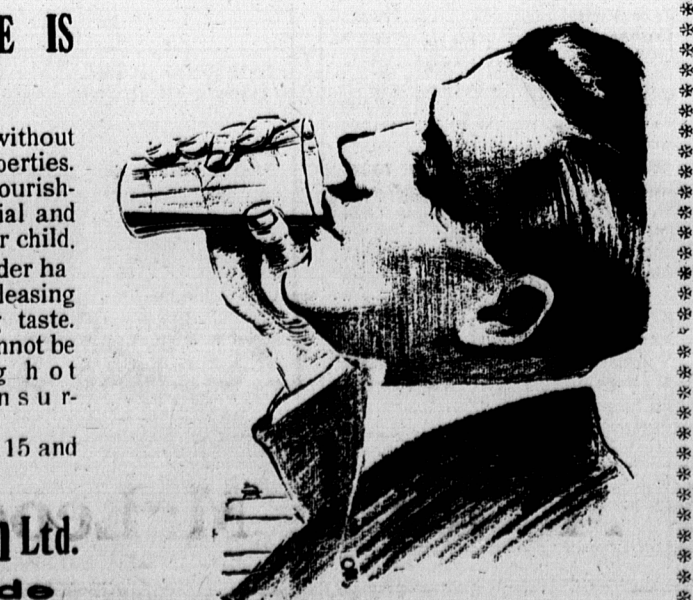
