

COMPLETION OF RIFLE MATCHES

A Splendid Closing Day for the Final Shooting of the P. R. A.—An Exciting Contest Over Ladies' Challenge Cup.

The Provincial Rifle Matches were concluded yesterday with favorable weather and high scores in order. The last match fired was the Ladies' Challenge Match. In this competition were the thirty-six highest in the special aggregate. It was shot at five p.m. in the presence of a large number of interested spectators among whom were many of the ladies whose representatives were battling for then on the range. Three men each totalled 48 points out of a possible of fifty, namely—Lt. L. H. Beer, J. H. Judson and E. R. Brow. At this time in the contest Capt. McKinnon had seven bulls on score and the excitement began to become intense. His next two shots were bull's and on the last shot depended the winning of the match. He fired and the bullet went within an inch of the bull's eye, making for the Captain a score of 49 out of a possible 50 and winning for Mrs. (Dr.) Jenkins the honor of holding the cup. The enthusiasm of those who witnessed this brilliant finish was appropriately shown by their action in promptly presenting Captain McKinnon and he was kept busy for quite a while accepting well deserved congratulations in his usual gracious manner.

The consolation match for those who had not won a place in the regular match was captured by H. J. Mabon, druggist, of Souris, with a score of 25 points—a possible. Capt. H. M. Davidson's cup was won by Gunner Alfred Seaman, No. 2 Co., 4th C. A. Gunner Seaman is one of our youngest shots but has been making extremely big scores throughout the meet. He is to be congratulated. Gunner Seaman also won the No. 2 Co. Cup. The D. R. A. Silver Medal for the highest score in the Ottawa aggregate was won by Major J. M. Jones. Second place and the Bronze Medal was captured by Sgt. Ernest McInnis of Pownal who is a trooper in the P. E. I. Light Horse. The Governor General's silver medal was won by Major J. M. Jones, of Pownal, and the Bronze medal fell to Sergeant J. A. Moore of Pownal.

ENTIRE CREW WERE DROWNED.

SYDNEY, N. S., Aug. 13.—The battered hull, over which great combbers are continuing to break, lying under the Browning C.H.s of North Linxan Head, is a mute testimony of the lots of seven men in the gale which ravaged the Maritime Provinces coasts during the past two days.

When the giant seas had subsided, boats put off to rescue the crew. They found the Hiscock of Grand Banks, Newfoundland, but of the captain of six men nothing was seen. They had put off in a dory. In the tremendous seas that were running in from the north-east their frail craft must have been swamped, and no hope is felt for their safety.

Two cats and a dog were found huddled in the cabin alive. Had the crew stuck to the vessel, they might have been saved.

BRITISH SHIP SENT TO CRETE

MALTA, Aug. 13.—(Special.)—The British warship Swiftsure has left for the Island of Crete.

The other protecting powers, Russia, Italy and France also will send warships to Crete as an intimation to the Islanders that they are resolved to enforce for Turkey's rights.

DEATHS FROM A FIRE PANIC

Mother Leaps from Window With Child in Her Arms. Both Killed.

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—(Special.)—With her daughter Eva, four years old, in her arms, Mrs. Esther Schwerner jumped from the window of an apartment today and both were killed.

Mrs. Schwerner was panic stricken by a small fire on the third floor of the building which filled the hallway with smoke.

She sent several other children down before the smoke became too thick and then grasping the other child, climbed out on the window ledge.

The horrified spectators in the street called that the fire was out and warned her not to jump, but Mrs. Schwerner was too frightened to heed them.

Both were dashed to the sidewalk. The fire did little damage.

CROWD APPLAUDED WHEN CLOWN WAS HURT

LONDON, Ont., Aug. 12.—While the crowds at the circus here roared with laughter at what they thought was a clown's antics, John Levine, an employee of Barnum and Bailey circus, fell through the temporary flooring which gave way and dropped twenty feet to the ground. He was carried out unconscious while the crowd applauded what they thought was but some more of his fun. The man was taken to the circus hospital, where it was feared he might be internally injured.

SAYS LARGE CITIES CAN'T HAVE TOTAL ABSTINENCE

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—Cardinal Gibbons, head of the Roman Catholic church in the United States and recognized as a hearty supporter of the cause of temperance, last evening said, just before leaving Chicago after having been in the city for several hours.

"I am heartily in sympathy with a wide movement, and I hope it will spread to the most remote corners of the nation. In the rural parts of the country and in the smaller towns and cities there is every sign that the agitation is getting a foothold, which eventually must mean success and widespread prohibition.

"However much I am in favor of total abstinence, I feel that in the large cities such as Chicago it would prove impracticable, and if laws providing for the revocation of licenses were enforced in these cities I fear the result would be surreptitious sale of liquor."

LOST PURSE WITH \$1,000

MONTREAL, August 12.—While en route from the Canadian Pacific railway stockyards hotel, or while in the Windsor station yesterday afternoon, a man Montgomery, a cattle drover of Irish Creek, Ont., lost his pocket-book containing \$1,050, the proceeds of a successful sale at the yards. C. P. R. detectives who are working on the case are inclined to think that the loss was sustained before Mr. Montgomery entered the station and that the book must have been in some way displayed either on the car or before the men boarded it, and that they were followed by thieves who abstracted the wallet during a momentary crush in the car.

PITCHED BATTLE AT FORT WILLIAM.

FORT WILLIAM, Aug. 13.—Eight or ten men were wounded in a pitched battle between the police and the strikers here. The fight was a hot one for some time. A body of C. P. R. Special Police and strikers to the number of two hundred or more, engaged in a pitched battle at the C. P. R. Sheds. The Royal Canadian Rifles left Winnipeg for Fort William yesterday afternoon.

CONFERENCE ON EMPIRE DEFENCE

Nearly Over, Will Meet Again Tuesday Touching Canada's Position.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—(Special.)—The final meeting of the Imperial Defence Conference, so far as Canada is concerned will be held Tuesday next.

The conference is still going on with regard to matters of interest almost entirely to Australia and there is reason to believe that arrangements of an essentially satisfactory nature are in process of completion.

BELLEWARE TOWN WAS DESTROYED

A Hundred Houses, Bank and Lumber Yard Burned. Many Homeless.

MILTON, Del., Aug. 13.—(Special.)—Almost the entire town was destroyed by fire today.

Nearly a hundred houses, a lumber yard and bank building were burned. The loss is \$100,000 and several hundred people are made homeless by the fire.

Aid was summoned from surrounding points, but owing to a wreck on the railroad the fire apparatus could not be brought in time.

Only twelve houses escaped the flames.

P. E. ISLAND LADY IN WEDDING ROMANCE

WORCESTER, Mass., Aug. 12.—What is said to have been a very pretty romance of years standing culminated here in the wedding of Mrs. Lena Bell (Fenher) Rattray, of Postville, P. E. I., and William Arthur Chandler, a prosperous business man of this city. The ceremony was performed last night by Rev. Dr. Matthew S. McCord, pastor of the Westminster United Presbyterian church, at his own residence, the couple being unattended. The return of the marriage certificate this morning disclosed the fact that the ceremony had been performed.

The newly-weds have started for a wedding trip, which is to reach the bride's old home, and the scene of the beginning of the romance, it is said.

BORDEN COMING TO HALIFAX

OTTAWA, August 12.—R. L. Borden, leader of the opposition is expected to return from his vacation trip to Europe on September 4th. J. S. Charbon, the liberal-conservative organizer for Ontario, it here and hopes to arrange for Mr. Borden's presence at the meeting of the conservatives of Western Ontario to Hon W. J. Hanna upon his arrival. It is likely that Mr. Borden will be present upon this occasion, altho he has already arranged for two meetings during September in Halifax county.

2,000 HARVESTERS LEFT MARITIME PROVINCE.

ST. JOHN, August 12.—Five trains, leaving 2,000 men for the harvest fields, left the Union depot here last night. Their passengers hailed from New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia, and were the most intelligent, orderly crowd that ever left the maritime provinces. Thirty special policemen were on guard, so there was no disorder.

PARLIAMENT MEETS NOV. 4TH.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13.—At present it is the intention of the Government to have Parliament open on Thursday, Nov. 4th. The departments are working on the preparation of the estimates with that date in view, and other Sessional business is being prepared that the House may be able to accomplish a considerable amount of useful work before the Christmas holidays in order that prorogation may be reached at a reasonably early date in the Spring.

GRAVE CRISIS STIRS MADRID

Ministers Gave Opposite Orders and Relations Are Strained.

MADRID, Aug. 13.—(Special.)—A ministerial crisis is possible because of the strained relations between the Minister of the Interior and the Minister of War, who, during the disorders at Barcelona issued instructions diametrically opposed.

SPANISH FIGHT WITH THE RIFLES

Rebels are Protected and Suffer Little Loss. A Sally Repulsed.

MELILLA, Aug. 13.—(Special.)—Natives report that although the Spanish artillery is destroying the camps of the Moors it is not causing any great loss of life, as the Rifles have built subterranean chambers and passages in which they take refuge, emerging only when the cannonading is over. The Moors made an attempt last night to cut the Spanish railroad.

Search lights revealed their purpose and they were driven back. There is no evidence of the beginning of General Marina's march into the interior.

PHILIPPINE CIGARS GET CLEAR

SAN FRANCISCO, August 12.—By telegraphic order from Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Reynolds, 50,000 Philippine cigars were released from bond yesterday and admitted free of duty under the tariff laws. This is the first importation from the islands to fall under the new customs provisions relating to Philippine products. The former duty of Philippine cigars was \$45 a thousand. Under the new law 150,000,000 cigars will be admitted annually duty free.

The shipment released yesterday has been held in bond pending the settlement of the tariff question. The duty collected under the old tariff would have amounted to \$20,000.

YESTERDAY'S MARKET WELL ATTENDED

The attendance at the market yesterday was the largest for some time. Just at this time of the year the farmers have a breathing spell between haying and harvest and they apparently took full advantage of their opportunity to visit the city and bring in their produce.

The inside market was brisk, berries being the chief product. Cherries sold at six to eight cents a quart, blueberries at eight to nine cents, raspberries at six to eight cents and strawberries at eight to ten cents. Straw was dull at five to six dollars a ton for pressed and thirty cents a cwt for loose, while pressed hay brought nine fifty to ten dollars a ton and loose brought fifty to fifty-five cents. White oats were scarce at fifty-five to fifty-eight a bus and black at sixty to sixty-three.

ARCHBISHOP TO RETIRE FROM ACTIVE WORK

ST. LOUIS, Mo., August 12.—Archbishop John Joseph Kearns, of the Roman Catholic archdiocese of Dubuque, is to retire from active duty on August 18, when a coadjutor is to be recommended, according to advices received today from St. Paul. His health, it is stated, is the cause of the venerable prelate's action.

I. O. O. F. TO MEET AT TRURO.

ST. JOHN, Aug. 13.—Because of advices that Fredericton was unable to provide a sufficient large hall, the Grand Lodge last night reconsidered its resolution and decided to meet next year in Truro.

THE BATTLE AT FORT WILLIAM

Deadly Attack by Strikers Upon Police Force, Shooting From Cover Upon New Arrivals. Regiment Sent to Scene. Martial Law.

FORT WILLIAM, Aug. 13.—(Special.)—The battle which raged on the streets yesterday between the striking dock handlers and the Canadian Pacific police and in which ten or more men were wounded in volleys of revolver and rifle shots, resulted in a call for the 69th Regiment of Winnipeg and the city is now under martial law.

The fight started when a number of armed strikers opened a merciless fire on a special train of box cars carrying subs to take the vacant jobs.

The train was riddled with shots

from men hidden about the yards behind boxes, cars and any other form of temporary fortification which could be found.

Later the scene of the battle changed to the corner of the railway yard in front of the company's boarding house, when the mob of more than 2,000 strikers opened fire on 30 special constables.

Bullets screamed and whizzed from revolvers and rifles and the roar of shots was heard a long distance.

In a few minutes men were lying wounded and groaning in the streets and when the smoke cleared the scene was a serious one.

MONTICELLO LOSS WAS \$1,000,000

MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., Aug. 12.—A loss estimated at \$1,000,000, was caused by the fire that swept thirty six buildings from the main street of the summer resort town of Monticello, N. Y., last night. The fire was under control this morning after dynamite was used.

LARGE LOBSTER CAUGHT LATELY

TRURO, Aug. 12.—A mammoth lobster was caught recently off Bird's Point, Truro. This fish weighed fifteen pounds, four ounces when caught and some measurements show that the tips of the outstretched claws were three feet and two inches apart and that it would require a ring six and a quarter inches in diameter to go over its claw. Mr. Mullins, Truro, the owner of the trophy of the sea, has had the shell mounted in a case with a glass front and has had a miniature lobster placed alongside the monster to allow a comparison and to further impress one with the size of the catch.

THE QUESTION OF DEFENCE.

MONTREAL, Aug. 13.—Special cable from London says—The next plenary sitting of the Imperial Defence Committee has not yet been summoned, but it will be possible tomorrow or Monday. On the question of the military defence of the Empire general unanimity has prevailed and far reaching decisions have been arrived at. On the Naval question all parts of the Empire represented have expressed their intention to take a fair share of the cost of Naval Defence.
