SMELTS VS. GOLD.—Smelts, those delectable little fishes, are being caught in great numbers through the ice on our shores and being shipped to the United States. A Nova Scotia Exchange. The demand in Yankeland is hard to satisfy and the market is craving. The payment comes in cash and with the added difference in exchange. Those who hold that the depreciation of Canadian money in the United States is due to the balance of trade against Canada might go wholesale into the smelt business and square the one-sided account. The necessary equipment is only a short stick and two bits of hay wire, plus a hole in the ice.

NOTABLE STOCK PURCHASE.—Mr. William Boyce of Bonshaw has purchased from Hon. W. M. Lea, Victoria, a pure bred yearling Holstein bull, that should be the means of raising the standard of the dairy cows in that vicinity, as he is out of that good dairy cow "Phineas Hooker" Vale dekol. This cow won first in the showing at the Charlottetown Exhibition as a yearling and 2 year old, also sweepstakes over all dairy breeds in the dairy test as a two year old. She was officially tested in R. C. M. and made 485 lbs. milk and nearly 22 lbs. butter in seven days, 11,251 lbs. milk and 523 lbs. butter in a year with second calf. The ancestors of this cow were bred by Mr. Lea for four generations and selected for economy of production as individual records of all his herd are kept from year to year and is open to inspection by the public. Eight cows and four two year old heifers earned \$2000 at the Grand Creamery in 1919. Besides supplying three families with milk and cream and raising 10 calves, which is the very best sort of a record back of any breeding bull.

THE LOBSTER SEASON.—There is a petition going around among fishermen of Wood Islands, Belle River, Flat River, Pinette and Point Prim, to have the lobster fishing season changed from spring to autumn. It is hoped that their request may be granted as it is a known fact that they have the wrong season. They are under a great disadvantage on account of ice and cold stormy weather, also for want of bait. It is impossible to get bait until the vessels come from the Magdalen Isles and that is not before May 14th. As the present season opens on April 26th, that is 19 days of the season already gone.—Lobster Packer.
