Funeral Of Rev. Ewen MacDougall



The funeral of the late Rev. Ewen MacDougall, B.D., Minister of the Church of Scotland in Prince Edward Island, was held on Saturday last and was one of the largest ever seen in this province. The funeral services were under the direction of the Elders and were conducted by the Rev. Richard Westaway of the Church of Scotland at Cambridge, Mass. A private service was held at his late home, Upper Hillsboro Street at ten o'clock Saturday morning, at which Rev. Hugh Miller, president of the Ministerial Association and Rev. H. D. Raymond of St. Paul's Church assisted. The funeral cortege left the MacLean Funeral Home at noon for DeSable and included over fifty autos, while at the church as many more from other parts of the province were parked. The church was crowded to overflowing, and many mourners failed to gain admission. An impressive funeral service was carried through, opening with the reading of scriptures by the Rev. Hugh Miller, the 23rd and 121st Psalms were sung led by elder Silas A. Murley, and the assembly was led in prayer by elders George MacDougall of the Cambridge congregation and Capt. F. J. G. MacDougall of Belle River, Rev. Mr. Westaway delivered an address of comfort and consolation to the bereaved family, relatives and congregations. The benedictory prayer was pronounced by the Rev. H. D. Raymond. The ceremony at the grave was conducted by the members of True Brothers Lodge A. F. & A.M. and the pall bearers were Fred Robertson and Joshua Ballou of Birch Hill; John A. MacDougall and Albert MacDougall of Argyle Shore; Edward MacFadyen of Augustine Cove; and James Cairns of Summerside. Some thirty elders from the various congregations were the honorary pallbearers. A profusion of floral tributes from all parts of this province and from abroad testified to the love and sympathy accorded the large number of bereaved.

Unexpected Death Of City Woman Sunday

Mrs. Peter Murray, 62-year-old Charlottetown resident who died unexpectedly Sunday will be buried at Tyrone in her former parish tomorrow morning. It was announced last night Mrs. Murray became suddenly ill on Bayfield Street Sunday morning while returning to her Elm Avenue home from the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer where she attended service. She died in an ambulance en route to hospital from a house where she was carried following her collapse. Mrs. Murray was the widow of Peter Murray former Tyrone resident whose death occurred about a year ago. Before her marriage she was Mary Ellen Connolly of Lot 65. Surviving are four sons, Gerard and Patrick in Charlottetown, Leo in Augusta, Maine, and Peter in Detroit.
