## Trout Fishing Regulations

No person shall kill in one day more than thirty trout (30).

Everyone not being a permanent resident of Prince Edward Island, or the son or brother of a permanent resident thereof who fishes for or attempts to fish for any trout in the waters of Prince Edward Island without first procuring an angler's permit is liable to a penalty of twenty dollars (\$20.00).

Permits can be procured at Publicity Office, Charlottetown, costing two dollars (\$2.00).

The sale, purchase or export of trout, no matter where procured is prohibited, providing however, that any non-resident leaving the Province may take away the lawful catch of two days' fishing if the shipment is accompanied by a certificate to that effect from either the local fishery officer in whose district the fish were caught, or from the local station agent adjacent to the locality in which they were caught.

Tourists can obtain information as to where to fish &c. on application to the Publicity Officer, Charlottetown.

### TIN KITCHEN

A bachelor housewife has equipped her kitchen as a "tin kitchen" for light housekeeping. It is a closet just about the width and depth of her tiny gas range. It is all lined with galvanized zinc, even the walls, floor and ceiling being of zinc. The ceiling points upward at the center where there is a small hole to permit the escape of odors, smoke and excess steam. At each side are narrow shelves of zinc for utensils. To provide work quarters for kitchen operations, one end of the room has a partition five and a half feet high and reaching half way across the end of the room. The living room side is covered with wall board and papered to correspond.

## Confederation Day In Kensington

An event of primal significance was observed in Kensington on Friday night, when the sixtieth anniversary of the consummation of Dominion Confederation was celebrated. The people of the town and of the supporting pastoral sections, congregated en masse upon the High School grounds. Here a grand-stand had been erected and this with the grounds were brilliantly illuminated with electric lights which made a pleasing scene.

On the grand-stand were seated the Mayor, Mr. J. M. Laird and the supporting speakers. Mr. J. E. Proffitt read a message from His Excellency, the Governor General, which conveyed to the assemblage the Royal greetings. Other telegrams were read also celebrating the event. These were received with applause by the audience. Applauded also was the greeting from Hon. Mr. Mackenzie King, read by Mr. J. F. Proffitt. Mr. A. E. McLean, M. P., who honored the event with his presence, addressed the audience in a most happy speech.

He complimented the people on the patriotic nature of the celebration, the fine exposition of patriotic unity which is a fine example, characteristic to be displayed by any community. He particularly noted the significant float which conveyed the school children. This didactic device was keenly admired, being nicely in keeping with the spirit of the celebration, and was second best if not the best, in the parade. The Maritime Provinces cannot imagine what their status would be today had they remained out of confederation.

We have the making of the greatest nation on earth, all the natural resources required. Nineteen hundred and twenty six, was a banner year, and nineteen hundred and twenty seven will be even superior. The speaker here, reviewed the negotiations that were involved in the preliminaries previous to Confederation.

The Fathers of Confederation must have had a prophetic consciousness of our Canada of today—one third of the British Empire, as large as all Europe, with natural resources unlimited. We have a telephone for every twelve of our people. We lead the Empire in the extent of our railways, we have the largest wheat field in the world, the largest flour mills, and we lead the world in means of transportation. We have the greatest education and financial institutions, and the people, the best on earth. The two races and their perfect harmony, and their churches are the best in the world.

We are also proud of our British connection, for we have the fundamental on which to develop the greatest nation on earth. Prince Edward Island is the Cradle of Confederation for here it was that the infant was first nourished since here it was that the initial plans were conceived which developed into the grand union that we have today. Canada will continue to develop until her greatly increased population will find her forming the most important part of the whole British Empire.

Other speakers expatiated upon the splendor of the event, and coincidentally supported all that had been said. The whole event was a spectacular lesson whose object is to teach us to love our own dear native land, and so to live that our lives demonstrate that we merit so great a heritage from the Creator of all good.

The pyrotechnic display was a fitting part of the celebration and was greatly enjoyed by the younger portion of the throng.

To give it more flavor, if the family does not like it as is, cook it with bacon, slice hard boiled eggs over the dish of it, scallop it with white sauce and crumbs, serve it with catsup or horseradish for flavor. Cook an onion with it and add a tablespoon of vinegar to it as it cooks. This will give it more tang. Chop a left-over dish of it; and cold meat and celery chopped; and make into a mold with gelatin.

### ROASTS

When roasting veal, beef or pork, make them more delicious by adding the flavor of certain vegetables to them. A tomato sliced over the top, adds tartness. Its acid helps dissolve the connective tissue of the meat and will make it more tender. Some like the flavor of onion in their roasts and will fry minced onion in the fat before they put the roast on to cook. Mangoes chopped and sprinkled over the top of the roast will give it their distinctive flavor. Raw carrots, sliced and laid on top of the meat, give it an additional deliciousness.

### LEMON FILLING

The following filling is good either for pies or cakes: Mix three-fourths cup of sugar, two tablespoons each of flour and cornstarch and a third teaspoon salt. When well blended, add slowly a cup of boiling water and cook over the fire, stirring constantly until the mixture is thick enough to pile when dropped from a spoon. Cook it fifteen minutes longer in a double boiler, else the starch will taste raw. Then beat in one or two egg yolks; a teaspoon butter; three tablespoons lemon juice and the grated yellow rind of half a lemon. If using the filling for cake, let it cool and thicken before spreading on the hot cake, or it will soak in too much.
