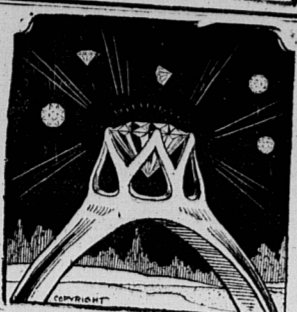

Sam Anderson, the world's middle-weight champion wrestler, is the hero of over five hundred matches of which he has won over ninety-five per cent. He first came into the limelight when he defeated Harvey Parker, the famous Boston wrestler, and Ned. Ad-ams of Chicago. Anderson made two trips to Europe and astonished the folks in the Old Country by throwing some of the best heavy-weights in the game. While in Europe he competed in the wrestling tournament held at Manchester, Eng., where from forty-three other contestants he won a large purse and silver belt previously described in the Guardian. By defeating Walter Willoughby, the American middleweight champion, he captured the world's championship. Beyond doubt Anderson claims to be a cradle hold inventor himself and which many other wrestlers are endeavoring to learn. His recent match with John Kilonis, a Greek, over whom Sam won a victory two years ago, was one of the hardest bouts he has yet had, having to wrestle two hours without a fall on either side, the match which ended a draw. Anderson was in Charlottetown a short time ago and refereed a wrestling match here.

Public Notice

As measles seem to be getting prevalent in the schools of Charlottetown owing to the neglect of some citizens, public notice is called to the Regulations of the Board of Health, especially to Rules 1 and 6.

Rule 1 states that any household in whose house occurs a case of measles shall immediately notify the Board of Health, through its Health Officer or secretary, of the same.

Rule 6 states that no member of any household where measles exists shall be permitted to mingle with children in schools, churches, or other public places.

There is a penalty of \$40.00 for failure to obey the rules.
The Board of Health requests all citizens to comply with the regulations at once, and assist in stamping out the disease.
