ALLIED REPLY DOES NOT SATISFY U. S.

WASHINGTON, October 15.- Examination of the Allies' note on the censorship of mails, officially made public this morning, has brought a feeling among officials that it does not satisfactorily meet the protests set forth in the American note of May 24, which said that only a radical change restoring to the United States its full rights as a neutral power will satisfy this Government. The State Department has watched with interest, however, the informal arrangements made by British authorities through their trade department, and through such conferences as that of Sir Richard Crawford in New York recently, and is understood to feel that resentment among American citizens over the Allied censorship has been greatly lessened. It is thought unlikely that any reply will be made in the three weeks before election. In this connection diplomatic circles attach much significance to President Wilson's declaration at Long Branch yesterday that "it is almost impossible to do anything positive" in the fields of foreign affairs during the campaign. All the information reaching the department is understood to indicate that officials have determined to maintain the firmest attitude on the subject, feeling that absolutely vital interests are involved. Officials are said to feel therefore that any further positive step by the United States might bring the controversy to a much more critical stage. Secretary Lansing declined tonight to discuss the mail seizures negotiations or to interpret President Wilson's statement regarding the administration's position in dealing with ration, he said, spoke for itself and foreign affairs. A summary of the Anglo-French note sent out last Friday said that the Allied governments reiterated their right to intercept and search all genuine mail found on neutral vessels on the high seas or in allied ports but they promised to remedy "any faults abuses or serious mistakes" in censorship that might be brought to their attention.

TWO KINDS OF PIPE. Up to about twenty-eight years ago hand-puddled iron was used entirely for making pipe; for various reasons steel had not been successful welded, and as the quantities needed were comparatively small there was no trouble in supplying the demand. With an increasing use of pipe, however, the discovery that steel could be welded when treated properly, and the discovery of cheaper and better processes of making this material, caused it to be employed more and more, and two classes of pipe appeared on the market-iron and steel. With many manufacturers in the field different grades of these appeared, and now there are a number of such grades; in fact there is much difference between some of the wrought irons as there is a corresponding disparity between the latter. All of this has tended to increase the confusion, and inasmuch as any new material is liable to be looked upon with suspicion, it is perhaps only natural that there should have arisen much lack of agreement regarding the length of life which iron pipe as contrasted with that made from steel, might be expected to give-Engineering Magazine.

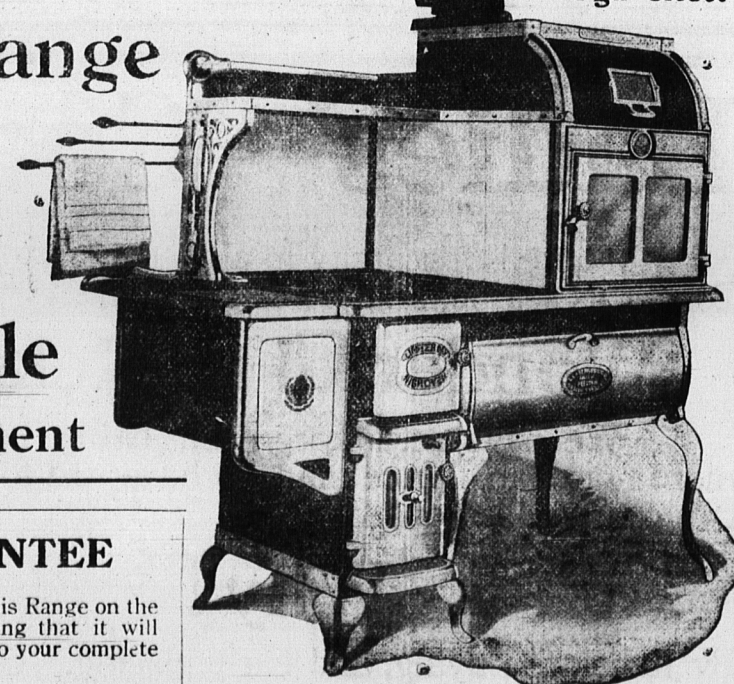
