erboard, then dropping upon the frail craft, trusted that wind and tide might carry him to the shore. Fortunately the sea was not rough. Drifting in the same direction, not far from the ship, he saw floating upon the water near him, a little girl, some six years old, whose parents had been drowned, she escaping death by the air inflating her undergarments. With a desperate effort Dodge succeeded in grasping the child, who threw her arms around his neck, resting upon his shoulders. In this position, after many hours of terrible scorching heat from the tropical sun, parching thirst, and great exhaustion, they reached the shore.

This child and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Le Barge, of New York, had become quite friendly with Dodge during their voyage from San Francisco.

On the shore where they landed many of the persons whose lives had been saved, and some of the dead, through wind and current, drifted nearby. A trail was discovered leading through chaparral and cactus, which all those followed, whose strength permitted, until they reached a Native's hut, the occupants of which did all they could to ameliorate their distress. The inhabitants of the place gathered about them and devised means for their support, and slaughtered an animal which provided them with meat during their three days rest. At the end of that time the natives assured them that the mail and passenger steamer of the same line as the "Golden Gate" was due the next day to pass up the coast in sight of land on her way from Panama to San Francisco.

The survivors of the wreck made arrangements with the fishermen to intercept the steamer when passing and put them on board, which they satisfactorily accomplished. The passage from there to San Francisco was uneventful, and, on arrival, Dodge succeeded in placing the little girl, that he had saved from a watery grave, among her influential friends.

At this time there were no appliances on the Pacific Coast for submarine work, and not until two years after the burning of the ship did Wells Fargo Co. bring from New York divers and submarine outfit for the purpose of securing the gold that went down in the steamer. Dodge being interested in the success or failure of the work accompanied the outfit to where they found the wreck which was almost buried in the sand. THE PLANETS FOR DECEMBER

Mercury will be a morning star, low in the east for a few days after Dec. 9, rising an hour or two before the sun.

Venus is still a morning star and will be in view in the east throughout the month.

Mars as an evening star will be nearest the earth on Dec. 31. It will rise between 8 and 9 p.m., the first of the month, in the constellation Gemini, and will be well placed for observation.

Jupiter, still an evening star, is fast dropping down the western horizon and cannot be well seen.

Saturn, an evening star in Taurus, will be an object of special interest this month and is finely placed for observation. It will rise in the east soon after sunset on the first and about four minutes earlier each succeeding day.

Uranus is following Jupiter down the western evening sky and by the last of the month will be too near the sun for observation.

Neptune is in the constellation Cancer, a short distance east of Mars, and will rise at the beginning of the month about 8.30 p.m.
