—ABRAMS VILLAGE SCHOOL.—The Public School Examinations of Abram's Village was held on June 23rd. The attendance was large, testifying to the great interest taken by the people in their school. The manner in which the pupils answered to the different questions put to them was evident proof that the work done, was of a high order. At the close, remarks were made by Rev. Doudreault, Mr. S. E. Gallant, Harry Dorby, Dominique Arsenault, the trustees and others, all expressing their greatest satisfaction. An address was read to the teacher accompanied with gifts. The ratepayers regret the assistant Miss Eveline Arsenault and Miss Madeleine Arsenault sever their connections with their school. The principal has been retained for another year. Miss Eveline has been hired as principal for Urban Ville School.—M

—ARBAM VILLE SCHOOL.—On June 22nd the semi-annual public school examination at Urban Ville took place. As usual the pupils displayed great talent both in their classes and in the execution of their well prepared program. The classes were examined by Rev. Father Doudreault, Mr. J. H. Leblanc, (from Moncton, N. B.) the Misses Eveline Arsenault, Madeleine Arsenault, Emma Arsenault, Madeleine Bernard, and Peter Gallant. Rev. Father Doudreault after having distributed the prizes to the pupils, expressed himself as highly pleased with the work done in school. The pupils were a privileged class of children, he said, in that their parents took such pains in behalf of their education. Under the co-operation of parents and teachers the school and its surroundings had been improved and beautified to such an extent that the school now holds a reputation unexcelled in the province. The pupils on their part had performed their tasks so well, that they were worthy of their school. Mr. Leblanc also congratulated parents, teachers and pupils on the excellent work done in the school. Remarks were also made by the trustees and others. A special feature of the day was a touching address read by Miss Lucy Arsenault to the teacher. The address breathed forth joy at the thought that the assistant Miss Leah Lyenne was to remain with her pupils another year; but intense regret was also expressed at the near departure of the principal Miss Rosella Arsenault. Accompanying the address were beautiful gifts. The ratepayers of Urban Ville may well regret to see Miss Arsenault going away, as under her guidance their school had made excellent progress.—M

—The Summerside Motoring Company, guests of Mr. Frank Tuplin, paid a short visit to the Wayside Inn Hampton, N.B., on Monday morning. The party was composed of the Hon. J. E. Wyatt, speaker of the P.E.I. Legislative Assembly, Mr. Frank Tuplin, W. H. Bowness, Dr. Fred Lafursey, Fred Tanton, all of Summerside; H. W. Downing, engineer of the P.E.I. Car Ferry Terminal, and Mr. H. E. Girvan of Moncton.

—At a special meeting of the Council of Summerside Board of Trade held on Friday evening further arrangements were made for the meeting of the Maritime Board at Summerside in August. A letter was read from the President of the Maritime Board approving of the suggestion of the time of the Confederation Celebration at Charlottetown, also that he had instructed the Secy. of the Maritime Board to lay the matter before all the boards for their approval. The proposed programme of meetings as suggested by the local board is as follows:—on the arrival of the delegates on Monday evening Aug. 17th, a short business meeting will be held on the following day the general meeting of the Maritime Board will be taken up and on Wednesday the delegates will be taken to Charlottetown as guests of the Summerside Board to take in the Confederation Celebration. On their return they will be the guests of Mayor Saunders at a garden party to be held on his lawn. The above programme is only the suggestion of the Summerside Board and may be changed before the meetings of the Maritime Board take place.

—SCHOOL CLOSING.—The Summerside schools closed on Thursday for the midsummer holidays. The closing exercises taking place in the gymnasium on the same evening, the large hall being crowded with parents, pupils and friends. Mr. William Stewart the energetic chairman of the school board presided and with him on the platform were the members of the school board, Mayor Saunders and others. The programme of exercises were as follows:—Opening Chorus; Pen-arks by Chairman; Motion song, Eastern School; Flower Drill and Burlesque; Drill by pupils of Western School; Distribution of Diplomas; March and Drill by 12 Cadets; Closing Chorus; "God Save the King." The chairman in his opening remarks spoke of conditions of the schools which on the whole, he declared to be satisfactory in support of his statement (quoting from the report of the Supt. of Education and Inspector Boulter who stated that they had made a thorough examination of the different schools and found them in excellent working order. In his address he referred to the long and faithful services rendered to the teaching profession by two teachers of the Summerside schools, namely Miss Janie Brehaut and Miss M. Linkletter the former having been in the state of the Summerside schools for 28 years, while Miss Linkletter who this year intends retiring from the profession has been teaching in the Summerside Schools for 20 years previous to which she taught in country schools for upwards of 20 years. Mayor Saunders also spoke briefly congratulating the teachers upon the success that had attended their efforts. The beautiful little edifice of St. Elizabeth's Church, Springfield, was the scene of an event of great interest to a large circle of people on Wednesday afternoon, the 24th inst., at 3 p.m., when Annie Florence, youngest daughter of the late Robt. Haslam and Mrs. Haslam, was united in the bonds of Holy matrimony to the Rev. Basil Philip, eldest son of the Rev. P. Ireland Jones, of Karachi, India.

Under a sky of cloudless beauty the bride drove to and entered the church on the arm of her eldest brother, Geo. L. Haslam of "Hazeldean," and to the hymn, "We lift our hearts, O Father." She was dressed in white chamette, trimmed with Indian lace and the conventional wreath of orange blossoms, carrying a white Prayer Book. The maid of Honor was Miss

Clara Balderston, daughter of the Hon. John Balderston of North Wiltshire, also gowned in white and carrying a bouquet of lovely lilies of the valley. The groom was supported by Mr. Lionel Pengelly, of London, England, and the ushers were Messrs. Rob. Howard and Will Haslam. In a manner which impressed the large congregation with the calm dignity of the Church's marriage service the ceremony was performed by Rev. R.T. Dobie, Rector of the Church, assisted by Rev. H.L. Haslam, of the parish of Liverpool, N.S., brother of the bride.

During the signing of the register, the hymn, "O Perfect Love," was feelingly sung; after which the bridal party left the church to the strains of Mendelssohn's wedding march, beautifully rendered by Miss Vera Haslam, of Alberton. After the ceremony a large number of guests drove to Stone Cottage, where the reception was held and here the newly wedded couple received the good wishes of all. Mr. and Mrs. Colclough will spend

the next two weeks on the Island, visiting various places, and will then leave for the Peace River District, Northern Alberta, where the groom's work will be centred for the near future.

The number of gifts in gold and silver and beautifully wrought needlework, the heartfelt good wishes of the guests, mingled with a deep regret for the loss of one of Springfield's loveliest girls, the tasteful decorations of the church, the work of Miss Haslam's life-long friends, are all tokens of the high esteem in which both the bride and groom are held, and their course will be followed with the deepest interest.

It is a matter of interest to note that St. Elizabeth's Church in which the wedding took place, was originally built in 1849, by the grand father of our bride, Thomas Haslam, in memory of his wife whose name it bears.—Mr. Haslam being one of the earliest settlers of the Island. A happy day was brought to a close by the arrival of two cablegrams from India, with heartfelt congratulations from the brother of the bride and from the parents of the groom.
