AMERICANS EXPERIENCE FIRST GAS SHELLS

With the American Army in France Nov. 14. (By the Associated Press.)—The American infantrymen in the trenches and artillerymen in the gun positions had their first real experience with gas shells. The Germans have let loose many during the past two days, making the use of gas masks necessary. Shrapnel has also been freely used by both.

During a recent night the enemy machine guns were again turned on the American trenches, the Americans replying with an equally vigorous fire.

THE SANTA MARIA EXCITEMENT GROWS

The purchase of the caravel Santa Maria, by Dr. Leo Frank at Charlottetown, has set the United States generally and Chicago particularly by the ears.

As intimated in former references in The Guardian, the Santa Maria was presented by the Spanish Government to the City of Chicago in commemoration of the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America by Christopher Columbus with a ship of which the Santa Maria is a replica. Even the anchor which Columbus dropped in America on arrival and for which one of the United States museums has offered a fabulous sum, is on board the ship now lying in Charlottetown Harbour.

The Guardian has received a sheaf of United States papers, including the leading papers in Chicago, each containing pathetic or humorous or insignificant articles dealing with the humilation brought upon the United States by the seizure for a towage claim and the sale under the auctioneer's hammer of a ship of such historic associations and suggesting ways and means by which the humiliation may be overcome. It appears from several of the articles that when the Santa Maria was loaned to take part in an educational cruise, the officers deposited a cash guarantee of \$10,000 that she would be returned safely to the City of Chicago. She never returned but, instead, was as already known, sold in Charlottetown to satisfy a towage claim of about \$3,000 and was knocked down to Dr. Leo Frank for about \$500. Some of the papers received suggest the forfeiture of the bond and the purchase of the ship from Dr. Frank; others suggest action by the United States Government, others, action by the city of Chicago but all demanding her immediate return and the removal of the stain from the national and the civic escutcheon. Meanwhile Dr. Leo Frank sits calmly by the helm of the historic caravel which has already become more of an attraction, even than when she sailed gallantly into the harbor as a replica of the original Columbus ship. What Dr. Frank shall do with her, whether he will have her converted into a common freighter, a pleasure ship or a show ship—or return her for a quid pro quo to her original owners has not yet been revealed.

WILL ENFORCE THE SERVICE ACT TO THE LIMIT

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—The rigid enforcement of the Military Service Act was discussed at a lengthy conference attended by Sir Robert Borden, Hon. C. J. Doherty, General Mewburn, General Gwatkin, chief of the General Staff Judge Duff, Central Appeal Judge, and Messrs. Newcombe, Moss, Biggar and Loranger, of the Military Service Council, and Sir Percy Sherwood, Chief of the Dominion Police.

This conference discussed the whole situation, and the Government intends to see that the Military Service Act is enforced to the limit of its provisions. Every facility has been afforded those within the first class to comply with the provisions of the act. There can be no excuse on the question of publicity, as there has been a prolonged campaign of education. On Saturday of last week the time was up, and those who have neither reported for service nor applied for exemption can be treated as deserters. These are liable to imprisonment in jail or internment camps, or, without ceremony, they may be gathered in and shipped overseas. Failure to observe the law in the prescribed period deprives the party affected of the right to seek exemption. Official denial is given to a report sent to the French press that the second class is to be called out in February. "We will consider calling up the second class only when the first is disposed of" said Hon. Mr. Doherty.
