Local Airmen Win Honors In Boxing Tournament

Lac. Billy Baker of the R.A.F. station at Moncton, billed as the lightweight champion of the Maritimes, went down to defeat here last night at the hands of AC. Gasson of the Royal Air Force Station near Charlottetown. Gasson won a decision after the fight went the full five rounds.

Baker, with an eight-pound edge in weight, was unable to keep up with his lighter, faster opponent who had an edge in every round. Gasson weighed 147 and Baker 155.

One of the largest crowds at a boxing tournament here for a long time saw the ten bouts in an inter-station meet, matching fighters from the Royal Air Force stations here and at Moncton.

In seven fights matching airmen from the two stations the boxers from Charlottetown won four of the bouts while the other three went to Moncton.

In addition there were three other bouts. One of the two main bouts, matched Able Seaman Robinson of the R.O.N.V.R., stationed at Charlottetown with Lac. Abbot of Moncton. The Moncton scrap was won via the knockout route in the second round after Robinson had been showing up to good advantage. The scaman looked like a winner until Abbot connected suddenly and sent him down for the count.

The other two bouts were exhibition affairs, one with two local airmen matched and the other with two Moncton airmen.

Sport Shorts From Britain

LONDON, Sept. 30 (CP)—Britain's lightweight boxing champion lost an eight-round decision to an aging fellow who held the same title a decade ago and the ringside boys began hollering for the kill.

They figured Eric Boon's continuance as king was dated to end the next time he puts the championship on the block because Mizler, who won a British Empire Games championship at Hamilton Ont., 13 years ago, beat Boon with a flickering left hand. An expressionless boxer, he refused to be hurried or flurried and he made Boon miss repeatedly. And at that he was substituting for the Jamaican champion, Lefty Flynn.

The defeat, which showed Boon as but a shadow of the fierce little brawler of a couple of years back, followed hard on a non-title Belfast bout in which Boon was knocked out in the fifth round by Tommy Armour, Northern Ireland welterweight champion. A hit to the jaw did the trick before a rearing crowd of 10,000 after Boon hit the canvas twice.

Mizler, surprising even the most optimistic, won almost every round. His left hand transfixed Boon's features into a beet-color and he opened an old wound under the champion's left eye.

Immediately after the fight Boon asked for a return contest; and said he was prepared to put up a side-bet of \$2,000 that he would win over 10 or 12 rounds.

Over at Cardiff, Bert Jackson created the biggest surprise of the Welsh night season by outpointing Len Davies of Swansea. It was a surprise in that Davies within the previous weeks had taken decisions over both Ned Tarleton, British featherweight champion, and Jim Eardly of Dundee, British Empire bantamweight king.

Jackson, a featherweight, hit the deck for a nine-count in the third

The Experts Say

Boarding House Better

The consumer branch of the Prices Board suggests that single girls who take apartments are thereby helping to complicate an already difficult situation caused by the shortage of housing units.

Boarding for single girls is the simplest way of living.

When those without families take over apartments, flats or duplexes, it means someone with children, who cannot possibly be accommodated in a single room, will be "out in the cold", the branch says.

Wear Woollens Longer

If they are to last long and look well, woollens require special attention. Fasteners should be sewed on as soon as they come off. Dress shields should be worn and safety pins avoided. Damp woollens should be hung where there is plenty of air circulating, and on hangers, not in a closet, and they should be dried normally, not on a radiator. These pointers, the experts say, will keep woollens out of the rag bag and on active service.

Revised Rental Regulations

OTTAWA, Sept. 30 — (C P) — Revised rental regulations go into effect tomorrow across Canada as a move by the Prices Board to maintain the rentals ceiling but make easier the part of tenants and landlords in administration of the control system and "give greater certainty of positions to each."

The changes were announced by the Board last Aug. 13 but application was delayed until Oct. 1.

Provided, among other things, is a regulation that six month notice, instead of a year's notice, will be required if landlords want to live in tenanted accommodation purchased by them since last Dec. 10.

Applications for increase in rent will be more generally limited to situations where the tenant is receiving more value for his rent than he did formerly. Appointment of local rental appraisers to deal with applications for changes in rent is authorized.

Persons on a weekly tenancy of self contained units are given the same protection as those on monthly or yearly tenancies under the new regulations. "d roomers and boarders are brought under the price ceiling under a special section known as "shared accommodation."

The revised order provides for an increase of 10 per cent of maximum rental if a tenant is sub-letting more than two rooms.

Applications for increases also may be made for the rental of any unit in a multiple family dwelling is less than the rental generally prevailing for similar units in the same building, or if the landlord spends 10 per cent or more of the assessed value of the accommodation for renovation.

three reasons — personal occupancy by the landlord or members of his immediate family; a division of the accommodation so it will house more people; and what the price board terms "obnoxious behavior" by tenants or their sub tenants.

All behaved tenants lose all special rights of tenure and their leases become governed by provincial law. The rentals order lists 13 specified circumstances permitting a landlord to proceed in eviction under provincial law.

If a landlord desires accommodation as a home for at least a year for himself, his father, mother, son, daughter or daughter in law, the last included because of the number of women whose husbands are overseas, he must give his tenant a minimum of six months notice to vacate.

But the board said in its August announcement that eviction cannot take place in the winter in the case of a monthly lease. Special forms are to be provided by the Board for these notices to vacate and the accommodation must not
