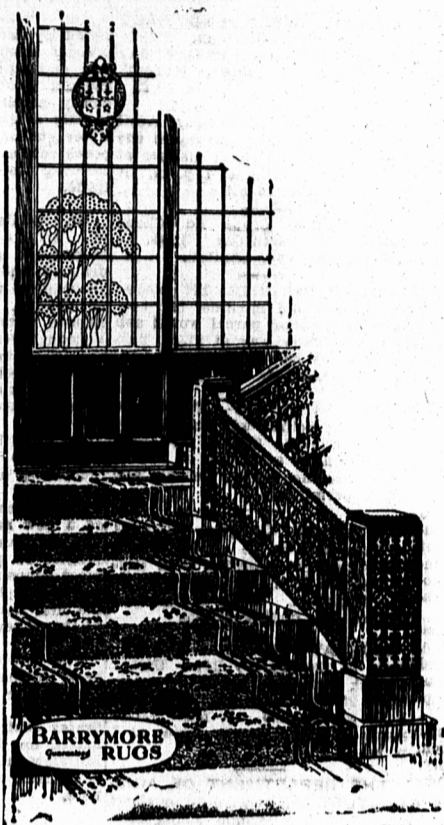

FRUIT CROP IS LATE

ST. CATHERINES, Ont., April 20.—According to Carl Fisher, secretary of the Niagara Peninsula Fruitgrowers' Association, the season is now already two weeks behind normal, which is a serious matter for the fruit growers and farmers.

He said today that in March last year the mercury scarcely ever went below freezing, while this year it was scarcely anything else, and April has been just about as bad, added to which the wet weather has kept work back. Whereas this time last year, he said, farmers had their ploughing and tree spraying well finished, some have not yet been able to start. There is still much water in the fields and orchards all through the fruit peninsula, which prevents farmers getting on to the land. The late season will make Blossom Week later than last year. Thus far, however, there is no indication that the weather will have permanent ill-effects on the fruit crop.

THE BEAUTIFICATION OF RURAL SCHOOL GROUNDS.

The Canadian Horticultural Council have earned the gratitude of every public spirited citizen in favoring the ornamental planting of the school grounds throughout the country. Commencing last year ten silver cups were offered for competition in various districts of the Dominion to the rural schools. The award of Merit Certificate and degree of beautification of the grounds during the year. Most of these cups were won last season, but they cannot become the property of any school until won three times not necessarily in succession. With the winning of each cup goes an award of Merit Certificate and degree of beautification of the grounds should be supplied, to be compared with a similar picture taken in the autumn showing the improvement that has been made. Trustee boards, Women's Institutes and Horticultural Societies are urged to co-operate with the Council, which will provide instructions and suggestions on the plants that may be used and their arrangement in the school grounds.
