ACETYLENE GAS EXPLOSION WRECKS AURORA BUILDING.

AURORA, Ont., May 3—Horace D. Lundy, whose acetylene gas plant supplies merchants and the Methodist Church with light, was standing with his hand on a leaking pipe about 8 o'clock this evening, reassuring his wife, who stood at the door, when a terrific explosion that shook the windows half a mile away, lifted the ceiling to the roof, knocked out two ends of the building and demolished the generator. The building was a mass of flames inside and the ceiling crashed to the floor. Lundy fell back, but recovered himself at once and assisted the fire brigade in extinguishing the flames. He and his wife escaped with a few burns about the hands and face.

HOLY WAR MAY CRIPPLE REGIME.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 3—The Albanian revolt has become so serious that the Young Turks' regime is in grave danger of being overthrown. Turkish troops are mutinying in great squads. The Albanians have practically made their revolt a holy war. They charge that the Turks are seeking to overthrow the faith. According to despatches that have been received in this city, fighting of a most desperate character is continuing in all parts of Albania today.

Thirteen battalions of Turkish infantry, several batteries of artillery and a force of cavalry are converging on the Pachtank Pass, where a force of Turkish troops is cut off from its communication. As soon as the guns can be placed in position an attack will be begun on the Albanians on both sides of the pass at the same time.

Ten thousand Albanians are assembled before Ipek and have demanded the surrender of the town. Ipek, or Petch, is a town of European Turkey, in the vilayet of Kossovo.

THREE STEAMERS GROUND EN ROUTE TO MONTREAL.

MONTREAL, May 3—The opening of lake and canal navigation to Montreal has been celebrated by sending three steamers into the harbor aground, all three being reported today. The three steamers were the Odland, which went aground just west of the Lachine Canal in Lake St. Louis, bound here with a cargo of coal; the Nevada, aground near Lancaster, on the way down light from Kingston; and the Bothnia, bound from Oswego to Montreal, with a load of coal, which went aground eight miles above Coteau. None of the vessels is in any danger, and tugs and lighters have been sent from Montreal to get them off.

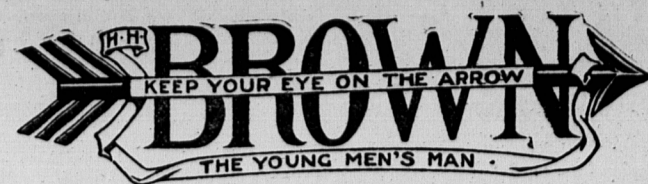

REV. DR. BARCLAY CAUSES TROUBLE.

HALIFAX, May 3—A feeling of more or less keen indignation has developed in consequence of a passage in the lecture on literature delivered before the Canadian Club of this city two or three days ago by Rev. Dr. James Barclay, of Montreal. The lecturer took occasion to speak of what he termed the ignorance and superstition which prevailed before the Reformation. He used such expressions as "Lying friends," "Burning in the stake," "The hostility of the monasteries to extend the benefits of education to the masses, and the selling of indulgences."

These remarks caused some embarrassment in the audience, particularly as the chairman, Judge Wallace, is a Catholic, and Rev. Dr. Foley, rector of St. Mary's Roman Catholic Cathedral, was on the platform and had been invited specially to move a vote of thanks.

Dr. Foley did move the vote of thanks, but evidently with considerable embarrassment.

REFUSES \$25,000 SALARY.

CINCINNATI, O., May 3—Archibald S. White, of New York City, President of the Columbus Gas and Electric Company, of Cincinnati, has just refused a salary of \$25,000 voted him by the board of directors of that organization. "I want a just dividend to be paid the stockholders before anything else," said Mr. White. "I cannot accept your kind offer because of this fact, and because I think the pay is entirely too high. I turned the same salary down last year, and shall continue to do so until the company is on a much better basis than at present. When we pay dividends on our common stock, then I will accept something in the way of salary."
