STEAMERS SUNK BY GERMANS

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, Aug. 2.—The British steamer Benvorlich, which left Miramichi Bay May 1 for London was sunk. Sixteen members of the crew have been landed, the others are still in boats. The Benvorlich was built in Glasgow in 1896, and was of 3,381 gross tons.
