### DOES GUNFIRE CAUSE RAIN?

does; but facts do not bear out the belief. Mr. Elgie, the author and publisher of "Star and Weather Gossip," relates that in the Spring of 1911 the then First Lord of the Admiralty was asked by Lord Dalrymple whether he could arrange for the Fleet to carry out their heavy gun practice round the coast at some other period of the year than the middle of harvest. Not a few people believe that it is true, "when the resultant heavy rains might cause serious loss to the farming community."  
The First Lord replied: "There is no evidence that the firing causes heavy rain. The winter months are unsuited to target practice owing to the bad weather. Summer is generally devoted to manoeuvres; so that the Spring and Autumn are the most suitable periods for target practice."  
On the other hand, Mr. Elgie mentions a picture of the "Fleet" firing a salute on Coronation Day, 1911, which had the announcement affixed to it that "the thunderous discharge had the effect of bringing down the rain," while a correspondent recently wrote to Mr. Elgie to the effect that "in his forty years' practical experience of gun firing he had never known a heavy discharge to fall in bringing down the rain."  
"It is, I know," says Mr. Elgie, "often advanced in support of the gun firing and rain theory that torrential downpours marked the Waterloo series of engagements. But I think we should remember that those engagements were fought in the middle of June, at a period when drenching rains may be expected in Belgium—battle or no battle. I have seen it seriously suggested that the great storm which shattered the Spanish Armada was due to the heavy gun firing during the engagement."—TIT Bits.

### DOWER CHESTS

Every girl ought to begin a dower chest when she is about twelve years old says the Pictorial Review, and is, as soon as she can sew without assistance, tell the difference between linen and cotton, and be given a definite place in the home to keep the things that shall be her very own.

More and more mothers or not makes no difference, in this day of business girls' and bachelor maids apartments, it is quite conceivable that a girl who does not wish to marry would have very good use for her own household appliances just the same. More and more professional women find it convenient and desirable to set up establishments of their own. Even a stay-at-home girl likes to have her own personal belongings in daily use, and the time of the hall bedroom occupant can be made much sweeter if it be brightened with a few little accessories like bureau scarves, dainty towels and simple curtains from the treasure chest.

Why not have your daughter from early girlhood make and select things to be laid aside—not necessarily for the time she is to "get married, but to "begin housekeeping with? Why not choose a special emblem—a rose or a chrysanthemum, a daisy, a violet, or some other sweet and girlish flower, and work it into every piece that is laid away? What a delicate personal touch you could obtain by always embroidering a wreath, a fleur-de-lis, or a group of butterflies on all your underwear or linens? It is little individual notes like these that give a woman's clothing distinction and charm.

As a piece of ordinary bedroom furniture for every woman the red cedar chest is invaluable. It provides a place to store the spring sewing as fast as it is completed; to tuck out of the war the tablecloths and gingham and curtains that you pick up at midwinter sales, and go assemble the needful travelling outfit ready for the summer; to hold the hats and when all these materials are put into use it is the only place to pack away the winter clothing during the warm weather. Another use for a dower chest is as a gift box.

### BAROMETER READINGS

The following are some of Fitzroy's "barometer illustrations":— 1. "If the barometer has been about its ordinary height near 30 inches at the sea level, and is steady on rising while the thermometer falls and dampness becomes less, north-westerly, northerly, north-easterly wind, or less wind, has rain or snow may be expected."

2. "On the contrary, if a fall takes place on a rising thermometer and increased dampness, wind and rain may be expected from the south-eastward, south-westward or south-westward. A fall with a low barometer foretells snow."

3. "When the barometer is rather below its ordinary height, say down to 29½ inches (sea level), a rise foretells less wind or a change in its direction towards the northward, or less wet; but when it has been very low, about 29 in., the first rising usually precedes or indicates strong wind—at times heavy squalls—from the north-eastward, after which violence a gradually rising glass foretells improving weather if the thermometer falls; but if the warmth continues, probably the wind will back (shift against the sun's course), and more southerly or south-westerly wind will follow, especially if the barometer rise is sudden."

4. "The most dangerous shifts of wind, or the heaviest northerly gales, happen soon after the barometer first rises from a very low point; or if the wind veers gradually, at some time after rain."

5. "Indications of approaching change of weather and the direction and force of winds are shown less by a height of the barometer than by its falling or rising. Nevertheless, a height of more than 30 in. (at sea level) is indication of fine weather and north-wind, except from east to north, occasionally."

6. "A rapid rise of the barometer indicates unsettled weather, a slow movement the contrary; as likewise a steady barometer when continued, and with dryness, foretells very fine weather."

7. "A rapid and considerable fall is a sign of stormy weather and rain or snow. Alternate rising and sinking indicates unsettled or threatening weather."

8. "The greatest depressions of the barometer are with gales from S.E., S. or S.W.; the greatest deviations with wind from N.W., N. or N.E., or with calm."

9. "A sudden fall of the barometer with a westerly wind is sometimes followed by a violent storm from N.W., N. or N.E."

10. "After very warm and calm weather, a storm or squall with rain, may follow; likewise at any time when the atmosphere is heated much above the usual temperature of the season."

### Only Approximately True

These rules of course, are only approximately true, but if remembered at the time when observing the barometer they are often of great use in enabling you to prognosticate quickly. Not only must we observe the instruments before forecasting, but we must also vigilantly watch the sky.

The reader should endeavor to reduce these general rules to the principles of weather knowledge that underlie them. For instance, No. 2 refers to the approach of a cyclone from the mid climate of the Atlantic; the latter part of rule No. 3 refers to the weather at the centre of an intense cyclone, where the wind generally whips round from the south-west to the north-east, without either "veering" or "backing."

#### SOW EARLY OATS.

Hot, moist weather at the time the oat crop is filling and ripening greatly reduces the yield and quality of grain. The character of weather prevailing during the last half of June and the first half of July determines in a very large degree the character of the oat crop.

It is not possible to influence the weather, but the time of ripening of the oat crop can be controlled to an extent. The earlier the crop can be harvested, the less is the likelihood of encountering hot weather when the grain is filling, and there are two methods by which the date of oats harvest can be advanced.

Early seeding is important and there is no danger of seeding too early provided the seed-bed is properly prepared. If the seed-bed is so prepared that all of the seed can be covered to the proper depth, a freeze will do no damage. It is the seed that is scarcely covered, and, therefore, comes up quickly and is shallow rooted, that is injured by a late freeze.

The most favorable varieties in sowing early or medium varieties. Especially have they been found best in seasons that were more or less unfavorable for oats. In this connection it is important to bear in mind the fact that in the corn belt the majority of seasons are not most favorable for oats. Corn thrives best when hot, humid weather prevails throughout June and July. The most favorable season for oats furnishes cool, dry weather at that time. Since the majority of seasons are not most favorable for oats, it is the safer policy to grow varieties which yield well in unfavorable seasons, even though other and later variety. By so doing the chance for a use both an early and a medium varieties may seem slightly superior in an exceptionally good oats year.

In cases where a large acreage of good yield is increased and the grower is enabled to harvest his entire crop is grown it is an excellent plan to chop at the proper time.
