## A Model Room Antiques In Modern Settings

Modern settings need not be shunned by the possessor of antiques. If a little thought is used, lovely old pieces can be arranged in a modern setting which shows them off to a much greater advantage than would imitation old-time surroundings.

A restful, yet decorative, drawing-room, which showed how a few antiques can be charmingly combined with modern furniture and decorations, was tastefully carried out in pink, beige and green. Although the room was neither large nor high, the colour scheme and the furniture gave an impression of both space and height.

All the woodwork and the walls were painted in a pale, dull shade of apple-green, but the ceiling was in creamy-pink.

Round the sunken fireplace, across the top of it and down the sides were eight inch wide panels of green-veined marble. Instead of the usual mantel piece, there was a shelf of the same marble resting on small marble brackets and placed half a foot above the top panel of the fireplace.

Covering the floor was a plain green carpet, several shades deeper in colour than the walls. Standing against the wall on the side of the room opposite to the fireplace was a low and rather long antique black and gold Chinese lacquer chest. Placed on the corner of the chest was a larger green ginger jar. Above it hung a large Chinese tapestry which almost reached the chest beneath.

Opposite the windows was another Chinese chest. This one was tall and of green lacquer with a decorative top.

In one corner of the room, by the fireplace, was a low and rather large green lacquer tea-table and in the other corner on the same side stood a wool-work fire-screen in a lacquer frame.

All the rest of the furniture was upholstered in pink-beige rep.

Placed between two narrow, long windows was a couch which had a slanting head-rest, but was without back and sides. Large and deep modern armchairs were near the hearth and four modern tub-chairs completed the furniture of the room, except for a baby grand modern lacquer piano crossing the corner by the window furthest from the fireplace.

Straight green taffeta curtains, which toned with the walls and carpet, hung at the windows from straight pelmets trimmed with pink beige braid, the linings being of pink-beige silk.

The cushions were of black silk,

### CINNAMON ROLLS

Two cups flour, 5 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons shortening, 1 cup milk, butter, sugar, cinnamon and raisins. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Work in the shortening. Add gradually the milk, mixing with a knife to a soft dough. Toss on a floured board, pat, and roll to 1/4-inch in thickness. Spread with butter and sprinkle with sugar, cinnamon and raisins. Roll up like jelly roll, cut in slices and bake in a hot oven. Recipe makes 10 rolls.

The wife who wishes to win her husband's love has four big factors in her favor. To begin with, she has proximity, which is universally acknowledged to be the greatest matchmaker in the world. Throw any two young people of average attractiveness together day after day and they are pretty sure to fall in love, or to think that they do. Look how many men marry their landlady's daughters. ### MILADY'S SUMMERTIME MAKE-UP

Every season has its bouquet of novelties to satisfy milady's insatiable demand for something new and different. Some of these are soon discarded, but others persist. I think the vogue for sun-tan effects in makeup is establishing itself in the latter class. It fills a long-felt want; by its aid milady can have a becoming coat of tan to harmonize with the brilliant colors of her sport costumes for daytime wear and in the evenings she can use the light tones of make-up that are required by her fragile party frocks. While a sun-darkened skin spalls the effect of a dainty evening gown, it gives just the right healthy, outdoor look that has become so very modish at vacation resorts for day-time.

Make-up in shades of tan is used exactly like any other kind. The skin is first cleansed thoroughly and a suitable foundation cream applied. There are various shades of powder base from creamy to brown. If rouge is to be used, which is not really necessary with this type of make-up, it should be applied before the dark powder is dusted on. Brunette or ochre shades are used to simulate natural tan.

Of course a light red lipstick is impossible with a dark complexion, whether it is natural or artificial. There are orange, brick and rust shades that are suitable. Sometimes a blend of two shades.

Many of my readers who have freckles have been asking how to develop a coat of tan that will conceal the blemishes and give the fashionable bronzed appearance to the complexion. Since the skins that freckle badly do not take an even coat of tan from the sun, the only way to hide the freckles is with make-up. The dark shades of cream and powder not only give the desired sun-tanned effect, but they also protect the skin so that when the vacation season is over and the dark make-up is discarded the freckles will not be so deep.

I know that some of my younger readers who are sensitive about their freckles are going to apply the suggestion just given and I want to sound a note of caution for their particular benefit. Be sure to remove all make-up at bedtime. Failure to observe this simple rule results in blackheads, roughness of the skin and pimples. The complexion of a girl in her teens is more delicate than that of older girls and women and is more easily harmed. It is safest for her to use but little make-up. Of course, every one who uses rouge and powder should cleanse her skin thoroughly before going to bed, but adolescent girls are more likely to suffer from infringements of this rule, especially if there is any tendency toward enlarged pores.

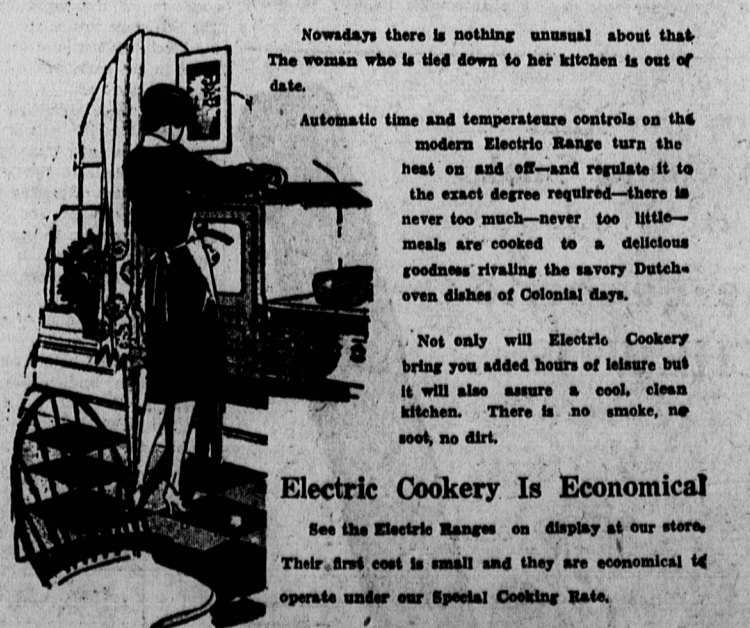
