powers of determining what form things shall take, it assumes importance to us. A man can take in the form of a mutton chop, the atomic forces embodied in a sheep or those stored up in a grain of wheat and therewith build up his own bodily forces. He can take the atoms of a plant and utilize them to satisfy his own needs, but he cannot use the atoms of a lump of clay or of a diamond for food, only plants can do this; and until the plant has done its part the man can do nothing; for independent of plants he cannot keep his body functioning for an instant. But in the control of atomic energy man, though compared with the whole; he is but insignificant; wields enormous power. He can influence the actions of others and even make changes in the outer fashion of the world, moulding it to suit his desires. But it must not be overlooked that he has to play his part in a world whose primary laws were fashioned long before he appeared upon the scene and which apply not only to this planet but to the Universe.

**Crown of Creation.**  
Ages before man appeared, by a slow process, involving millions of years of development, the complex forms of vegetable and animal life were built up. Each in turn rested upon the forms below it, controlling and utilizing their forces for its own special needs, and so raising the scale of being by the development of a higher order. In the fulness of time came man. His body is built up of electronic chemical, vegetable and animal units, moulded into bones and flesh, muscles and nerves, all developed into an organic system, fashioned to enable the individual spirit of the man to exercise an unified control, over these subordinate forces. of himself. David, voicing this cry, says: "What is man that Thou art mindful of him, the son of man that Thou visitest him?"  
We may fall far below the measure of David's spiritual insight, but it is given to us today, in the light of present knowledge, to fill in some of the details of his picture for we can discern somewhat of the manner in which the uplift of man was effected. We can see how life rose from the single germ, through the vegetable and animal kingdoms to man. We note that such rise follows upon and is ever associated with an increasing development and complexity of bodily structure. Viewed from the outside, we can see how individual life rose from a mass of jelly to a highly organized body possessed of bones, flesh and a nervous system, the whole operating through special organs, some having to do with the feeding of the individual, others with his conscious contact with the world without.

**First Impressions.**  
Viewing the living being in his setting the fact that first impresses itself upon us is the perfect unity of the whole scheme of Creation. It is all co-ordinated, beyond our powers of appreciation. St. Paul fittingly describes the process of life, as evidenced on earth when he says: (Rom. 8-22)  
"For we know that the whole creation groaneth and travaileth in pain together until now." It groaneth, waiting for the far-off event towards which everything is tending. As looking over the whole field, we observe all the myriad forms of shrubs and of trees, of plants and of flowers, of fishes and of insects, of birds and of animals, we are forced to realize that they are but divers expressions of a co-ordinated whole, and that, in the development of the powers of the individual, and in the ever-growing association of the individuals with each other, is offered the richest field in which to seek a perception of the aim and object of existence. This being the case, and as any part must to some extent embody an epitome of the whole, listen to what Maurice Maeterlinck has to tell of one particular form of life. It has to do only with a humble insect, but those who know what a revelation his study of the Bee imparted, will realize that it may afford material for far-reaching reflection.

**The Ant.**  
The Termitte—commonly known as the White Ant, and of which there are over a hundred species, was in existence at least a hundred millions years before man appeared, yet Maeterlinck says that their civilization is the earliest, the most curious, the most complex, the most intelligent and in a sense the most logical and best fitted to the difficulties of existence, which has ever appeared on the Globe. Let this thought sink deeply into our minds, for it concerns not merely the termitte, but all life.  
The Big Termitte inhabits only tropical climates, yet it perishes if exposed to the sun. It is sometimes as big as a small domestic bee, lives wholly underground. It is blind. It builds its home, often twelve feet in height and of corresponding diameter. This home is protected on the outside by a thick coating of cement which the working termitte makes from sand and fluid which it exudes from its own body. Hatchet steel breaks against it. Heavy cattle climb over without making any impression upon it. It breaks into it one needs heavy tools and gunpowder. There are millions of workers in each colony. They never make their way to the open. If they wish to attack a farmer's cart or a house they build a tube which will give them access to it. They are born, live and die without seeing the light of day. Yet their community is most highly organized both for their own development and for protection against their enemies. They have their sappers, their engineers and their soldiers. They develop eleven to fifteen types from eggs that appear to be identical. Their workers may be either male or female, but the sex is completely atrophied, sacrificed to the common good. They have no weapons, no wings. It is the workers exclusive task to gather food, to prepare it and digest it, for it is part of their duty to feed all the other members of the community. Their food consists of wood, roots, brambles, grass of any sort, and digest this food their stomachs are literally packed with four kinds of parasites, which digest the wood, die, and in turn are digested by the termitte. If a termitte feels hungry it taps a passing worker with its antenna and the worker at once gives it whatever it may have in its stomach. The workers of this species we are studying are divided into two classes—the first equipped with powerful mandibles; with these they cut up the wood and other materials which shall serve for food, and they travel far under covered ways, to obtain it. The second class, which is more numerous, stay at home, care for the eggs, the larvae, the nymphs, attend to feeding the Queen, the King, the warriors and generally to the cares of the household.

**Central Control.**  
The Termitary is indeed a city and a castle. It is filled with large halls, supported on pillars, chambers, corridors, passage ways, in which sidings are provided so that carriers with vituals can pass. If the traffic is dense they keep one way for going and another for returning. With a view to ensuring the defence of its home the community has produced, out of eggs in all respects similar to those from which the workers are hatched, a monster, with mandibles that exceed in bulk all the rest of his body. These piners are as tough as steel and are so heavy and cumbersome that the insect is incapable of eating, and has to be fed. If a breach is made in the outer wall they line up, shoulder to shoulder, outside of it and present an impenetrable barrier while the workers rush to rebuild the fracture. In doing this they shut the warriors
