CHICAGO, May 8—Canadians residing in Chicago are contemplating the erection of a building of their own in the downtown section of the city, in which would be located all the Canadian organizations. The plans are being projected by the recently organized Canadian club, and will be exploited at the banquet of the society tomorrow evening in the LaSalle hotel. It has been ascertained that there are many organizations of former Canadians here, and it is hoped to get banks, steamship agencies, railroad offices and kindred Canadian concerns housed in the same building. Parliament officers of the Canadian club will be elected tomorrow evening. The temporary officers are: President, Dr. Thomas A. Woodruff; First Vice-President, Charles L. Mahony; Second Vice-President, E. C. Jarvis; Secretary, Thomas F. Lynch; Treasurer, John P. Forster. The new club has 200 charter members.

The firemen were called out at noon yesterday in response to an alarm for a fire at the McKay House, Charlottetown, opposite the Railway Station. The occupants are about to move and put some old rags into the stove which were carried up the flue and caused the smoke to emerge from an opening in the attic filling the house completely with smoke. No damage was done.

Commencing on Monday, May 13, a mixed train will leave Charlottetown at 6.45 a.m. daily except Sunday for Souris, instead of on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, according to the present arrangement, and will leave Souris at 1.10 p.m. daily except Sunday, for Charlottetown, instead of on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, as at present. This arrangement will give a round trip freight and passenger service each day between Charlottetown, Souris, and also Charlottetown and Montague and Georgetown.

Robert Wakeland, Charlottetown, of Goff Bros, a member of the Charlottetown Fire Department Hook & Ladder Co, was badly injured yesterday while going to the fire at McKay House. Mr. Wakeland, with the other members of the corps, was running along with the salvage wagon, intending to attach it to the rear of Moore & McLeod's delivery wagon, in which John Webster, one of the firemen, was seated. When in the act of jumping up on the latter wagon, Mr. Wakeland slipped and fell. The salvage wagon which was being propelled at a high rate of speed, struck him. The pole came in contact with his left hip bone, which was fractured and the cross bar struck him in the breast, breaking four ribs. Mr. Wakeland, who was rendered unconscious by the blow, was carried into the Two Maas' drugstore, and Dr. Dorsey summoned. After the injuries had been examined, Mr. Wakeland was removed to his home in the ambulance. It was some time after the accident before he recovered consciousness. His injuries are too painful to permit immediate removal to a hospital.

HART'S ESCAPE  
LIVERPOOL, 9 May, 9—Thomas Hart, a fireman who was supposed to have been drowned in the sinking of the Titanic, has according to his mother's statement, turned up alive. The explanation is made that Hart's discharge book was stolen from him and it was used by another man to sign on the Titanic under Hart's name.

THE GRAND TRUNK FIREMEN WANT HIGHER PAY.  
MONTREAL, May 8—Inspired by the recent grant of the general increase of ten per cent. to Grand Trunk engineers, the company's firemen are stating a big campaign for an increase in pay. This was earned from local members of the firemen's brotherhood, who declare that all organization work has been completed, and that next week a reputation of representatives of the firemen's unions from all points on the Grand Trunk system will wait on the officials of the company to demand a twenty per cent. increase. The officials of the company decline to make any statement regarding the possibility of the increase being granted.

ASTOR LEFT BULK OF BIG ESTATE TO SON.  
NEW YORK, May 8—Counsel for the family made public tonight the will of John Jacob Astor, as drawn in this city in September last, only a few days after his marriage to Miss Madeline Force, and approximately seven months before his perishing on the Titanic.  
Vincent Astor, a son, who will come of age within the year, is made the principal beneficiary and residuary legatee. No hint as to the value of the local estate is given and by the creation of trust funds the testator has followed, as far as possible, the custom of his forefathers in keeping his vast holdings intact. Valuations of the estate run anywhere from \$75,000,000 to \$150,000,000.
