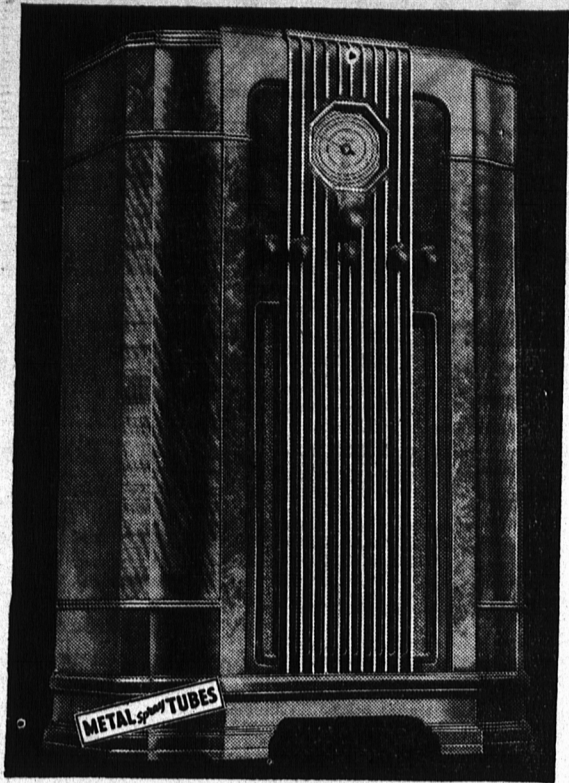


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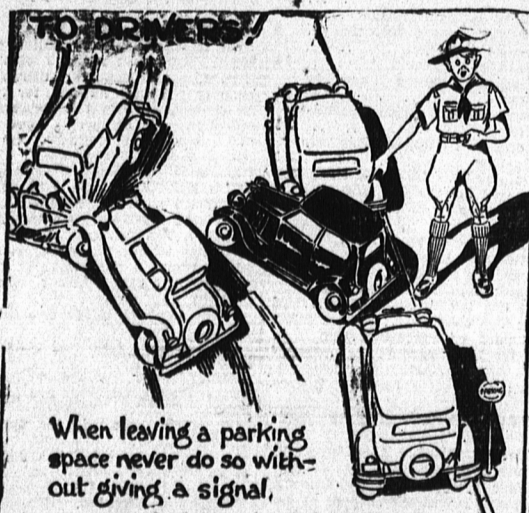

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. ARTHUR CASFORD

On Friday, October 11, 1935, Mrs. Arthur Casford of Brackley Point, P.E.I., died suddenly at her home here. Coming as it did without any warning whatsoever her beloved husband and kindred and neighbors were terribly shocked indeed. Mrs. Casford was seemingly in her normal good health, and was engaged in her regular housework when overtaken by a stroke. Members of the household working outside at the time did not happen to enter the house again until about four o'clock, when she was found lying where she had fallen, and unable to speak. Everything that love and skill could do failed to restore her, and at eleven o'clock that night she died. Verily, "we know not what the day may bring forth." Mrs. Casford, whose maiden name was Louise Stevenson, was a daughter of the late Robert Stevenson of Wheatley River, and his wife Elizabeth Waye. Her girlhood was lived on the family homestead in Wheatley River, near the United Church there. She was a communicant member of this church, and long a member of the choir. In February 1918, about eighteen years ago, she married Mr. Arthur Casford of Brackley Point, and since then has lived happily in the Brackley Point home. Without children his wife's tragic call leaves the greater blank loneliness in her husband's life, and the sympathy and sorrow of the community goes out to Mr. Casford in his sad loss. Mrs. Casford is also survived by five sisters, Miss Martha Stevenson of Boston, Mass., who came home to her funeral; Lucy, Mrs. L. Hart, and Jane, Mrs. Claude Barr both in Vermont; Fannie, Mrs. Harry Simpson after Basic; and by four brothers, David Stevenson in Sask. Fred in Calgary and Robert and James resident on the homestead in Wheatley River. Funeral services were conducted in her late home in Brackley Point on Wednesday, October 16 by her minister, Rev. Thos. A. Wilson of West Covehead, and in the United Church at Wheatley River, where Mr. Wilson was assisted by Rev. F. E. Boothroyd of Hunter River, Minister of the Wheatley River Church. The funeral address was based on the text Ex. 34:2 "Be ready in the morning," as summing up God's message to us all in this tragically unexpected call. Burial was in the cemetery beside the church, wherein years before she had professed her christian faith, and nearby her childhood home. The pallbearers were Messrs. Ever-shaw, Nelson Stead, Robert Sellar, H. W. Cudmore, Cleve Robinson and George Hughes. Friends and neighbors of Brackley Point, Wheatley River and vicinity deeply sympathize with the bereaved husband, brothers, and sisters.
