City Council

The following police report was
 submitted to the City Council at
 their monthly meeting.
 A total of 42 arrests were made
 in Charlottetown during the month
 the Police Report indicated. They
 were classified as follows:

POLICE REPORT

For the month ended Nov. 30,
 1938.
 Arrests within the City limits
 during November amounted to
 forty two (42) under the following
 classified offences:
 Beating food bill 1; Drunk and
 Disorderly 6; Drunk and Inebriated
 17; Insanity 1; Operating motor
 vehicle without license 2; operat-
 ing motor vehicle with defective
 brakes 1; operating motor vehicle
 to common danger 1; taking motor
 vehicle to operate without consent
 of owner 1; theft of motor truck 1;
 theft from motor vehicle 4; veg-
 rancy 7.

There were four convictions
 under the Prohibition Act for the
 unlawful sale or possession of in-
 toxicating liquor: one under the
 Excise Act for unlawful possession
 of spirits; one for operating motor
 vehicle while under suspension;
 one for speeding; one for trucking
 without license and one for cruelty
 to animal.

The amounts collected in fines
 and costs during November are as
 follows: Prohibition 12; Trucking
 Excise fine \$100.00; miscellaneous
 fines and costs \$123.50; total
 amount collected \$223.50.

On November 21st the Force col-
 lected fifty two samples of milk
 from store-keepers, and nine
 samples of cream from stall-hold-
 ers in the Market, on November
 22nd and 25th, delivering same to
 City Analyst for test. One sample
 of milk contained sediment and
 the store-keeper from whom pur-
 chase was summoned and charged
 1 one His Honor the Stipendiary
 Magistrate, under the by-law re-
 specting milk and milk vendors, a
 fine of five dollars and costs being
 imposed.

Other duties performed during
 the month include the following:
 Prisoners escorted to County Jail
 53; prisoners escorted from jail to
 Police Court for trial 13; Ticket-of-
 Leave reports 2; Summonses served
 7; Subpoenas 3; transients in Sta-
 tion overnight 4; motor vehicles
 checked as to condition of brakes,
 lights, etc. 2nd and 3rd.

Annual leave of absence, with
 pay, was granted during November
 as follows:—Constable Dowling, A.
 J., Nov. 6th to 10th; Constable
 Lund A. J., Nov. 11th to 14th; Con-
 stable McInnis, L. A., was off
 duty sick from November 14th to
 20th; Constable Jay, C. B., off duty
 sick on November 23rd and 24th.

The report prepared by Chief of
 Police A. Birtwistle was read at
 Monday night's meeting by Coun.
 Heath McIntyre, chairman of the
 Police Committee.

MEAT & MILK INSPECTION

Inspector Dr. Croken reported 82
 portions of meat condemned dur-
 ing the month as unfit for food.
 52 samples of milk and 9 samples
 of cream were taken. Slight sedi-
 ment was found in one milk
 sample and the vendor prosecuted.
 The others were quite satisfactory.

Coun. Holman asked if sediment
 had ever been found in pasteurized
 milk. Dr. Croken replied in the
 negative.

SANITARY OFFICER

"All restaurants, public lavato-
 ries and toilets eight public lav-
 and ten public stables; one slaugh-
 ter house, eleven pig pens, and a
 number of private yards were in-
 spected during the month of No-
 vember. Mr. M. W. Reardon, sani-
 tary officer told in his report to
 the Council. In addition he re-
 ported several calls made to differ-
 ent parts of the city.

Other activities were listed as
 follows: Notified the Hygiene Service
 Company to remove three nuisanc-
 es from the streets.
 Inspected the "dump" of the
 Hygiene Service Company, and
 found it satisfactory.

No communicable diseases were
 reported in the City during the
 month of November. Dr. B. C.
 Keeney, deputy minister of health
 reported at the monthly meeting
 of the City Council last night. In
 that period 77 chest examinations
 were made. Other work of his De-
 partment included:

Laboratory examinations: Sputa,
 36; urinalysis, 10; blood, 10; bacilli
 bacillus abortus, 3; Kahn, 83;
 smears for Gonococcus, 3; throat
 swabs 1; spinal fluid, colloidal
 gold; 3; Kahn; 2; stools for typhoid
 2; cell count 2; waters, 25; milk,
 butterfat, sed. and sp. gravity, 52;
 creams for butterfat 9.

General disease report: Patients
 treated: males 22, females 10. Total
 32. New cases reported, males 2,
 females 1. Total 3. Total number of
 treatments given during the month
 240.

Home nursing report: 80 pupils
 examined in annual inspection
 West Kent School. Junior home
 nursing lessons started in West
 Kent and Rochford Square
 Schools. 18 senior home nursing
 lessons given to students of short
 course. 18 home visits made.

Vital statistics report: (City of
 Charlottetown): Births 33, deaths,
 15, marriages 19.

**Will Give Course In
 Forest Entomology**

FREDERICTON, Dec. 12 (CP)—
 A chair in forest entomology,
 the first to be established at a
 Canadian University, will be added
 to the Forestry school of the Uni-
 versity of New Brunswick.

Termed it as probably the most
 important advance since the estab-
 lishment of the school of Forestry
 in 1908. Hon. F. W. Paris, Min-
 ister of Lands and Mines, today
 explained that two years of under-
 graduate instruction would be giv-
 en. In addition, a one year post
 graduate course leading to a mas-
 ter's degree will be offered.

The decision of the Government
 to add the new course to the Uni-
 versity Curriculum followed the re-
 quest of a delegation representing
 the U. N. B. Senate, and was in
 keeping with a desire of the
 lumbering and pulp and paper in-
 dustries, the Minister said.

**New Trial
 Ordered**

OTTAWA, Dec. 12—(CP)—The
 Supreme Court of Canada today
 ordered a new trial of the case of
 Alfred Watson against the Cana-
 dian National Steamship Com-
 pany. Watson was a carpenter em-
 ployed on the S. S. Cornwallis
 which was proceeding from the
 West Indies to Charlottetown.

While he was busy putting lock-
 ing bars on the hatches a wave
 swept over the deck and threw him
 against the bulkhead. The jury in
 a trial at Montreal found the ac-
 cident was due to the negligence
 of the Company in that if the
 ship's chief officer had ordered
 life lines erected earlier it would
 not have happened. Watson was
 awarded \$4,000 for his injuries.

The Court of King's Bench up-
 held the verdict and the Company
 appealed to the Supreme Court of
 Canada.
