**CURTAINS PROGRAM OF AIR DEFENCE**

LONDON, Dec. 27.—Sir Samuel Hoare, head of the Air Ministry, announced in a speech in the House of Commons that Great Britain will postpone fulfillment of her present air defense program in view of the clearer and more peaceful European skies resulting from the Locarno agreements.

"If other nations follow this example," he said, "all the governments will be enabled to avoid in the years to come a race in armaments far more disastrous than the world has ever endured."

The plan for a home defence force of 52 squadrons remains intact, but the Minister said that the normal rise in air costs by thirty per cent during 1926, making expenditures of over £20,000,000 as compared with £18,000,000 in 1925, would be materially curtailed by recommendations he has made to the government and which he believed justified by the changed situation in Europe.

"Although our inferiority in air forces as compared with other powers is still notorious, and an air attack is the most dangerous form of attack to which these shores are liable," said Sir Samuel, "we are prepared, by reason of the Locarno pact, to spread out our programme of defence."

The Minister stated that the British air force which had an inferiority of one to ten when he assumed office, still had an inferiority of 1 to 3 as compared with the nearest continental air force.

**Reinhardt Says American Jazz Is Spirit Of Times**

BERLIN, Dec. 27.—America through its jazz rhythm and modern dance has found the proper expression for the spirit of modern times better than any other nation, in the opinion of Max Reinhardt.

"That John Barrymore is the greatest American actor, Jeanne Eagles and Lenore Ulrich top-notch actresses, and Bell-Geddes a veritable genius in devising stage scenery, were further opinions voiced by The Associated Press by the noted German stage director.

Hamlet in full evening dress and Shylock in bathing togs costumed so much nonsense, said Reinhardt.

"America is on the threshold of tremendous theatrical future," Reinhardt observed. "There is a yearning a craving among American theatergoers for the best in art such as is equalled in but few countries."

"This yearning, coupled with our American temperament—impetuous, to use a slang expression—and with the capacity of your people to absorb new ideas, predestines America for a leading position in theatrical art."

Elaborating his ideas concerning jazz, Reinhardt explained:

"The American feeling for rhythm, as exemplified in jazz, gives better expression to the spirit of our time than any other form of music. Jazz is literally crying for someone to do it what, for instance, Johann Strauss did for the waltz—give it concrete expression in a manner that will endure through generations."

"It is going too far, according to Reinhardt, to produce Hamlet in evening dress, suit, or to lay the scene of the Merchant of Venice in the fashionable Lido of Venice, with Shylock in bathing togs, as suggested by one theater producer. At the same time he is not opposed to the idea of giving a modern setting to old dramas in which the time element is important."

"Remember that the Shakespearean plays themselves were offered in Elizabethan costumes when first produced," he said, although, the scenes were often laid centuries earlier.

"In the course of my work as stage manager I have often observed that actors made a stronger impression during rehearsals, when they

**Will Protect Name Of Hudson's Bay Co.**

WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 27.—Aroused by what they regard as an unjustifiable slur upon the name of the historic company and its pioneer employees, the government and committee of the Hudson's Bay Company have issued a warning to writers of Northland fiction that liberties with the name of the company will not be tolerated in the future.

In a letter sent to Prof. W. T. Allison, president of the Canadian Authors' association, J. Chadwick Brooks, secretary of the company in Winnipeg, states that a ban has been placed on H. B. C. villains and that offending authors will be sued for libel.

The official remonstrance of the executive officers, as expressed in the communication, is as follows:

"The attention of the government and committee of Hudson's Bay Company has been drawn to numerous publications of popular fiction in which references are made to alleged methods employed by the company in its fur trading business. In many cases also it is implied that reprehensible actions on the part of the company's employees are instigated or condoned by the company. These statements are misrepresentative and are distinctly derogatory of the company."

"While it was felt that an isolated instance might be ignored, the statement has become so common that it is evident that the company's name and reputation might be injured. The government and committee therefore decided that in all cases where statements are published which imply or otherwise libel the company, legal action should be taken against the authors and publishers. In several instances action has been taken as a result of which apologies have been tendered and the books withdrawn from further sale."

"It is probable that in some instances authors write fiction without fully appreciating the import of some of the statements and references made therein, and they thus unwittingly become liable to suffer loss if the publication has libelous passages. In these circumstances we have thought it advisable to announce that the government and committee feel obliged to protect the company's name and reputation in the manner mentioned."

**Paris Reception For Canadians**

PARIS, Dec. 27.—The municipal city of Paris this afternoon received officials of the Canadian Exhibition train, which has toured France and prominent Frenchmen who contributed to its success including M. Millerand, M. Poincare, M. Lion Le Douarin, Bernard Bonju, prefect of the Seine, Senator Levy Gerardi, Senator Menier and Comte Armand Georges Guillaumin, president of the Municipal Council, and M. Bonju, who was recently promoted from the Mantes Prefecture, welcomed Senator A. L. Beaubien, who addressed the gathering and read a cable from Premier Mackenzie King of Canada, expressing appreciation of the way France had encouraged Canadian industry. Senator Beaubien said Premier King had named Lenoir, the well-known French artist to design plaquettes, to be struck for the occasion by the French Mint, and presented to the prominent persons present in recognition of their services.

M. Duplas, president of the French committee, closed the proceedings with a charming speech, in which he alluded to the international work of Senator Raoul Dandurand, president of the League of Nations; Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, speaker of the last Canadian House of Commons; Philippe Roy, agent-general for Canada in France, and Senator Joseph M. Wilson of Montreal. The band of the Gardie Republicaine entertained the thousand people present at the City Hall.
