EASTERN NOTES.—Warm and summer weather is here the last week, and crops are doing fairly well. The harvest of the sea has been disappointing, so far as cod were concerned in the great cod district from South Lake to Little Harbor. A school of hake is on our shores now, their chief resort is from Basin Head west, the sandy bottom from Basin Head to East Point not being congenial to their tastes, or agreeable to their habits. A scarcity of bait has seriously affected the catch of cod, and the present outlook for bait for hake is by no means light. The large summer herring which at one time resorted to our waters in warm weather have entirely forsaken us the last few years, while the American purse seine has nearly finished our once magnificent mackerel fisheries. The lobster season has been a particularly good one, especially on the North Shore.—Our cheese factories are getting a fair supply of milk, though far short of the average year, and it is to be hoped that a strong effort on the part of their patrons will tide them over to more prosperous times.—Miss Elva Stewart teacher at Brudnell, has been visiting her friends here.—Mrs Taylor and daughter are spending the summer with her father A. W. Bruce.—Commercial travellers follow each other in rapid succession the last weeks.
