EARNEST FRASER

On Wednesday, October 16th, Mr. Daniel Fraser, Montague R. R. I. received a telegram conveying the sad news that his son, Ernest Fraser of the Canadian Engineers died of pneumonia on October 12th in the Lord Derby War Hospital, Warrington, England. The deceased was born at Whim Road Cross, where he spent his boyhood days. In 1904 he won the King's County Scholarship in the Matriculation Examination for entrance to Prince of Wales College. He attended that institution where he won a second year certificate and first class license, passing with exceptionally high marks. After having taught school on P. E. I. for a short time he went out to B. C. in 1908 accompanied by his brother Malcolm, who was killed in action at Ypres, June 3rd, 1916. There he was a most successful teacher, being principal of Merritt and other town schools in B. C. His health failing him, he then took up engineering, where, by his exceptional ability, he succeeded in becoming a resident engineer on the Kettle Valley and Pacific Great Eastern Railways. In July 1915, he gave up his remunerative position and enlisted as a private in the 62nd battalion at Vernon, B. C. In December he was transferred to the Canadian Engineers in North Vancouver. ## A STATEMENT AND AN APPEAL TO YOU ON BEHALF OF THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND HOSPITAL

More than thirty five years ago the Prince Edward Island Hospital was started through the efforts and contributions of a number of generous and public spirited men and women. During all these years the Hospital has been the means of alleviating suffering and of saving precious lives and by receiving many very generous contributions the Institution has been kept up to date in equipment and enlarged to meet the growing demand for hospital treatment until today it is one of the best equipped hospitals east of Montreal. Up to the end of the year 1914 the receipts from patients fees, interest from endowment fund and some small contributions from the city and country districts were just about sufficient to meet all running expenses but with the tremendous increase in prices of everything used in the Hospital the financial problem became a serious one and we have had to face a rapidly increasing deficit which now amounts to nearly \$6000.00.

Here is an illustration of the increase in cost of five items.

Total increase in five items \$6661.39  
And no saving can be made on any one of these items. The Hospital must be kept as warm, the patients as well fed as before prices advanced. No great increase can be made in patients fees as it has been the aim of the management to provide first class accommodation at as low a price as possible. Those who are unable to pay are treated free.

It is therefore up to you to say by your response to this appeal whether the Hospital shall lessen, maintain or increase its usefulness.

In order that you may have an opportunity of contributing Queens and King's Counties have been organized by school districts, an executive of three appointed in each district and this executive will appoint collectors who will call on you or shortly after the first of November. Please be ready for them with liberal and increased subscriptions in proportion to the increased cost of everything the Hospital has to buy. It is up to you.

Give the collectors a hearty reception.
