THE SERBIAN SITUATION.

It will be remembered that after the assassination of King Alexander, Great Britain, France, Germany and Italy withdrew their representatives from Belgrade. These powers sent no messages to King Peter, nor have they in any official manner recognized him as king. Russia and Austria have on the contrary recognized the new monarch and sent him their good wishes, but at the same time denouncing the murderers of Alexander and intimating the hope that they would be brought to punishment. This has not been done, nor is there any apparent prospect that Peter will punish in any proper and sufficient manner the red-handed assassins to whom he owes his promotion. The situation therefore is that diplomatic relations have been and remain broken off between Serbia and four of the six great powers of Europe.

In former times the severance of diplomatic relations was but the prelude to war. When in 1793 the French people struck off the head of Louis XVI Great Britain at once broke off diplomatic relations with France as she has now done with Serbia, and ordered the French Ambassador to leave England. War followed at once. But Serbia cannot afford to go to war with Britain, Germany, France and Italy. No doubt the policy adopted by these powers was

unusual, but the crimes which prompted that course were not only extraordinary but so revolting that some impressive form of condemnation must be considered necessary. But this condition of severed relations can hardly be continued indefinitely. The Government of Great Britain for instance, must in some way continue to transact business with the Government of Serbia. For the time this can only be done through the representative of some friendly power. In the end, should King Peter establish his power firmly, coupled with the maintenance of order, diplomatic relations will be resumed, after sufficient time to mark the British reprobation of the regicide. It is a maxim of international law that no power can continue for an indefinite time to shut its eyes to accomplished facts.

A VERDICT OF "GUILTY."

There was a solemn scene in the Supreme Court room yesterday afternoon when the jury in the murder case returned with their verdict. The three Judges of the Court were present. The officials of the Court and a considerable number of spectators were present. There had been a rumor about town not generally credited and no doubt arising solely from the fact that the jury had been out for some time, that there was a disagreement among them. One glance at the solemn and set faces of the jury, as they filed in was, however sufficient to tell that they had reached a stern and unanimous decision. The prisoner, looking upon the jury, as he was commanded to do, while they looked upon him, could read no gleam of hope in their faces. And he seemed to feel the awfulness of the fearful moment, when the jury were asked "How find you the prisoner at the bar, is he guilty or not guilty?" Foreman Anthony Essory replied in low and solemn tone, barely audible in the hush of the Court room, "Guilty, with a strong recommendation to mercy."

Then the prisoner was led back to jail and the twelve jurymen upon whom so great a duty and responsibility had been imposed were discharged from further duty for the time and sought relief in the open air. Sentence will be imposed, presumably, at the close of the Court's present sittings. Pending the completion of the trial in that way no comment upon the crime, the evidence, or the verdict would be in order or would be expected by our readers.

It turns out that the \$15,000 noted in our despatches as a federal grant for telegraph service is given in aid of a press cable service between Canada and the Mother Country. This is well and necessary too, but when, in the name of all that's federal are we to have a modern telegraph service for Prince Edward Island? Down to date we have nothing better to report than when we last referred to the subject—"nothing done and nothing doing." In this matter the Island people are being treated by those in authority if we have no rights that anybody is bound to respect.

The death is announced of Andrew F. Gault, President of the Dominion Cotton Company of Montreal and one of the foremost captains of Canadian industry. He was born in Ireland in 1833 and accompanied his parents to Canada in early life. He obtained a business training in the dry goods trade, and in 1867 associated with him his brother Robert in the since widely known firm of Gault Brothers & Co. He was long connected prominently with both the cotton and woolen industries and has been frequently spoken of as the Cotton King of Canada. He was a prominent member of the Church of England and among other public donations during his lifetime gave \$150,000 towards the erection of the Montreal Diocesan Theological College.


