A WRITER in the Ottawa Free Press says:—The meeting of the National Council of the Woman of Canada opened in London, Ont., on Thursday. Some of the most sensible as well as brilliant women of this country are attending the meeting, and what is said and done there will be heard with interest by all. There are always those who say that the National Council is going to pieces, but they must begin to doubt their own powers of prophecy when they hear of the large attendance at these annual meetings.—It is understood that all the provinces with the exception of P. E. Island are represented.

THE Toronto World of the 18th says:—In the House of Commons today E. F. Clarke raised the question of the tax on commercial travelers, imposed by the Province of Prince Edward Island. He asked if any effort was being made to remove the tax. The Minister of Marine and Fisheries replied that Prince Edward Island makes the contention that the tax on commercial travelers is no heavier than impositions on local businesses of a similar kind. W. F. McLean held that the tax conflicted with the terms of Confederation, and as such was ultra vires. Sir Louis Davies assured the House that the question was engaging the close attention of the Minister of Justice, who is now in communication with the Government of Prince Edward Island.
