CHEESE FACTORY BURNED—On Saturday evening about 9 o'clock, the East River Cheese Factory at Fort Augustus was destroyed by fire which is supposed to have started in the boiler-room. No one was in the factory at the time. The factory was well equipped with about 75 patrons and was erected 34 years ago. The plant was valued at \$3,000, with one-third of the loss covered by insurance.

POLICE COURT—At the police court yesterday morning four drunk and incapables were fined \$5 or 20 days and two others \$5 or 30 days. Two drunk and disorderlies were each fined \$20 and \$10 or 30 days respectively. One defendant in a case of vagrancy was given three months in jail. One speeder was fined \$10 or 30 days, another was dismissed. A sanitary by-law case was dismissed. Two other cases of drunk and disorderly were dismissed.

IN PORT—The yacht "Kabob," Capt. George Killam of Yarmouth, and party consisting of R.H. MacLean of Bathurst, Harry J. Yman, of Yarmouth and Byron Windsor of Montreal, put into Charlottetown Harbor Sunday evening in the teeth of a heavy gale and is remaining here until the weather moderates. The "Kabob" left Yarmouth three weeks ago last Friday and sailed up the St. Lawrence as far as Metis. She went north as far as Anticosti. The party landed on this interesting island which was formerly owned by Menier, the great chocolate king, and is now the property of a large pulp company. The "Kabob" is a staunch auxiliary craft about 45 feet over all and her seafaring qualities were well tested in making Charlottetown Harbor safely.

HORSE HAD TO BE KILLED—On Saturday evening about 7 o'clock when three horses were being driven across St. Peter's Road to pasture about a mile outside the City, a car driven by a party from Grand Tracadie on the wrong side of the road, it is alleged, struck the finest of the three, a three-year-old mare, claimed by the owner, Mr. Rankine McLaine, to be one of the best in the province. The animal sustained a broken leg and a severe wound on the side and was dispatched, the Guardian is reliably informed, in less than fifteen minutes after the accident. The driver was yesterday obliged to submit to an examination by City Police Officers of his brakes, which were found to be in very poor condition. The animal was being prepared for exhibit at the approaching Provincial Exhibition.

HORSE KILLED AT KENSINGTON—About a mile and a half east of Kensington on Sunday, when a Mr. Birt, who lives in that vicinity, was driving in his buggy, a car driven by a Charlottetown boy struck his horse which sustained such severe injuries that it had to be shot. Mr. Birt was thrown out of the buggy, but was not seriously hurt. The driver of the car, however, suffered injuries which necessitated a doctor's care. It is understood that the accident occurred when the driver of the car, seeing the buggy on the wrong side of the road and that thinking it would remain there, swerved over to the left and struck the horse which had too late been directed to the same side. The carcass of the animal and the wrecked wagon which was permitted to remain on the side of the road during the heavy car traffic of Sunday, attracted much unfavorable comment.

CROP REPORT

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—The dry hot weather is causing crops on the prairies to ripen early. Considerable barley has been already cut in Manitoba, and some fields of reward wheat. The crop report issued today by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics shows that all the prairie provinces were suffering from lack of grain. In Manitoba—Reported "all crops thin, yields will average below fifty percent." Alberta reports a good winter wheat crop, and winter rye a fair crop. Wheat harvesting will start next week in southern Alberta and will be general in about two weeks. Harvesting will be general in Saskatchewan by August 12. The best crops in Saskatchewan are to be found in the north, but there also rain is needed in many places. Conditions are good in Prince Edward Island. Nova Scotia has suffered a little from the drought, as has New Brunswick. Good hay crops are reported from both Ontario and Quebec. In Ontario the fall wheat threshing has commenced and the yield is above the average.

In Quebec

Cap Rouge—At this farm clover and timothy hay all stored in good condition. In district hay and pastures good. Haying half done, grain silage, corn and potatoes took well. Bush fruits and cherry crops good. Apples, ornamental plants, and garden crops except peas, are promising. Lennoxville, eighty-five percent of hay harvested under very favorable conditions, quality excellent. Only one half inch of rain has fallen the past fifteen days and all crops are feeling the lack of moisture. La Ferme, drought has retarded growth during the last two weeks but recent rains have improved the situation. Hay making is nearly over. All cereals are headed and will yield fairly. Plowing is going on. Gardens and hoed crops look well. Pastures are good and cattle are in good condition.

Situation in P. E. I.

Charlottetown—Beneficial showers throughout July have improved all crops. Hay-making well advanced. Crop well saved and above average in central districts. Lighter both east and west. Cereals well headed and good color, straw short. Roots, corn and potatoes above average. Pastures and live stock in good condition.

Nova Scotia

Amherst—Hay crop below average, twenty percent harvested. Pasture fair. Roots and silage crop showing effects of drought. Early grain heading fairly well, late sown greatly in need of rain. Bush fruits average crop, seventy-five percent harvested. Kentville—July rainfall below average. Nearly an inch on July 20, recovered crops which are again suffering. Haying well along with yield nearly average. Roots, potatoes greatly in need of rain, corn good. Grains suffering, growth being pinched. Apples not adversely affected yet but continued drought may shorten crop yield materially.

New Brunswick

Fredericton, upland hay good crop, interval fair, ideal hay making weather enabling farmers to store hay in good condition. Grain, roots, potatoes, vegetables making satisfactory growth, but rain is necessary. Corn
