News Briefs

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Nov. 22.—(AP)—President Roosevelt disclosed today that he had asked Gen. John J. Pershing to become United States Ambassador to the Petain Government at Vichy, France, but that Gen. Pershing had declined on the advice of his physicians. The 80-year-old commander of the United States armies in France in 1918 has been in poor health for several years.

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Nov. 22.—(AP)—President Roosevelt indicated at a press conference today that, under present conditions, United States aid to Britain is near its peak. He said that every thing possible is being done at the present time.

OTTAWA, Nov. 22.—(CP)—Thomas Church (Cons.) Toronto-Broadview, introduced in the Commons a bill to amend the Militia Act to eliminate exemption of conscientious objectors from militia service.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—(CP)—T. E. Naylor, labor member of Parliament, announced today that he would ask Prime Minister Churchill to "invoke the good offices of the Vatican or some neutral states" to seek a 48-hour Christmas armistice.

OTTAWA, Nov. 22.—(CP)—A House of Commons committee to review the Defence of Canada Regulations under which subversive elements and alien enemies in this country are interned will get down to work as soon as Parliament resumes after the Christmas recess, Justice Minister Lapointe said today.

OTTAWA, Nov. 22.—(CP)—Canadian shipments of eggs to Great Britain in the first 10 months of 1940 totalled more than 350,000 cases of 10,500,000 dozen eggs, compared with 1,024,070 dozen eggs shipped to the United Kingdom in 1939, the Agriculture Department announced today. There still exists this year an opportunity to ship an additional quantity under the last British treasury sanctions for the purchase of eggs in Canada, the department statement said.

EDMONTON, Nov. 22.—(CP)—Advertising in newspapers was the reason Alberta was the only province to increase its tourist business this year, according to D. E. C. Campbell, director of publicity for the provincial government. Promotional work in the United States, carried out by the government prior to the tourist season, resulted in tourist business in Alberta in 1940 increasing by \$2,000,000 to \$6,000,000, he told the Edmonton branch of the Alberta Motor Association last night.

TORONTO, Nov. 22.—(CP)—The Canadian national committee for mental hygiene in a statement here today expressed disapproval of the announcement from a National Defence department spokesman in Ottawa yesterday that Canadians will not take psychiatric examinations before beginning training under Canada's compulsory military training plan. 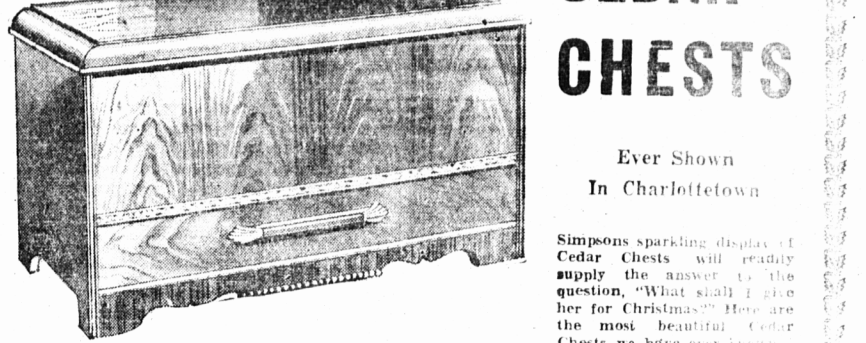

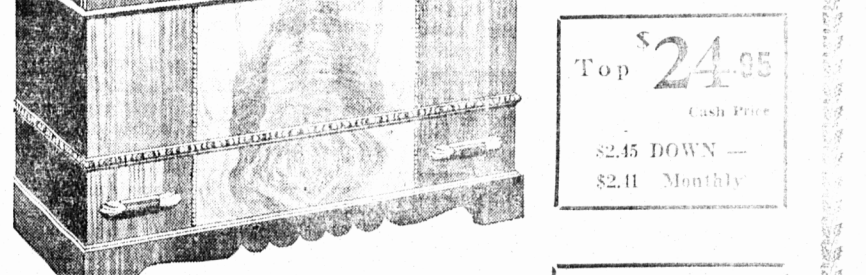

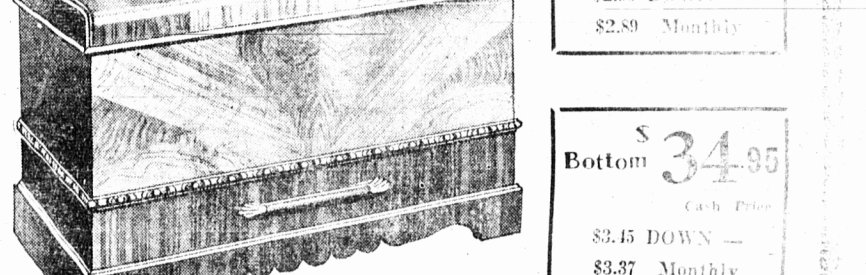
