The office of the Secretary of the Publicity Association is a busy place at the present time as fiddlers from different sections call to enter their applications and pit their skill against the present champions of Prince Edward Island.

Arrangements are being made to insure the success of the meet by making certain that the two champions of Nova Scotia shall arrive in plenty of time to meet our island performers on the opening night.

Competition is so keen in Nova Scotia that it has been impossible to decide between Malcolm H. Gillis and Mike McInnis and they have both been declared champions. Neil Cheverie came up against McInnis in Boston and the contest was so close that on the first evening McInnis won. A challenge was immediately issued by W. R. Tinney, who accompanied Cheverie to Boston and on this occasion Mr. Cheverie defeated McInnis and won a beautiful silver trophy. As it stands at present each of these gentlemen has one win to his credit and is naturally anxious to meet again to have the final decision made. Greece Will Demand \$32,000,000 From United States

ATHENS, July 5. - President Pangalos, in an interview took July 5 as an occasion to announce he would "demand" payment of the balance of American war credits to Greece amounting to \$32,000,000 before discussing the settlement of the Greek war debt to the United States.

"We expect to raise a loan of \$15,000,000 abroad this summer," Pangalos said. "After that I will demand merely payment of the United States pay Greece \$32,000,000, the balance of her war credits. I am sure that the United States will not refuse its undertaken obligations."

"After the payment of the balance of the credits I am ready to discuss with the United States the settlement of the total debt."

British Aircraft Manoeuvres Attract Big Crowd

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, July 5. - The Kings and Queens of England and Spain and an assorted collection of foreign monarchs from Greece and Portugal, witnessed the greatest demonstration of air pomp in the history of the world yesterday when 180 fighting planes manoeuvred before royalty and a crowd of 150,000 persons at Hendon flying field.

Camp fires are a regular affair with short talks after each.

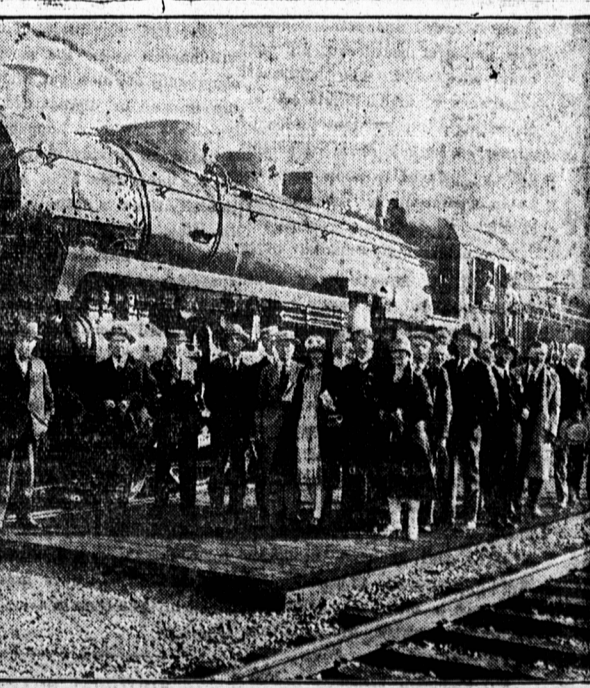
Wednesday the gang intend to hike to Victoria in order to attend the Caledonia Club - Only eleven miles.

Impressed by Superb New Locomotive. It is one of the "2300" class of passenger locomotives, the largest in use by the C.P.R. and employed on their trip for the first time on the Quebec run. With its tender it weighs just about a half a million pounds and for this colossal weight, rails, bridges and general equipment along the Quebec tracks have had to be strengthened. This engine was built in 1923 and notable facts in connection with it are that its boiler pressure is 200 lbs. to the square inch; its driving wheels have a diameter of 75 inches and its tender holds 8,000 imperial gallons of water and twelve tons of coal. The photograph gives a fine view of this superb machine with a group of superintendents who have strolled up to inspect it before it pulled out of the Windsor street station Montreal. All of the five hundred superintendents gave it a thorough inspection before the trip was over.
