**Sensations Are Promised Over Rein-statements of Amateurs in Nova Scotia**

War in amateur sporting circles and no doubt will have far reach in Nova Scotia is probable as a result of the "Good Samaritan" (the first time that the Canadian officials have interfered with the administration of amateur sport in the Maritime Provinces in the way in which they have in New Brunswick.

War is on in earnest in New Brunswick with Moncton as the battleground and Harry E. Blakeney, vice-president of the M.P.B. as the "general" leading all forces against his "tried and trusted friend," Sammy Doyle, the president of the M.P.B.

Mr. Blakeney, it would appear, has the advantage in that his position is solidly entrenched with the backing of the officials of the Canadian body, with J. A. McVicar, the president, directing the operations from his throne in Winnipeg.

It will be remembered that Mr. Blakeney threatened earlier in the season that he would appeal to the Canadian officials to suspend the M.P.B. if Mr. Doyle persisted in granting pasteborders to professional players.

Mr. Doyle paid no heed to the warnings issued by his second officer in command, Mr. Blakeney, who pressed for action and while he did not succeed as yet in having the M.P.B. put out of business temporarily, he has been successful in having a number of this season's reinstated athletes suspended.

Acting on advice from President McVicar, the vice-president of the M.P.B. warned a number of hockey players at Moncton this week that if they played or appeared with or against Jack Ingram, "Chief" Bill Cummings, Verne Dot-caster and Jack Carroll, that they would be suspended.

The teams competing represented Sunny Brae and Moncton. The players whose amateur standing was questioned despite the clear bill of "Amateurism" accorded to them by Mr. Doyle, refused to obey the edict issued by Mr. Blakeney and so did the other players, with the result that all are now under the ban and by direct instructions from the Canadian officials. As there is some doubt as to whether the players received the warnings, not to play with the suspended, an opportunity will be afforded them to escape the suspension, punishment by making a sworn statement that they did not know anything about the edict.

There seems no doubt but that President McVicar will take similar action covering all men in Nova Scotia who were reinstated this winter by Mr. Doyle on his own initiative. The situation promises some sensational developments.

Serino was a member of a gang employed in excavation work in the north end of the city. A stick of dynamite was placed under a rock and the fuse lighted. The victim failed to heed a signal to the men to retire to a safe distance, the charge exploded and the victim, along with a half dozen of rocks was blown skyward.

**Provincial Bank New Appointments Made**

Announcement is made following a recent meeting of the Board of Directors of the Provincial Bank of Canada of the appointment of Joseph deBoucherville, K.C., well known citizen of Montreal and son of a late Prime Minister of the Province of Quebec, as a member of the Board of Commissioners-Censors of the Bank.

This Board is now composed as follows: President, the Hon. N. Perceux, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec; Vice-President, the Hon. E. L. Patenaude, P. C.; Commissioners, Samuel Casavant of the firm Casavant Bros., Limited, St. Hyacinthe; the Hon. Cyrille Delage, N. P., Superintendent of the Public Instruction Department of the Province of Quebec; J. L. Fottin, important merchant and Harbour Commissioner of the City of Three Rivers, and Joseph deBoucherville, K. C.

Tancrede Bienvenu, general manager of the bank since more than twenty-five years, has also been promoted First Vice President.

As an appreciation of the valuable services rendered by Mr. Bienvenu to the bank of which he was one of the principal founders in 1900 and that he has managed ever since with undispensed efficiency and devotedness, the President, the Hon. Sir Horimidas Laporte, insisted that Mr. Bienvenu accept the presidency of the bank, whilst he would have himself remained as chairman of the board.

Being unable, on account of his present state of health, to assume further responsibilities, Mr. Bienvenu declined this honor, but owing to the pressure made upon him by the board he accepted the promotion of First Vice President. The Hon. Sir Horimidas Laporte therefore remains as President and S. J. B. Rolland as Second Vice President.

In his remarks acknowledging his promotion Mr. Bienvenu assured the board that he would always remain strongly interested in the management, welfare and progress of the bank. He also declared that the efficient assistance received from the senior officers and from the entire staff allowed him, more particularly during the recent years, to continue as General Manager than he would have himself desired. He also stated that quite soon, however, he will insist that his successor be appointed, pledging himself to give his assistance to his successor and to the whole staff of the bank.
