Nfl'd. Men Fail To Return After Taking Off On A Short Sight-Seeing Trip.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 31.—(By the Canadian Press)—Two men took to the air at the northern tip of Newfoundland last night and vanished. They were pilot Arthur Sullivan of the Newfoundland Airways, and Dr. Kruentz, Grenfell mission dentist, who left for a short sight-seeing flight and were swallowed up in the fog.

The steamer Strathcona, coastwise vessels, and fishing boats from St. Anthony Harbor cruised the coast last night and today without finding a single trace of plane or fliers. GIRL JUMPS AT HEIGHT OF 24,000 FEET

Miss Samaranda Braescu, Roumanian parachute jumper, claims to have established a new world's record for women. She took off from the Curtiss-Wright aerodrome in Alameda, Calif., with Harry Dosshardt as pilot. They headed toward Sacramento and gained an altitude of 24,000 feet. There Miss Braescu bailed out. She landed safely at Marysville, near Sacramento. The former world's record for women was 21,179 feet.

FORMER GERMAN AGENT TO FORM GOVT.

War-Time Military Associate Of Hindenburg Slated For Important Role.

BERLIN, May 31.—(A.P.)—President Paul Von Hindenburg today called upon a war time military associate—and incidentally a man who was indicted in New York in 1918 in connection with an alleged conspiracy to blow up the Welland Canal in Ontario—to form a temporary government for Germany.

He is Franz Von Papen, German military attaché in the United States early in the war until Washington demanded his withdrawal, and later a general staff officer of the Kaiser's Imperial army. The President commissioned Von Papen to form a "national concentration

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St. Dunstan's Passes Another Milestone In Educational History

Large And Representative Attendance At Commencement Exercises Yesterday. Inspiring Addresses Delivered By Bishop O'Sullivan And Other Speakers. Encouraging Report Of Year's Work Submitted By Rector.

Graced by the presence of His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan, His Honor Lieutenant Governor Dalton, representatives of Parliament, of the Provincial Government, the Civic Corporation, the clergy and a large body of citizens, the 78th Commencement exercises of St. Dunstan's University were held most successfully in the Dalton Hall of the University yesterday afternoon.

Eleven students received their graduating diplomas and were addressed in an inspiring manner by His Excellency Bishop O'Sullivan.

Among those present were Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, Acting Premier and Minister of Health and Education; Hon. J. A. MacDonald, M. P.; Mr. W. Chester S. McLaren, M. P.; His Worship Mayor Stewart, and Mr. W. M. Lea, leader of the Opposition.

The Rector submitted a gratifying report, showing that despite world wide economic depression the attendance of students was well maintained, while the class work was most satisfactory to the faculty.

The Alumni Essay was read by James McAllan and the Valedictory by William Reddin.

A vocal solo by Mr. Francis McMillan was very pleasingly rendered as were also a quartette and choruses by members of the Glee Club. Brief addresses, at the close of the exercises, were given by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, Hon. Dr. MacMillan, Mr. Lea, Hon. Mr. MacDonald and His Worship the Mayor.

The diplomas and awards were distributed by Bishop O'Sullivan.

U.S. PLACES GASOLINE TAX

(Canadian Press)

WASHINGTON, May 31.—The United States Senate built the revenue bill up to a budget balancing level today with a tax of one cent a gallon on gasoline. The committee amendment proposing the gasoline tax was adopted without a record vote after the Senate had rejected an amendment by Senator Gore, Democrat, Okla., to reduce the tax to one-half a cent.

The gasoline tax brought the revenue bill up to the figure set by the treasury as necessary to balance the budget and left the sales tax amendment as the only major controversy to be settled before final passage of the bill.

The Senate then voted a five percent tax on bequests of tax-exempt securities. It was proposed by Senator Wheeler and carried by a viva voce vote.

The child's skull was fractured. Her father suffered a broken arm and injuries to his spine; and the mother sustained body bruises. The driver and Richard Benoit, another passenger, were injured slightly.

The Rumanian Cabinet Resigns

Unable To Negotiate A Foreign Loan To Help The Country Out Of A Financial Stalemate.

BUCHAREST, Rumania, May 31.—(A.P.)—Premier Nicholas Jorga and his Cabinet resigned tonight because it was unable to negotiate a foreign loan to help the country out of a financial stalemate.

Former Premier Nicholas Titulescu, Ambassador to London and now in Geneva, was urgently requested by King Carol to return and become Premier Designate.

The resignation of the Jorga Cabinet came at the end of a three hour Ministerial conference today. It was explained that for months the government had been unable to pay the salaries of its civil servants. A June payment of only 50 percent was in prospect.

Preparing For Conference Presented Pope With Album

DUBLIN, May 31.—(Canadian Press Cable)—The Irish Free State Daill Eireann is speeding up business to permit the Free State delegation to go to the Imperial Economic Conference at Ottawa.

On the motion of President, Eamonn De Valera the Daill this afternoon decided to sit four days a week, instead of three, and to rise on July 8. Mr. De Valera explained adjournment on that date would be necessary to permit the Ministers to make the necessary preparations for the Conference, which opens July 21.

The opposition under former President William Cosgrave made merry over the proposed adjournment. Mr. Cosgrave demanded while the House laughed, "Is the Government afraid of defeat while its reserves are being moved to the Canadian front?"

Remunerated According To Results

LONDON, May 31.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Delegates to the Imperial Economic Conference at Ottawa should be remunerated according to results, Col T. C. Moore, Conservative suggested today in the House of Commons.

"I'm afraid this would inflict too great a burden on the Exchequer," quickly replied J. H. Thomas, Dominions' Secretary, while the House laughed.

U. S. Favorable

WASHINGTON, May 31.—(A.P.)—The United States Government has responded favorably to an inquiry from Great Britain as to whether the United States will participate in a world economic conference to consider methods of stabilizing commodity prices.

The State Department issued the following statement concerning the proposed conference after Henry L. Stimson, Secretary of State, had conferred with the President and Ogden L. Mills, Secretary of the Treasury.

"The suggestion that an international conference should be called for the purpose of considering methods to stabilize world commodity prices first came to the attention of this government through an inquiry of the British Ambassador in Washington as to whether we would be interested and would participate in such a conference.

"The suggestion was that the conference should be called by the British Government in London. After due consideration this Government replied through Ambassador Mellon that it felt early convocation of such a conference might be of real value in the present depression. As was stated in press messages from London the proposed conference would have nothing to do with war debts, reparations, disarmament, or anything but economic subjects. It is our understanding that the British Government is also approaching France, Italy, and other powers on the same subject."

Two Balloons Out Of Race

REGINA, May 31.—(By The Canadian Press)—Two balloons participating in the United States National Balloon race from Omaha, Neb., are in Saskatchewan tonight—one grounded southeast of here and the other last reported travelling over the southwest section of the Province.

The Goodyear II, piloted by Ralph Blair, landed at Tyvan, 50 miles southeast of Regina. Blair was accompanied by A. R. Trotter.

It was reported here one of the U. S. army balloons passed over southwest Saskatchewan this afternoon. It was last reported from Kincaid, about 150 miles southwest of here.

SERIOUS FOREST FIRES IN MAN.

WINNIPEG, May 31.—Forest fires in the northwestern part of the province were giving authorities concern tonight. One major blaze which has been raging on the Porcupine Mountains for several days, burned out of control today, and destroyed homestead buildings near Bowman, a few miles east of the Saskatchewan border.

Two other outbreaks, one in the Duck Mountain reserve and another at Eagle Lake, east of Lake Winnipeg, were being held in check. Additional fire fighters today were rushed to the Eagle Lake conflagration which covers a large area near the Ontario boundary.

Swept along by a high wind the Porcupine Mountain blaze invaded the little settlement of Bowman, situated at the foot of the mountain. Homestead buildings of S. Farrow and N. Tripp quickly fell prey to the flames. The situation in this area is now regarded as quite serious and weary firefighters look to clouded skies to bring relief.

A new fire which broke out in a block of green timber in the Duck Mountain Reserve Monday has strengthened the belief of provincial forestry officials that the fires are not of accidental origin. Two new fires broke out between English Brook and Manigotah River, east of Lake Winnipeg, but are believed to be under control.

Crop Conditions Most Favorable

OTTAWA, May 31.—(By The Canadian Press)—Present crop conditions range from good in Manitoba and Saskatchewan to excellent in Alberta, but there is an increasing realization that frequent rains will be necessary to replenish the low moisture reserves and a growing concern over the probabilities of cutworm and grasshopper damage, states the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in a telegraphic crop report on the prairie provinces issued today.

Duty Values

OTTAWA, May 31.—(By The Canadian Press)—The Department of National Revenue announced in a bulletin today that the value for duty on debts shall be the true invoice in Canadian funds plus two cents a pound. For cauliflower the value for duty shall be the true invoice plus four cents a pound and for green peas the invoice value plus two and a half cents. These changes take effect tomorrow and in the case of beets continues until Feb. 15, 1933. For cauliflower and peas the regulation terminates on Nov. 30 next.
